We often hear complaints about the time lag in getting results out to farmers. Actually the time lag is far greater for many farmers to adopt new and proven practices. In short we would welcome the opportunity of sharing with you the latest information available from your agricultural experiment station. Ask us about it.

Lice Cut Gains

Lice are more than an annoyance to cattle. They often reduce gains and milk production severely. For practical control, spray on a mild day with lindane, methoxychlor or chlordane.

Dairy cows need three to five gallons of drinking water for each

gallon of milk they produce. Cows produce best when water is offered at will. Cows prefer water at temperatures above 38 degrees.

Beware of the quiet killer! Sounds like promotion for a new mystery play. But this is serious. We're talking about carbon monoxide. With colder weather coming, it's always tempting to start the tractor or car inside and that's how carbon monoxide deaths happen. Keep those doors open when you start any vehicle. Your life may depend upon it.

Soil Tests

Soil tests once in each crop rotation are the only practical means of determining fertilizer needs. Results of soil tests made now will be returned in ample time to plan next year's fertilizer program. Missing can be a luxury few farmers can afford.

University Budget

Lincoln Gov. Victor Anderson and Chancellor Clifford Hardin have come to grips over the University of Nebraska budget. The school is seeking \$5,563,125 more in state tax funds for the 1957-59 biennium to meet what Hardin has termed a "real crisis"—that of keeping personnel and adding new ones.

In a four-hour session last week the governor, the chancellor and other university heads discussed the problem of taxes and needs of the school. The skirmish was a friendly one, but most serious. It is the first round in a bid by the university for the funds. After all budget hearings are done, the governor will make recommendations to the Legislature.

Then the Legislature's budget committee will hold hearings and come up with its suggestions to the Legislature. Taken into consideration and given considerable weight will be recommendations of the governor.

Hardin was asked by the governor to trim the budget but the chancellor declined. He said it already is at the "bedrock" level. Basically, Hardin's position is that the money is needed for salaries to fight stiff competition from schools throughout the country who are probing campuses for personnel at higher pay.

The chancellor fears the loss of 200 faculty members in the next two years if the funds are not forthcoming. In the last year and a half, 144 left the institution—mainly for more money, he said. He said he already cut, personally, \$2.5 million from requests of his college heads. But the governor said the asking must be "pounded

down" further. The governor's stand on the university is not confined to that spending agency. He has taken the same "hold the line" attitude with others. The governor says his problem is extremely difficult. Long a backer of a sound university, he now is faced with the problem of how much more the taxpayer can stand.

The chief executive said he has "no political aspirations" in taking his stand. He says it is simply a matter of his responsibility to taxpayers as weighed against the need for more funds.

Budget hearings by the governor undoubtedly will continue to the end of the session in the statehouse in remaining weeks. The governor has laid the problem of the university on the line—either the school trim its budget or he will do it for them.

The governor says no business problem has ever caused him more concern than budget matters this year.

These suggestions were made by the governor on the university: 1. Higher tuition fees. Hardin said they would not raise the amount of money needed.

2. "Doubling up" on classes. Hardin said this is already being tried but there's a point beyond which an instructor cannot be burdened.

Hardin said the increase sought by the university would cost a farmer with a \$50,000 investment \$15.50 more taxes per year or a city resident with a \$15,000 home, \$4.50 more.

Polio Shots

Some 146,000 persons have had their polio shots in Nebraska since the immunization program began in 1954 with field trials. That's the report of Alan Rouse, state polio director. He said the total number of shots is about 950,000. This, however, should climb by the end of the year when third shots are received by many other Nebraskans.

Only 1,300 persons 20 years old or more have received third shots, Rouse said. About 408,000

persons have taken at least one shot. Of that number, 385,000 were under 20 or expectant mothers.

The director said acceptance of the vaccine was reflected in the reduction of polio cases reported this year. At last count the figure was 166 compared with 274 for a similar period in 1955.

Election Results

The results of Nebraska's Nov. 6 general election, has been chalked up officially by the State Canvassing Board.

The results changed no contests as reported in official tabulations. But, they did show the official vote—594,786—down considerably from the 609,660 for the 1952 presidential year.

Rep. Robert Harrison got a 246-vote victory over Lawrence Brock, Wakefield Democrat in the nip-and-tuck race for Congress in the Third district.

President Eisenhower led the Republican ticket; Frank Sorrell, Syracuse, unsuccessful candidate for governor, topped the Democratic slate.

Board of Control

The new member of the State Board of Control is well backed in the operation of institutions and functioning of the office of the board, which governs state institutions. He's Harold F. Peterson, 49, now board administrative assistant.

Peterson first began working for the board in 1935 as business manager for the State penitentiary. From 1937 to 1942, he was board secretary, then superintendent of the Beatrice home until 1950.

Before rejoining the board in 1955 in his present post, Peterson was in the stationery business. He replaces Thomas Credia, Crete, who announced he would not seek reappointment when his term ends next July 1. That's when Peterson takes over for a six-year term.

A Republican, Peterson will get \$6,500 per year, \$500 less than for his present post.

Gov. Victor Anderson said "I needed someone who had some experience in the field for the board of control."

Mud posed further complications another time. Thielman stalled in a mud-hole near the farm now operated by Perves Meier. William Palmer, then tenant on the farm, attempted to pull the carrier's Model T out with a team of white horses. The strain proved too much for the car as the front axle and two wheels pulled off. This still didn't free the auto and after one attempt that night the Ford garage succeeded in freeing the car the next morning.

Thielman has served two generations in several families and said possibly three in some. Original patrons still on his route for the last trip Friday were Mrs. Dora Meier, Mrs. Phil Damme, Mrs. William Stuthman, Carl and Fred Erxleben; Mrs. August Kay and Mrs. Mae Lower. Postoffice employees honored Thielman last Wednesday night with a stag party at Hotel Morris. They presented him a wrist watch.

L. Brock Still Undecided on Contest of Election Defeat

Canvass Gives R. Harrison 246 Margin

Democrat Lawrence Brock was still undecided Wednesday whether to contest his defeat by Rep. Robert Harrison in the Nov. 6 general election for the Third district seat in the House of Representatives. Results announced by the State Canvassing board Thursday showed Harrison held a 246-vote margin. Brock had held about a 1,100-vote margin in the election night counting but mail ballots gave Harrison the final edge. Brock said Friday he has asked the House committee on elections for the necessary forms to challenge the re-election of Rep. Harrison. He added he will continue to study the election for evidence of irregularities. The acknowledged cattle feeder said the only way to contest the election is through Federal machinery and this procedure requires some sort of irregularity to be proved. There is no provision in State law for a recount, according to Deputy Secretary of State Roland Huethe. Brock said he would have liked a recount, since the difference between his total vote and that of Harrison was less than two-tenths of one percent. He suggested there might have been an error in the count. Brock, who led Harrison before the mail votes were counted, said he will not stand on the technicality of county clerks opening ballots before the canvass date. He commented the law on that point is ambiguous and should be rewritten by the Legislature.

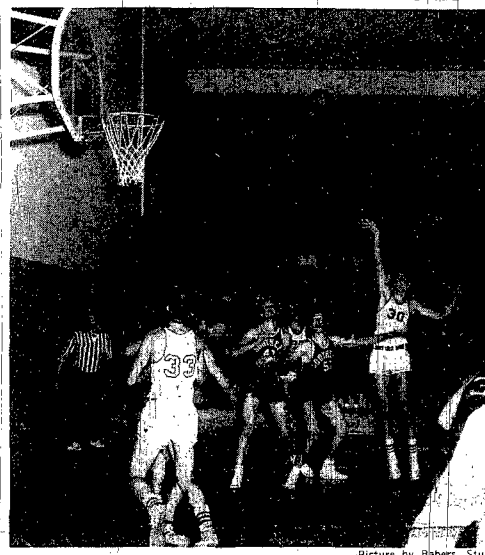

County Farmers to Pick Corn Supports In Tuesday Voting

Wayne county corn growers will get a chance to vote Tuesday on the kind of price support and acreage control program they prefer for the next three years.

County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins this week announced polling places for the 13 county precincts. They are: Deer Creek and Garfield—Carroll Legion hall; Chapin and Hancock—Winside Legion hall; Sherman—Matson shop, Sholes; Hoskins—Hoskins town hall; Leslie and Logan—Wakefield city hall; Brenna, Hunter, Plum Creek, Strahan and Wilbur—County ASC office, Wayne.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. Anybody who produced corn in Wayne county this year is eligible to vote.

Each person in Wayne county who in 1936 was engaged in the production of corn and entitled to share in the proceeds of the crop as owner, tenant or sharecropper is entitled to vote.

Growers are classified with a standing rent, cash rent or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to cast a ballot. In the event two or more persons produced corn as joint tenants, tenants in common or owners of community property, each is eligible to vote. The individual members of a qualified partnership are eligible to vote.

Growers will choose between two programs: a soil bank corn base acreage such as was used this year or the acreage allotment program in effect before 1956.

If two-thirds or more of the farmers who vote favor base acreages they will be used; if more than one-third favor acreage allotments, they will be in effect.

Base Acreage
If the corn base acreage program is approved:
1. The base acreage for commercial counties will be 51 million acres for each year the program is in effect (authorized through 1959). There will be no corn acreage allotments. Wayne county's base acreage for 1957 would be about 96,600 acres as compared to 98,900 this year.

2. The price support level will be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture each year in accordance with general directives in the controlling legislation. For 1957 the support level would be an average of \$1.31 a bushel. Wayne county price would be about seven cents below this figure.

3. Farmers will qualify for price support by staying within their base acreage and also taking part in the soil bank program.

Acreage Allotments
If an acreage allotment program is approved:
1. An acreage allotment for the county will be determined each

year in accordance with legislative provisions. The national total for 1957 is 37.3 million acres while Wayne county figure pegged at 650,000 acres. This compares to 640,000 acres this year.

2. Price support levels will be within 75 to 90 percent of parity in accordance with the support legislation. For 1957 the average support price will be \$1.36 a bushel. Wayne county would be about seven cents below this figure.

3. Farmers will qualify for price support by staying within their acreage allotment and also taking part in the soil bank program.

4. Under the base acreage program a farmer would have to meet two requirements to obtain price support: (1) limit his corn acreage to not more than his corn base acreage and (2) place an acreage equal to at least 15 percent of his corn base into the soil bank.

If the farmer places his corn base in the acreage reserve, his corn acreage for harvest will be reduced by that amount. If he places into the conservation reserve, he could harvest up to his corn base acreage and receive an acreage of other cropland.

If the base acreage program is approved farmers would be able to receive an acreage for their corn base in effect. The acreage or conservation reserve in order to qualify for price support.

Under acreage allotment, Wayne county farmer would be able to harvest any corn in excess of 1957 allotment.

If he places this acreage and or feed it to livestock without a penalty, a part of the soil bank would be available for acreage allotments.

An explanatory program on corn referendum is being held Monday noon over 5 p. m. in vision to acquaint farmers with pros and cons of each program.
