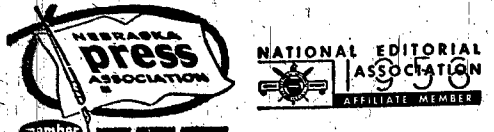

### Friday Rites for Barry Ra Whitney In Carroll Home

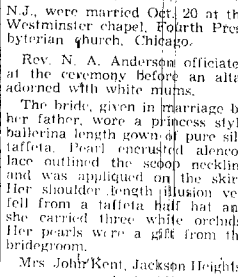
Carroll — Funeral rites were conducted for Barry Ra Whitney, 8, in the Charles Whitney home Friday afternoon.

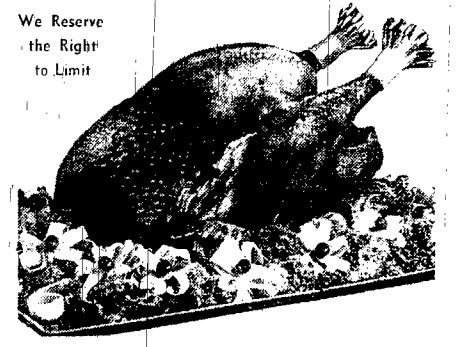

# Plainview Routs Blue Devils 51-14 in Closer Here Friday

## Locals Score Twice During First Quarter

Plainview's Pirates, using a quartet of speedy backs and superb blocking, routed Wayne High's Blue Devils 51-14 in the season's closer Friday night at Memorial stadium.

It marked the second straight undefeated season for the Pirates, whose only mar was a 20-20 tie with South Sioux City to open the season. Wayne ended with five wins against four losses.

For one quarter, it looked like Wayne might make a battle of the game. The Blue Devils scored twice in the opening period to take a 14-7 lead but Plainview roared back to enjoy a 22-14

margin at halftime. The Pirates were unable to stop Wayne's Bob Schwarzenbach, who scored all 14 Wayne points and accounted for 202 of Wayne's 299 yards gained. The senior halfback averaged 13.2 yards on 10 carries and caught six passes for 70 more yards. His one touchdown was an 80-yard romp in the final seconds of the first period. The other was on a 14-yard pass-lateral, Roger Domesla to Kenny Dahl to Schwarzenbach.

Schwarzenbach's performance left him with a rushing average of 11.3 yards per carry for the nine-game season. He tallied 121 of Wayne's 198 points and accounted for 1,156 of the team's 1,992 yards rushing. In five games he scored all the points garnered by Wayne.

Twelve other seniors also closed their high school careers Friday. They were Jerry Hendrickson, Roy Henzler, Larry Milliken, Jim

Kluge, Ron Milliken, Dennis Manske, Terry Wehrer, Stan Baird, Dahl and Darrell Gilliland.

Biggest thorns in Wayne's side Friday were C. J. Hinrichsen and Jerry Loney. Each scored two touchdowns. Loney led the Pirates with a 12.1 average for 11 carries. Hinrichsen averaged 9.8 in 16. Leon Lorum also scored 16.0 touchdowns for the winners. The seventh was scored by Bob Patras.

The Pirates ran up 522 yards, 485 of them on the ground. Largest totals gained against the Blue Devils this season. In addition to the seven touchdowns, the winners got two safeties, one on a blocked punt and one on a faulty Wayne pithout.
