Herman Named Jaycee Young Farmer



Leland Herman last week was named Wayne county's young farmer of the year by Wayne Jaycees, Project Chairman Melvin Froehlich announced. Herman now will be eligible for the state title and if he wins will be considered for national honors. The citation pointed out Herman's contributions to community betterment along with his record as a successful farmer. A plaque for the local award will be presented at a later date, Froehlich said. Set 1957 County Payment Rate For Soil Bank Acreage Reserves

Wayne county's soil bank payment for 1957 will be about \$500 per acre higher than in 1956, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins announced today.

Under the new system of acreage reserve payments, Wayne county's rate will be \$425 per acre. Last year the average county rate was approximately \$300 per acre.

Rates for other NE Nebraska counties are: Cedar and DeWitt, \$250; Coding, \$300; Thurston, \$300; Hamilton, \$300; Pierce, \$300; Madison, \$300; and Dakota, \$300.

Jenkins said the new system will be based on a 10-year pronouncement average which will include the years 1947-56, inclusive.

In explaining the new payment system, Jenkins offered the following example of choices open to county crop growers. The example is based on a 160-acre farm with a 50-acre corn allotment for 1957.

1. The farmer may plant the entire 50-acre allotment to corn and be eligible for price support. This support will average \$3.00 per bushel for the nation. Wayne county's rate will be about \$1.00 per bushel.

2. He may plant 40 acres of corn and place 10 acres in the acreage reserve. His corn would then be eligible for price support. His 10-acre reserve would receive a soil bank payment of \$25 per acre or \$250. The farmer could also get an additional \$25 per acre by planting his 40 acres to soybeans or legumes.

3. He could plant his entire 50-acre allotment to corn and get the balance of his 50-acre allotment into the conservation reserve. His payment would be \$11 per acre for such land for a period of three to five years.

4. He may choose not to participate in the price support program or soil bank and plant as much corn as he wishes.

Auction Money Sale Set Friday at City Auditorium

Next Wayne Auction Money sale is set for Friday at 1 p. m. in city auditorium, Chamber Secretary K. N. Parke announced Wednesday.

Many of the items on this sale will be farm staples, Parke said, including groceries, oils, batteries and livestock needs.

Other types of merchandise also will be represented as the nearly 90 Wayne merchants again go to their shelves to pick seasonal articles to place on the auction block.

As in past sales, only Wayne Auction Money will be accepted as legal tender. This money is given by participating Wayne businesses at the rate of 55 auction money for each \$1 retail sale.

Money issued at the start of the program is still good and may be used Friday.

Last sale attracted 2,500 persons. Seated bidders will be serviced by special sales assistants to make sure their bids are heard by auctioneers on the platform.

Auctioneers J. Hughes and Ivan Nixon will again cry the sale, assisted by Wayne Chamber of Commerce members. All merchandise will be on display on the stage during the sale.

A complete list of sale items will be available at the door and the auditorium so buyers may select items they desire.

In order to permit more persons to take advantage of the valuable merchandise on the sale a limit of two purchases per person has been set.

Wayne county's school reorganization committee will meet with the Madison county group at Norfolk college next Thursday. Chairman Herbert Hilkemann announced today.

The committees will discuss details of the proposed Wayne county school reorganization map. The meeting will start at 1:30 p. m.

A suggested plan for Wayne county reorganization will be sent to the state committee for consideration at its Jan. 11 meeting. If approved by the state group, it would be returned to the county for public hearing and an eventual election.

The proposed map puts all property in Wayne county in one of 10 high-school attendance units. They are at Wakefield, Pender, Winside, Hoskins, Carroll, Wisner, Pigeon, Norfolk, Pierce, Randolph, Laurel and Wayne.

This year's county attendance figures for the proposed districts are: Wayne, 1,003; Winside-Carroll, 844; Wakefield, 141; Randolph, 81; Laurel, 9; Pierce, 4; Norfolk, 22; Pender, 14; Wisner, 14; and Pigeon, 0.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

No Play... No Pay

There's an increasing amount of static around the state about the increase in hunting and fishing licenses requested by the state game commission... and a goodly amount of misinformation is being circulated as a result.

A great number of Nebraskans have been told that the commission receives tax money to help finance restocking of fish and game.

That is wrong! Funds for such purposes come from license fees paid by sportsmen for the privilege of hunting and fishing in the state.

A combined hunting and fishing license costs only \$2.60 a year for a resident of Nebraska. This amounts to far less than a cent a day for the privilege of seeking such recreation for a whole year!

The same person who complains about spend-

ing the more for hunting and fishing licenses will cheerfully lose two or three times that much at poker and never whimper.

But he'll say an increase in license makes hunting and fishing a rich man's sport. If any person is so close to bankruptcy that two or three dollars more a year will push him over the brink he shouldn't be spending ANY money for such activities.

An increase would work no hardship on old-age pensioners or on youngsters under 16. Both are permitted to fish or hunt free of charge.

There is absolutely no reason for anyone complaining about an increase in the cost of licenses. It is as simple as this: If you wish to have fishing and hunting here in Nebraska, you'll have to pay a little more for it. If you don't want to pay the added cost—don't. If you don't play you needn't pay.

Ewes Need Adequate Ration

Lambing fever, pregnancy disease or small and weak lambs usually can be prevented by providing adequate rations for ewes during the last eight critical weeks of pregnancy.

Two suggested rations for ewes during this period include:

- 1. Four to five pounds of good quality legume hay. One-half pound of grain should be added to this ration in bad weather. 2. Five to six pounds of silage plus one-half pound grain with one-tenth pound of protein supplement.

A mineral mixture of steamed bone meal and salt, equal parts by weight, should be fed free choice with the ration.

Fertilizer Yields

Fertilizer has doubled out yields consistently over a period of seven years in University of Nebraska outstate tests on eastern Nebraska farms.

Experiments show that oats without fertilizer averaged 25 bushels while yields averaged 50 bushels when fertilizer was applied according to soil tests.

Interstate

Lincoln—The future of tourist travel and income in Nebraska is getting closer and closer.

Traffic on this highway was up slightly this year, but State Highway department officials who calculate tourist travel, say it is too early to tell whether the increase is local traffic or out-of-state motorists.

Best guesses are that income this year should be about the same. However, there are indications officials would not be too surprised if the total is down.

Thinking behind the question mark is that the interstate will permit out-of-state motorists to get off the route only at predetermined points—and these may range from 10 to 50 miles apart.

Unless Nebraska gets more road revenue to match the amount of federal funds on hand for the interstate, it may be some time before the route is built across Nebraska.

The first segment of the highway—between Omaha and Lincoln—probably won't get under construction until May 1957.

Reason is that good connecting links with the interstate are slated for those two cities.

Elsewhere, especially in the thinner-populated areas it may be another story.

However, officials are optimistic that the road will not adversely affect local tourist business in Nebraska.

Most of the steps in the state by "foreign" motorists are for fuel, food and lodging. One of the features of the interstate will be no gasoline stations or motels along roadsides.

There is considerable touring of historic sites in Nebraska although it is believed this does not account for the lion's share of the tourist traffic because basically Nebraska is a "drive" state.

Legislation The Nebraska Legislature has gotten off to a flying start—with an unusual opening day.

It was the first time in the history of the Unicameral that the opening day of the session—prescribed by law—has fallen on a New Year's Day.
