Set First Auction Money Sale For Friday at City Auditorium

Merchandise Total Nears \$2,000 Mark

Northwest Nebraska shoppers Friday will get their first opportunity to spend Wayne Auction money. Nearly \$2,000 worth of timely, high quality merchandise will be put on the auction block at 2 p. m. in Wayne city auditorium.

This merchandise can be purchased only with Wayne Auction money, a premium plan instituted by Wayne merchants Nov. 1. The money is given with cash purchases at the rate of \$5 for each \$1 spent.

Customers save this money to purchase merchandise at sales held at intervals in Wayne. No other medium of exchange will be accepted. Persons attending the auction are urged to keep any money they do not spend because it will be good for the next sale.

Most of the merchandise will be on display at the auditorium. The rest will be represented by a merchandise certificate.

All 88 Wayne merchants participating in the program will have items on the sale. The bidding will be conducted by a regular auctioneer with clerks to record the sales.

A limit of two items per person per sale has been imposed so more persons will have an opportunity to buy the merchandise. A comprehensive listing of the items appears in the auction ad on page 1, section 3 of this issue of The Wayne Herald.

The list includes batteries, jackets, anti-freeze, groceries, gasoline, motor oil, livestock antibiotics and feeds, toys for both boys and girls, women's clothing, nylon hose, hammers, electric clocks, blankets and a host of other items, all regular stock merchandise taken from store shelves for this sale.

Northwest Nebraskans are looking forward to a day of fun and bargains as they attend this sale Friday.

Two Choices Offered for Three Years

Wayne county corn growers will get a chance to vote Dec. 11 on the kind of price support and acreage control program they prefer for the next three years.

This referendum is being held as provided in the 1956 Soil Bank act. County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins announced this week. Polling places have tentatively been set at Wayne, Wakefield, Sioux Falls, Carroll, Winside and Hoskins. Balloting will open at 8 a. m.

Corn growers will choose between two corn programs:

- 1. Acreage allotments and a price support level from 75 to 90 percent of parity, depending upon corn supplies. This is identical with the program in effect this year.
- 2. A corn base acreage (about 1.3 larger than the allotment) and a lower support price.

At least two-thirds of those voting Dec. 11 must favor the base acreage program for it to go into effect according to the act. Otherwise acreage allotments and the 75-90 percent price support level will be in effect in 1957, 1958 and 1959.

Anyone who produced corn in Wayne county in 1956 will be eligible to vote.

The national average support price loan rate with acreage allotments has been set at \$3.56 a bushel or 77 percent of parity. Under a base acreage program the rate would be \$1.31 a bushel. In Wayne county these prices would be about seven cents a bushel less than the national average.

The national corn acreage allotment for 1957 will be 37.3 million acres, 14 percent less than 1956. Since 54 counties have been added to commercial corn areas in other states, farmers who raised corn in Wayne county in 1956 would receive a reduction of about 16 percent in their allotment.

County allotment for 1957 is 70,450 acres as compared with 84,000 acres for 1956.

Under the corn base acreage program, the national acreage for the commercial area would be 58 million acres as set by the Soil Bank act... the same as in 1956. However, Wayne county growers would receive a slight reduction due to the expansion of the 1957 national commercial corn area.

Under this program Wayne county would have a base acreage of 96,627 acres as compared to 98,945 in 1956.

County farmers will receive notice of both their corn base acreage and corn acreage allotment before Dec. 11, Jenkins said.

Under acreage allotments, any corn farmer in Wayne county would be eligible for price supports provided he did not harvest any corn acreage in excess of his 1957 allotment. If he exceeds his allotment he could sell a crop at market price or feed it to livestock without paying a penalty. Participation in the soil bank would be voluntary under acreage allotments.

Under the corn base acreage program a farmer would have no new requirements: (1) limit his corn acreage to not more than his corn base acreage and (2) place an equal acreage equal to at least 15 percent of his corn soil bank base in the soil bank.

If the farmer places less than 15 percent in the soil bank, his corn acreage for harvest would be reduced by that amount. If he goes into the conservation reserve he could harvest up to his corn base acreage.

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City Headed for Record Year in Electricity Usage

Wayne is heading for another record year in electrical consumption, Light Plant Superintendent N. H. Brugger told city council members at a meeting Tuesday night.

Commenting on installation of the new \$265,000 Worthington V-12 engine, Brugger said it is hoped the new engine will be ready for use next month.

A new record peak in consumption has already been reached, Brugger told the council. Last year's high was 1,650 kilowatts, a record for the city. A peak of 1,250 has already been generated this fall and higher totals are expected as Christmas nears.

In 1956 a total of about 6 1/2 million kilowatts were generated at the Wayne light plant. The present trend continues, Brugger said.

This year's total will approach the seven million mark.

Activity was at a minimum as the council held one of its shortest meetings Tuesday. Only other business was a discussion with equipment representatives on a light pole boom and post hole digger for the light plant.

Cost of the unit was pegged at about \$4,500. In addition the city would have to purchase a truck chassis to mount the unit on.

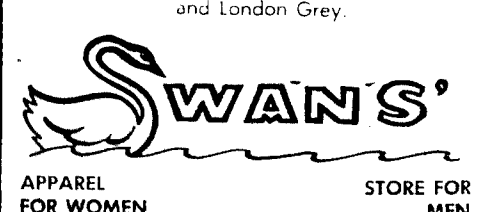

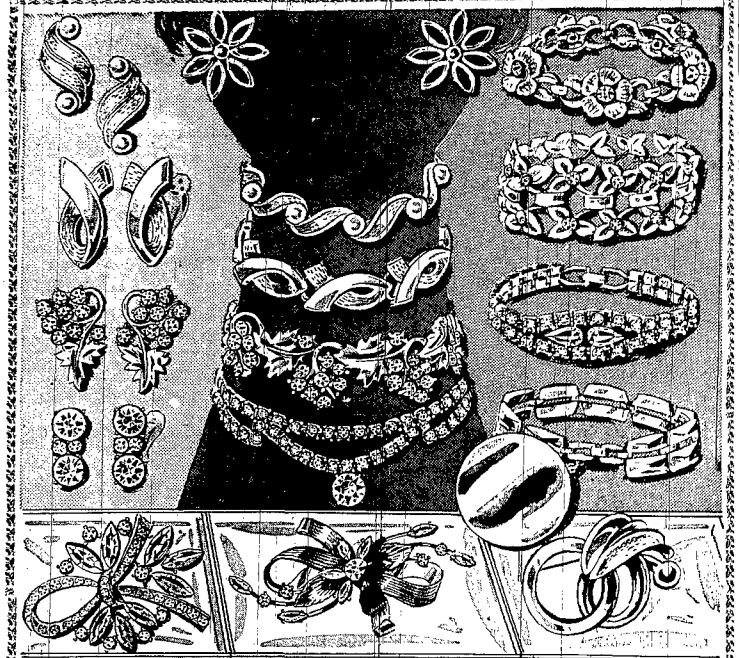

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Hunting Licenses

Our Nebraska Game commission is in the throes of many similar organizations—that of too few funds to satisfy public demands for hunting and fishing.

Recently Director Mel Streen said that license fees should be raised . . . and we agree. As one outdoor writer said, this brings a storm of protests that it works a hardship on youngsters and oldsters despite the fact that youths under 16 and old age pensioners don't need a license.

Our hunting or fishing license dollar today provides us with more fun and recreation than any other expenditure we make. This, even though there are more people hunting and fishing than ever before.

Through sound game management many species of game actually are on the increase. But sound game management takes money . . . and that money can come only through license fees. A combination hunting and fishing license for Nebraska residents costs only \$2.60—not even a penny a day! And for that sum we are permitted to try to take every kind of game in the state except ducks, pheasant, quail, deer and antelope.

These require special stamps or licenses. That small amount has to stretch a long way if it is to work for you. If it were spent only for restocking it probably wouldn't be enough, but it must also be used to pay salaries of men who protect our wildlife resources so everyone can have a chance at them, too.

Far too many so-called sportsmen feel it is their divinely-endowed right to hunt and fish as they please and this some divine power is to furnish an endless supply of game despite man's poor land management practices, the acts of game hogs, indiscriminate damming of streams and draining of bog areas that furnish cover for birds and animals.

It's time the public realized the facts of life with respect to game management. Hunting and fishing are now a luxury—they can be considered in no other light—and if we want to play, we'll have to pay!

We think it would work a hardship on no one if the license fees were doubled. This would give our game commissioners funds to provide better hunting and fishing.

Farmers' Retirement

Farmers who will be 65 years of age or older by Dec. 31, and who had income from farming or wages in 1955 and 56 to be covered, can retire in 1957 and start drawing retirement payments under social security.

Not much time remains in 1956 to plan for the highest possible net earnings from self employment up to \$4,200, the basis for these retirement payments.

Farmers who report their income for tax purposes on the cash basis and who plan to retire in 1957 should sell before Jan. 1 all possible crops and livestock which would regularly be held for sale.

Income from the sale of feed crops also can be included when livestock operations are being reduced for retirement. Income from the sale of capital items like breeding livestock and machinery do not count for social security.

Some farm expenses may be postponed until after Jan. 1 to improve net income for social security.

Vote on Corn Program

Farmers who grow corn in the Nebraska commercial corn area will get a chance to vote Dec. 11 on the kind of a corn price support and acreage control program they prefer for the next three years.

This referendum is being held as provided by the Soil Bank act of 1956. Voting places for each commercial corn county will be announced by local ASC committees.

Budget Hearings

LINCOLN—The gravity of the task facing the 1957 Legislature becomes more apparent each time a state agency makes its request for tax money. Budget hearings before Gov. Victor Anderson have been under way more than a week and the order of the day is requests for more money from taxpayers.

"We just can't raise taxes as much as these budgets coming in," the governor said. Illustrating the problem more graphically, the state chief executive said, "We are going to eliminate the frost and get down to eating hard tack."

The governor made a series of statements concerning budgets during hearings. They included:

- The cost of operating the State orthopedic hospital, Lincoln, is getting too high for the patient load. The problem may have reached the point where it may become necessary to close the hospital and contact elsewhere for patient care.
- There may need to be increases in tuition fees for out-of-state students attending either the four state supported teachers colleges or the University of Nebraska.
- The Board of Control should study ways of making full use of the State Tubercular hospital, Kearney.
- Regarding the Orthopedic hospital, the governor said the last patient census at that institution showed 50 at the institution and 122 employees with a two-year budget of some \$200,000. "That's too expensive," the governor said.
- Dr. F. A. Acomb, hospital superintendent, doubted the governor's figures. He said the patient load is nearer 4,500 per year, including outpatients and service to other state institutions.
- On the matter of the higher educational institutions, together the University of Nebraska and the four teachers colleges—Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney—have asked for some \$7 million more in tax money.

"If this expansion is for out-of-state students," the governor said, "Then I'm going to look to my

taxpayers. Anderson has emphasized that no one is for higher education more than I am. But it's a question of the ability of the taxpayer to pay."

At the same time he says he realizes the need for money for the institutions. "It's a matter of a crisis at both ends," he commented.

At the Kearney TB hospital, the governor said the hospital capacity is 250 and when he visited it, it was nowhere near that total. The patient load has been declining steadily, he said. The Board of Control, the governor said, should see if it can't eat up part of the institution or find some other use for it. The board said meanwhile it has been negotiating with Wayne for care for patients from that state as a means of fully utilizing the hospital.

Dredla To Quit

Thomas Dredla, controversial Board of Control chairman, says he is not going to seek reappointment to the board when his term ends in June next year. The attorney has served since 1951 when he was appointed by Val Peterson. Dredla says he wants to help his son with Erie law business and do some traveling.

The two-year Dredla has been chairman of the board since a stormy and included a series of riots and fires at the penitentiary and reformatory and a rapid turn over in institution heads.

Gov. Victor Anderson said he is looking for a replacement immediately. Under state law the governor must submit the name of the new appointee no later than 20 days after the 1957 Legislature convenes. It meets on New Year's Day. Also by statute no two members of the board can be from the same political district, which means the replacement must come from the First or Third district. He will be a Republican.

The governor said Dredla had been very cooperative and put forth an effort to give the state credit. Under state law the governor may remove a board member if Mrs. Catherine Martin is board vice chairman and the third member is Charles U. Leeman, Omaha. Both say they plan to serve out their terms. Mrs. Martin has two

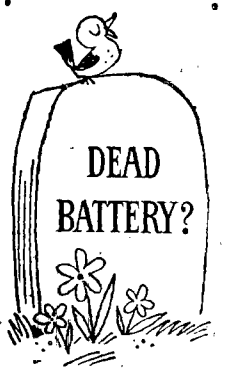

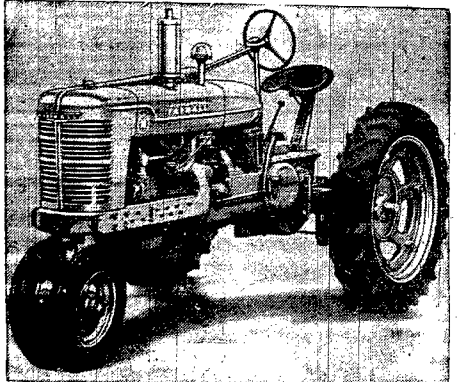

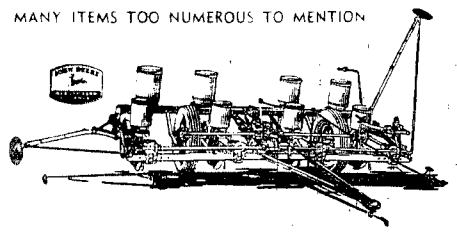

Each year Ak-Sar-Ben grants scholarships to enough students to make up the entire student body of the average small college!

This program is made possible by revenues from thoroughbred racing.

FACTS ABOUT AK-SAR-BEN

Nebraska farmers and ranchers sell a lot of hay and feed to owners of horses that participate in Nebraska race meetings. At Ak-Sar-Ben alone, the feed costs are \$150,000 each year. Licenses to help stage Ak-Sar-Ben races are granted yearly to about 2,500 midwesterners.

We're learning that the "good earth" is good to us only when we're good to it. We know that it's necessary to put back into the soil as much as we take out. As an aid in solving mysteries of the soil, Ak-Sar-Ben has furnished testing equipment to Nebraska colleges.

Grass roots research is going on in the Sandhills. Nebraska ranchers are cooperating with the State Extension Service to develop better range grasses. This project benefiting the state's important cattle business, is one of many that Ak-Sar-Ben helps finance with its racing revenues.
