

County Gets Increased Soil Bank Fund Allocation for '57

ASC Head Cites Details Of Program

Wayne county's 1957 soil bank acreage reserve fund allocation is approximately \$25,000 over the total 1956 payments, County ASC chairman Owen Jenkins announced today.

Wayne county has been allocated \$27,860 as compared with total payments of \$25,292 in 1956.

The table below lists the 1957 allotment and the 1956 payments for other NE Nebraska counties.

County allocations were determined by multiplying the 1957 corn allotment acres by the 1957 compensation per acre rate, Jenkins said. Totals were then factored down to equal 90 percent of the state allocation of \$16,000,000.

Per-acre rates for each individual county farm will be mailed to farmers sometime next week along with letters explaining details of 1957 acreage and conservation reserve regulations.

The chairman added that if all requests to participate in the 1957 acreage reserve exceed the county fund allocation, the county committee will approve agreements on a "first come—first served" basis.

Corn producers who decide to participate in the acreage reserve in 1957 can place a maximum of 20 acres or 30 percent of their 1957 corn allotment, whichever is larger, in the reserve.

They may request to participate with additional acreage above this maximum and such acreage will be accepted if funds are available after the signing deadline of March 8.

Jenkins cited the following facts concerning the 1957 program which producers should know:

1. Acreage reserve agreements must be signed between Feb. 11 and Mar. 8 at the county ASC office. Farm operators will have until Apr. 8 to secure their landlord's signature where he is not available to sign the agreement.
2. The division of payment between a landlord and tenant must be agreed upon by them before the agreement is executed. This agreement must be fair and equitable or the county committee cannot approve it.
3. The acreage reserve agreement is a binding contract which ends Dec. 31, 1957 and cannot be cancelled by the farmer after Mar. 8.
4. The field or fields to be designated as the corn acreage reserve must be cropland and must be definitely located before the agreement is signed and cannot be changed after Mar. 8.
5. It is requested that a sketch map of the farm be prepared showing the location of the corn acreage reserve before filing the agreement at the county ASC office.
6. If the corn acreage reserve is to be part of a field, it will be necessary for the farmer to furnish measurements of the area to be designated.
7. The acreage designated must

7. For any acreage designated in the acreage reserve for 1957 and re-designated in 1958 and 1959, the per-acre payment rate for those years will be increased by 10 percent.

8. No crop can be harvested from the designated acreage reserve for any year it is grazed after the agreement is signed. Only exception is approval for grazing because of severe drought conditions in 1957.

9. The acreage reserve may be planted to a cover crop of any legume or grass. It may already be planted to wheat or rye or may be planted to oats or barley provided such crops are mowed or plowed under by June 15. It may also be planted to sudan or forage sorghums provided these crops are mowed or plowed under by Sept. 15.

10. Any noxious weeds growing on the acreage reserve must be prevented from spreading by spraying or equivalent measures.

11. ACP cost-sharing may be requested for any approved conservation measure the farmer desires to carry out on the acreage reserve.

12. Farmers may not harvest an acreage of corn in excess of their allotment minus the number of acres put in the acreage reserve. If the farmer accidentally exceeds this permitted acreage, he will be permitted to dispose of the excess by July 31.

13. Farmers will forfeit their entire payment and will be subject to an additional civil penalty equal to 50 percent of the payment if they harvest more than the permitted acreage or harvest or graze the acreage reserve.

14. Farmers will also forfeit their entire payment if they harvest an acreage in excess of the wheat acreage allotment or 15 acres on the farm.

15. The permitted corn acreage or the acreage reserve may not be transferred from one farm to another.

16. Farmers can participate in the program on one farm in which they have an interest and not on other farms.

17. Any acreage put in the acreage reserve will be considered as corn for the purpose of establishing future allotments for the farm.

State Group Gives Okay

Wayne county officials were still awaiting word Wednesday approval of the designation of Wayne county as a drought disaster area.

Nine Nebraska counties were recommended for this designation by the State Drought committee Tuesday. They were Cheyenne, Dodge, Pierce, Dakota, Frontier, Thurston, Adams, Boyd and Wayne.

ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins told The Herald Wednesday morning that the news had been sent to Sen. Richard Huska and Rep. Bob Harrison urging them to expedite approval of the county designation.

Recommendation for Wayne county as designation for a disaster area followed a meeting of county officials with Wilfred Johnson, Clyde Nevejs and Ralph Galt, members of the state committee, here Friday.

Application to have the county designated as a disaster area was made by a county committee Tuesday but no action had been forthcoming. Cedar, Dixon, Madison and Stanton counties are already participating in the program.

Basically the emergency feed program provides government aid in purchasing feed for milk cows, herd foundation cattle and ewes. There is no provision for chickens or hogs. The government pays \$1.50 per hundredweight on corn, oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums.

If the county is declared a disaster area, farmers will make application to the County FIA committee and receive a list of eligible livestock and the feed supplies they have on hand.

If the application is approved the committee issues the farmer a purchase order for a specified number of bushels of feed. The farmer then orders this order at the county ASC office.

The ASC then issues a negotiable certificate which the farmer can use to purchase feed from any authorized dealer or warehouseman.

Church Building Permit Issued by City Council

Wayne's city council Tuesday night approved a building permit for the Assembly of God church to erect a new building in McPherson's addition near the end of East Ninth street.

The permit application called for a \$10,000 concrete block structure with built-up roof. No anticipated starting date for construction was given.

At another meeting earlier, the council had received a petition from 23 residents of new additions at the east side of the city asking that such a permit be denied. They urged the area be restricted to residential buildings.

In approving the permit application, the council agreed unanimously that any possible zoning measures instituted by the city could not restrict the erection of churches in any area.

In other action Tuesday the council approved a lease on the airport with Dan Johnson. The new agreement allows Johnson to farm unused portions of the airport with the city receiving half of an acre as rental.

City Attorney Duird Bornhoff was instructed to determine legal factors which could be used in determining assessments on an extension of sanitary sewers on the east side of the city south of Seventh street.

The council wanted to know whether the two new building additions could be forced to share part of the cost because of benefits received.

One other building permit was issued. That went to Dale Flowerday for a \$12,000 residence at 513 Hillcrest Road.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Back Scratching and Taxes

It is paradoxical that each time a legislative body meets there is talk of reducing expenses but each time the smoke settles expenses (and taxes) have shown a definite increase.

Pick any elected representative, ask him about his feelings on taxes and he'll say he is definitely against any further levy. Then follow his voting record during the session and see just how many times he will support a bill that increases taxes. More often than not he will vote for measures that increase costs of government.

The reasons are obvious. First, very few persons follow the voting record of their representatives so they are reasonably immune

to public reaction on the basis of their day-to-day voting in the session.

Second, politics is a game of back-scratching and the non-scratcher can accomplish little.

To get support for any one bill the author usually has to help someone else get his pet legislation through. It is a simple matter of trading votes or other favors.

For this reason many legislators vote for measures they would rather see defeated. For this reason, also, much legislation is passed that would be better relegated to the wastebasket.

For this reason, then, it is wise to watch bills that are introduced—and let your representative know your feelings FOR OR AGAINST the measure.

With Your County Agent

Sentiment or Reality
There is an ever increasing clamor concerning the disappearing farmer. The build-up is such to make one feel that the sons of the soil have achieved some exalted status which would entitle them to retirement in green pastures like old Buck and Baldy.

Official figures are those concerning the percentage of total population on farms, 13 percent in 1933 and 10.3 percent in 1940. Actually there were at that time many people on farms in 1933 (depth of the depression) as in 1940.

The big exodus from farms came in the most prosperous period (1910-50) in history.

The County Agent
Wayne County Extension agents are employed jointly by the United States department of agriculture, the University of Nebraska and the Wayne County Extension Service. They are members of the faculty of the University of Nebraska.

The Federal law, enacted May 8,

1911, provides that extension work shall consist of the giving of instruction and practical demonstrations in agriculture and home economics to persons not attending college.

Under each month the local sponsoring group—Wayne County Extension Service—meets and consults with the county extension agents. Each county agent gives an oral and written report of his activities the past month. Included in this report are the plans for the coming month.

A detailed written statement of the office expenses is placed before this same group for approval. Included in these expenses are mileage and salary of extension agents, supplies, postage, phone, repairs, lights, equipment, rent and miscellaneous items.

If the above list of expenses is approved they are sent to the county extension supervisors who in turn instruct the county clerk and county treasurer to submit a warrant for payment of same.

Mail Road Repeal

Lincoln—A bill that will be of top interest to counties has been introduced in the Legislature. It would repeal the Schroeder mail route act under which counties get one cent of the tax on gasoline for graveling or otherwise improving the routes used by mail carriers.

Although the bill by Sen. Monroe Bixler, Harrison, went on away with the Schroeder Act, the counties would still get about the same revenue. But they would no longer have to spend the Schroeder funds on mail routes only. Turnover reports to the state are worry here. The money would go to the county general road fund.

In recent years the mail route act has been a bone of contention. There have been repeated reports in the statehouse of counties not following the law. There have been other reports of rapid advancement by some counties in surfacing their mail routes.

Tied in with the Schroeder repeal is a one-cent-per-gallon hike in the state gasoline tax. Bixler has both proposals in the same bill and says he wants to hold the measure back until he sees the outcome of other highway legislation pending in the Unicameral.

The objective of all the high-

way bills is to channel more money to the State Highway department so it can match increased amounts of Federal funds primarily for the interstate highway.

The problem of matching Federal road funds will be even bigger unless the counties and cities step up the rate of matching U.S. government money for their secondary highways.

State Engineer L. N. Ress said he doubts the cities and counties will be able to take up much of the slack and under the present revenue structure, Nebraska can't meet the Federal "tax." If the state does not match the money, Ress said it will go to other states.

Beaver Hustles
The speaker of the Legislature, Sen. John Beaver, is a key man in the speed with which committees are handling bills introduced. Beaver constantly checks with committee chairmen to find those bills which are taking action on bills already aired at public hearings or to get more set for hearing.

Forty-nine measures, including those pertaining to the controversial sales tax, were on the hearing docket this week.

Budget Committee
There's one report coming from every state agency that appears before the Legislature's budget committee to explain its request for funds for 1957-59.

The committee is about the "toughest" the state officials have encountered in recent sessions.

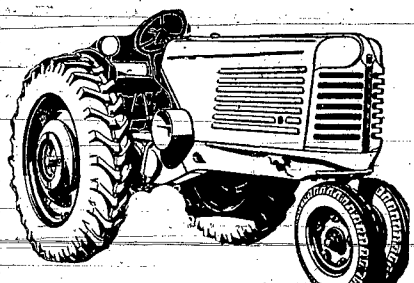

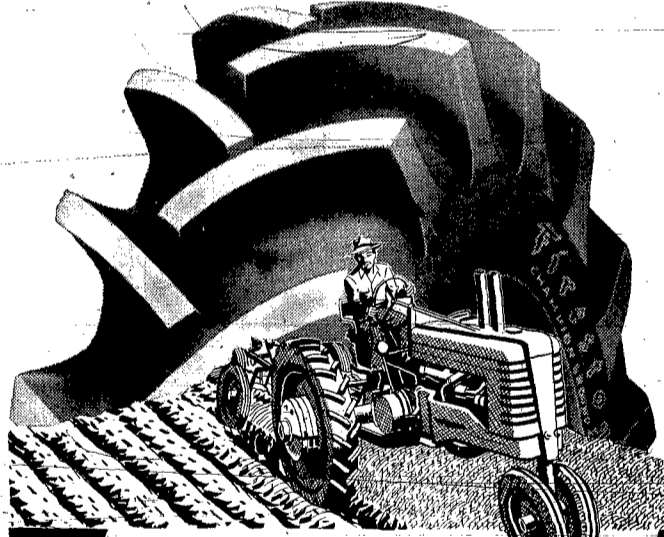
