**Outlook Highlights** 

For 1957

Business

Another boom year seems indicated for 1957. War scare is giving a boost to an already strong domestic demand for goods and services both for business expansion and for consumption as consumers and businessmen step up their buying for fear of shortages, and higher prices. This will mean higher prices, higher wages and more inflation in 1957. Higher interest rates will restrict some borrowing and encourage additional saving. Business activity in Nebraska has held up surprisingly well despite another dry year and would improve considerably with better crops in our dry-land farming areas.

Government

Spending at all levels of government will continue upward in 1957. This nation will provide more aid to Western Europe and to Middle Eastern nations to prevent economic troubles and human misery from arising out of the Suez situation. Our growing population and expanding economy requite more highways, streets, water and sewage systems, schools, parks, playgrounds, and other services and facilities which must be provided by our local, state and federal governments. Any hape of tax cuts has faded. Completely out of the economic and political picture for 1957. The monetary-fiscal policies of our federal government will be directed toward preventing the boom from getting out of hand. The farm program will be revised again.

Agriculture

The worst of cost-price squeeze on farmers' net income appears to be over and stability at present levels seems likely. Prices teceived for livestock products will be a little higher-but-will be largely offset by higher farm costs. The outlook for hogs next-year-is fairly good but not favorable enough for much expansion in Nebraska. Cattle prices will not improventil late winter, after feed-lots become less populated, but prices will still be higher than last winter. 1957, should be a better year for poultry. Irrigation will continue to expand in Nebraska. The farm-to-city movement will continue as Nebraska farm people adjust to drouth and economic conditions.

# Adjusting Nebraska Farm Operations To 1957 Conditions

EXPENDITURES FOR TAXES, interest, labor and EXPENDITURES FOR TAXES, interest, labor and machinery costs are important items in the cost structure of Nebrasila farms. It is significant that increases are expected for each of these items in the year 1957. Consequently, assolute reductions in the costs of operation will be difficult to achieve. This means increasing economic pressure of those farms where practices resulting in off-setting efficiencies cannot be readily adopted.

setting efficiencies cannot be readily adopted.

DRYLAND OPERATORS will find it more difficult to make the necessary adjustments than irrigated farmers. In many instances, costs per unit of author (the real concern of farm operators) can be reduced an irrigated farms by using more seed and more fertilizer, both of which are relatively cheap as compared to other cost factors. Production frequently can be increased sufficiently to more than make up for the increased cost. In such instances, an INCREASE in total expenditures actually results in a greater net income.

DRYLAND FARMERS, on the other hand, find them-belies seylerely limited from the standpoint of expanding production in an effort to reduce costs per unit of output. The scarcity of land, more stringent acreage controls and The scarcity of land, more stringent acreage controls and prospects for another dry spring are limiting factors in this respect. Under <u>such circumstances</u>, other means of reducing costs need to be considered.

CAREFUL PLANNING and timely operations can sometimes save one or more operations. Operations can sometimes be doubled up, thereby reducing the costs per acre. Investment in buildings and machinery may need to be postponed A repair job may be much cheaper in the short run than investing in the new—or even the used machine!

Therefore, anything received over and above the cash costs involved (gas, oil, hired labor, extra repairs) reduces the overhead or fixed costs for the operations at home. Careneeds to be exercised, however, to be sure that doing custom work doesn't interfere with operations at home to the point that poorly timed work results in higher costs and or lovered production.

UNDER DRYLAND CONDITIONS, rates of planting may need to be reduced for grain crops. Fewer plants per acre-can mean the difference between a crop failure and a fair yield. Four pecks of oats, 5 pounds of corn or 2 to 3 pounds milo per acre may yield more grain than heavier rates of seeding. In years of scarce moisture, the use of good seed is especially important.

IF NEW LEGUME SEEDINGS are customarily seeded with a nurse crop in the spring, consideration might be given to either spring seeding without a nurse crop or fall seeding in late August or early September on summer fallowed and Weed control both before and after seeding is especially important during years with limited mois-ture.

FEED SUPPLIES NEED to be balanced against live-stock numbers. If feed is short, herds may have to be cull-ed. Purchasing feed for low producing or otherwise unde-sirable animals is likely to be unprofitable. Net incomes will be higher if feed supplies are kept and fed to fewer, higher producing animals than if they are stretched for for in attempting to hold the entire herd together. Rates of production, health, age, unsoundness, disposition, and-type are factors to consider in cullings.

PASTURES WENT INTO THE FALL of 1956 in generally poor condition. Unless winter and spring precipitation is above normal, carrying capacities are not likely to be up-to-normal in 1957. Cankequently, it will be necessary to either reduce investock numbers or make use of temporary postures such as Piper or Wheeler Sudan. The year 1957 may be a good time to resept land which is currently in cultivation but which consistently fails to produce profitable yields. The Conservation Reserve offers an opportunity to regrass such land with a minimum cost to the owner.

UNLESS MOISTURE CONDITIONS IMPROVE, par licipation in the Acreage Reserve may offer an attractive alternative to dylamd operators in place of corn. # Grain Sorghums

GRAIN SORGHUM PRODUCTION in Nebraska increased almost 38 percent from last year to a total of almost 10.9 million bushels. The average yield of 12 bushels per acre is only about half of the average, but production is almost three times the average because of increased acreis offly about natt or the average, ..., remost three times the average because of increased acreage, Much of the grain sorghum was produced in irrigated areas of Nebraska. The crop in dryland areas was spotted and much of it did not produce grain.

FARMERS SHOULD KEEP IN MIND that tests over FARMERS SHOULD KEP IN MIND that, tests over a long period of time show that grain sorghum will-out-yield corn in low rainfall areas and in other areas in years of low tainfall. The development of new hybrid-sorghums within the lost few years makes the production of grain sorghum much more attractive. Experiments concerning a comparison of yields of new and old varieties, have not been conducted but yields have been materially increased. Also, the feeding value of grain sorghum is very similar to corn on per pound basis.

EQUIVALENT PRICES of grain sorghum when the price of corn per bushel is:\$1.30 shows that grain sorghum is worth \$2.33 per cwt, for dairy cows and fattering lambs \$2.14 for fattering cattle and \$2.09 far hogs. When corr is worth \$1.40 per bushel, grain sorghum is worth \$2.51 per cwt. for dairy cows and fattening lambs, \$2.31 for fattering state and \$2.35 for hose. per cwt. for dairy cows and fatter tening cattle and \$2,25 for hogs.
