Rural Seventh Grader Tops County Spelling Bee Saturday

Adorn Fells 1956 Champ

Linda Morris, a 12-year-old District 16 seventh grader, is Wayne county's 1957 spelling contest champion. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Morris, Winside, Linda retained the championship Saturday afternoon in competition at the city auditorium. Linda is the first rural champion in the annual event inaugurated last year by The Wayne Herald and Wayne Book store. First National and State National banks cooperated in this year's event by donating \$25 defense bonds to runnersup in the town and rural divisions. As the champion Linda received a \$130 portable typewriter. Her school, taught by Mrs. Emma Wilfers, Winside, will get possession of the championship trophy for the next year. This trophy becomes the permanent possession of the school whose students win the contest three straight years. Formal presentation of the trophy is scheduled at the District 16 schoolhouse this afternoon by Herald Editor Bob Johnson.

An extra "e" proved the downfall of the 1956 champion in Saturday's competition, Janice McCord, daughter of Mrs. Ivalene McCord, Wayne, gained the runner-up spot and a \$20 fountain pen and pencil set. She was the town division champion. Miss McCord spelled adorn "adornre". After Miss Morris spelled the word correctly, she then spelled "repudiate" and gained the championship. Prior to this, the two contestants had correctly spelled stevedore, defamation, ammonia, hydraulic, vitamin, dishevel, crayon, soporulent and comptroller. Donald Meyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Meyer, Wayne, was runnerup in the rural division. He received the First National bank bond. He is a sixth grader in District 10. Sally Wagner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Wagner, Carroll, was runnerup in the town division. She is a seventh grader at Carroll public school. She registered at the State National bank bond. Other town division oral finalists and their schools were: Susan Wright, Wayne High; Nicky McLean, St. Mary's; Donna Echtenkamp, Wayne High; John Dorsey, St. Mary's; Koryn Edin, Wayne Prep; and Judy Bilson, Turner Elementary and Shirley Meyer, St. Mary's. They are listed in the order of their finish.

All 17 of these finalists went completely through the 253-word master list without an error. A total of 85 students competed in the annual event which started with written upward groups Saturday morning. The field was cut to 23 when the noon recess was taken. 250 Farmers Swamp ASC Office Here

Members of the State Drouth Disaster committee will meet with Wayne county officials Friday to discuss the possibilities of declaring the county a disaster area in order to qualify local farmers for participation in the emergency relief program.

The meeting was arranged Tuesday after more than 250 farmers swamped the county ASC office to sign petitions asking the county to be included in the emergency program.

Representing Wayne county at the meeting, which will be held to the public, will be F. A. Stanger, Wayne county officials Friday to discuss the possibilities of declaring the county a disaster area in order to qualify local farmers for participation in the emergency relief program.

The County Drouth Disaster committee made application Oct. 26 to be declared a disaster area but no action had been forthcoming until Tuesday's flood of farmer petitions. Cedar, Dixon, Hamilton and Stanton counties are also participating in the program.

Basically the emergency relief program provides government aid in purchasing feed for cattle, cows, herd foundation cattle and ewes. There is no provision for chickens or hogs. The government pays \$150 per hundredweight on corn, oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums.

If the county is declared a disaster area, farmers must make application to the County FIA committee and declare the number of eligible livestock and the feed supplies they have on hand.

If the application is approved, the committee issues the farmer a purchase order for a specified number of pounds of feed. The farmer then presents this order at the county ASC office.

The ASC then issues a negotiable certificate which the farmer can use to purchase feed from any authorized dealer or warehouseman.

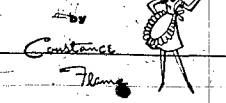

EDITORIAL COMMENT

An Honor

Saturday District 16's Linda Morris was named Wayne county's top speller at the annual contest sponsored by The Wayne Herald and Wayne Book Store.

Linda carried away the pretty pink portable typewriter and an honor she can cherish the rest of her life.

Winning the contest may seem like "kid stuff" to a great many adults but we'll wager that 90 percent or more of the group in the county would have bitten the dust early in the contest.

Linda's achievement makes even professional spellers like us sit up and take notice. Frankly, she spelled words that had us stumped: How about "Cerebellum," or is it "Cerebellum?"

Then there is the old toughy, "sophomore" or is it "sophomore?" Add to that words like "logarithm, reconnaissance, remunerate, and subterranean."

And we always run to the dictionary when we have to use a word like "bivouacked" or "iridescent!"

Those who didn't finish in the money needn't feel badly, either. Missing a word out of the tongue-twisters used in the contest is nothing to be ashamed of.

Spelling is very important . . . because if we know how to spell many words we pick up much incidental knowledge along with learning the proper orthography. And the attention to detail required of a good speller teaches exactness and accuracy.

We feel sure that a good future lies in store for those youngsters who were part of the spelling contest Saturday . . . and to each one we say "Thanks" for participating.

Our thanks too, to those who helped administer the contest. Without their help the contest could not have been held. All in all it was a success from the first word to the awarding of prizes.

Knotty Problem

One of the knottiest problems to face the Unicameral this session is legislation to regulate irrigation wells.

LB 109, LB 110 and others already are in the hopper to set up control and establish priorities for water rights for irrigation wells.

Regulating an unseen and unknown source of supply seems fraught with pitfalls. How can we regulate an unknown quantity . . . how can we

tell a landowner who wants to drill a well on his own land for his own use, that he may or may not dig where he thinks he will get the best source of supply.

Yet regulate we must . . . for this type of irrigation will grow by leaps and bounds in counties such as Wayne where streams are few and surface water at a minimum.

Regulation is further complicated by the amounts of water a farmer will require to give life and growth to his crops. If two or more farms are served by the same underground stream how do we establish a just regulation of the use of this unseen water.

In some areas the regulation will take care of itself—the cost will prohibit use of irrigation wells. In others there will be no adequate source of water available.

Yet even with many farms employing contour farming, terracing and other efficient methods of soil and water conservation, continued use of irrigation wells will result in lower water tables.

Then, in dry years, the bottom land which has always raised good crops in drought times will find itself short of moisture. The next step, then, is irrigation for bottom land.

The need for some type of regulation is apparent. Without controls the problem will multiply itself until no solution can be reached.

We presume that there are few, if any, existing patterns for such legislation. The first laws will have to be trial methods that may require revision. As time goes on we can alter controls and gradually evolve fair, workable and enforceable laws.

Lincoln. The Legislature stepped up its pace this week, after a slow three-week start. A factor in the speedy pace is the approaching Monday deadline on the introduction of bills by individual members.

Checks showed all along that more bills had been drafted than for the 1955 session. Bill Drafter Jack Wilson said, at one-point requests were up 40 percent from a similar period two years ago.

But members were hanging on to them the first three weeks. Although introductions were still ahead of a similar period in 1955, they still were not up with the number of bills drafted. A virtual flood of measures is expected to go into the legislative hopper the last two days of the bill introduction period.

Seventy-three bills were set for public hearing this week, the highest total so far. This produced one of the busiest periods for the lawmakers since they began.

More than 150 bills were introduced on the last day of the bill introduction deadline in 1955.

Observers feel unless the bill introduction of committees takes a toll on the number of bills introduced, they may well be a session of record length and include a record number of bills introduced.

The committee system arranged for a session to meet Monday and one more was added. The move was designed to produce a faster pace. Much of the session time is assigned to public hearings.

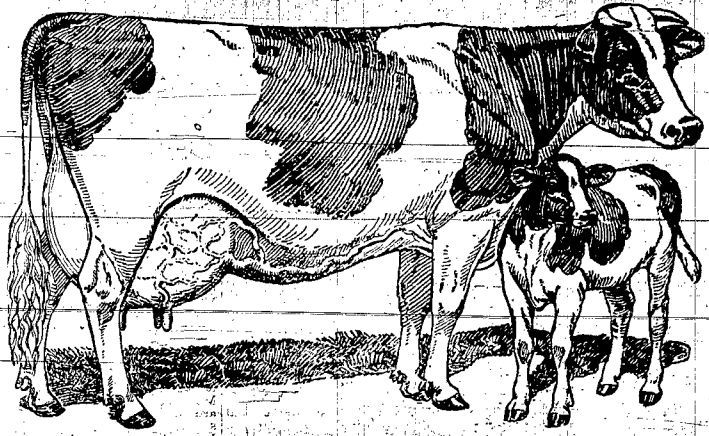

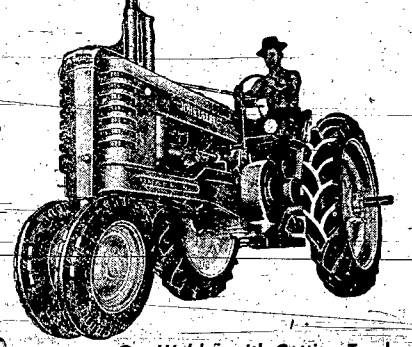
