Two Wayne Men Die in Auto Accidents During Past Week

Separate auto accidents claimed the lives of two Wayne men this week. The dead were Norman Willers, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Willers, and Marshall Dale Marple, 24, son of Mrs. Mabel Marple.

Willers was killed in a one-car accident about 10:30 p. m. last Wednesday on a curve two miles east of Clearwater on Highway 275. Marple died and his brother-in-law, Harlan Klunder, Denver, was seriously injured in a crash near Denver Saturday night.

Funeral services for Willers were held Saturday afternoon at Redeemer Lutheran church. Rites for Marple are planned at 2 p. m. today at St. Paul's Lutheran church.

Antelope County Sheriff Lawrence Ritscher, Neligh, reported Willers apparently lost control of the car on the curve while driving east. The car skidded and rolled over. Marple was thrown out of the vehicle, striking a rock. Klunder is in a Denver hospital. Rev. Robert Shirck will officiate at services today. Burial will be in Greenwood cemetery. Pallbearers are Gordon and Bob Nelson, Wayne; Dean Nelson, Denver; Charles Murphy, Fremont; John Kay, Jr. and Dick Powers.

Marple was killed when the car in which he was riding went out of control, swerved to avoid collision with an oncoming car and rolled over. Marple was thrown out of the vehicle, striking a rock. Norman Louis Willers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Willers, was born Aug. 29, 1932 in Pilger. He was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith at St. Peter's church, Pilger. He remained a member of that church until the time of his death.

He graduated from Pilger high school in 1950, served with the Navy four years and received his discharge Oct. 13, 1955. He married Carolyn Sue Giltner at Corpus Christi, Tex., Jan. 7, 1954. One son, Harlan Louis, was born to them. He had been working in the O'Neill area for a feed company at the time of his death. Survivors include his son, Harlan; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Willers; one sister, Karen, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Willers and Mrs. Emma Woehler, Pilger.

Farmers Flood ASC Office As Soil Bank Signup Starts

2,550 Acres Banked; Pay \$80,000

Signup for the 1957 soil bank program started with a busy County ASC Chairman announced Wednesday morning. The signup started Monday.

Totals at closing time Tuesday showed 130 agreements had been signed calling for payments of about \$80,000. The agreements cover approximately 2,550 acres. Farmers still jammed the ASC office at press time Wednesday.

Wayne county has been allotted about \$275,000 for acreage reserve payments during 1957. This compares with about \$250,000 for 1956. Jenkins added that if all requests to participate in the 1957 acreage reserve exceed the county allocation, the county committee will approve agreements on a "first come, first served" basis. Deadline for signing agreements is Mar. 8.

Corn producers who decided to participate in the acreage reserve must place a maximum of 20 acres or 20 percent of their 1957 corn allotment, whichever is larger, in the reserve.

They may request to participate with additional acreage above this maximum and such acreage will be accepted if funds are available after the Mar. 8 signup deadline. The field or fields to be designated as corn acreage reserve must be cropland and must definitely be located before the agreement is signed as it cannot be changed after Mar. 8.

The acreage designated must be comparable to the average, corn land on the farm. If the farmer desires to designate poorer land his present rate will be adjusted downward. The county committee may inspect the land before they approve the agreement.

10 Percent Increase
For any acreage designated in the acreage reserve for 1957 and redesignated in 1958 and 1959, the per-acre payment rate for those years will be increased by 10 percent.

No crop can be harvested from the designated acreage reserve nor can it be grazed after the agreement is signed. Only exceptions are if the secretary of agriculture gives approval for grazing because of severe drought conditions in 1957.

The acreage reserve may be planted to corn, soybean, alfalfa, clover or grass. It may also be planted to Sudan or forage sorghums provided these crops are mowed or plowed under by Sept. 15.

Farmers can participate in the program on one farm in which they have an interest and put on other farms. Any acreage put in the acreage reserve will be considered as corn for the purpose of establishing future allotments for the farm.

Acreage-reserve agreements are binding until Dec. 31, 1957, and can be canceled by the farmer after Mar. 8.

Committee Defers Action On Bill to Increase Tuition

Action on a bill which would increase tuition at WSTC and other state teachers colleges was held up Tuesday following public hearings on the proposal before the Legislature's education committee.

Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, was the lone supporter of the measure, LB 400. Opponents said the bill would cause hardships and would not solve the problems of students preparing for college educations.

University of Nebraska Chancellor Clifford Hardin questioned if the "long standing and respected" tradition of the Board of Regents holding the power to set tuition rates "should be changed."

A similar question was asked by State Normal Board President Bruce Hagemeister. He said the board and state teachers colleges were "very concerned" over this possible change. He added, "We shouldn't keep the heads of students not being prepared for college educations."

Under terms of the bill, WSTC students would pay \$120 per semester as opposed to \$90 tuition at present. Non-residence fees would increase from \$20 to \$240.

An opponent to the bill Tuesday was George Tubbs, South Sioux City, who said "20 percent of the kids didn't go to college because they couldn't afford it. He added, "We shouldn't keep the kids out of school and get no reason, to drive them from Nebraska."

The committee is expected to act on the bill with the return of Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, who was absent from the hearings Tuesday.



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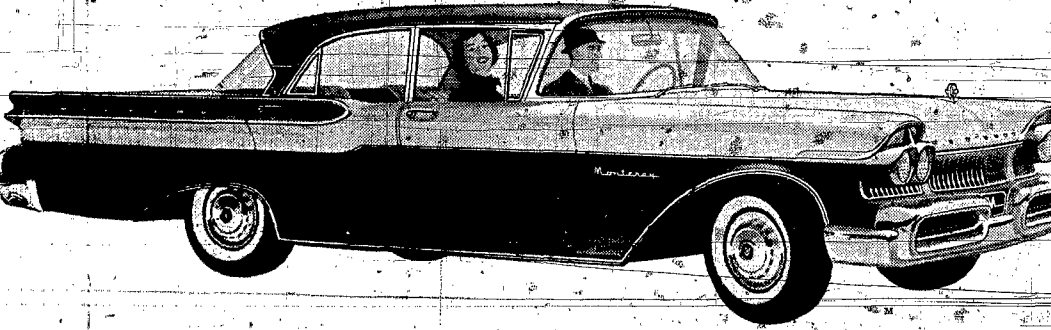

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

Let's Change

An increasing number of editors and law enforcement agencies are endorsing the trend to publish names of juveniles who become entangled with the law.

Just recently J. Edgar Hoover commented that the practice of not publishing such names was a contributing factor in the increase of juvenile delinquency. The glare of publicity, he pointed out, is one of the chief deterrents of crime.

Crime thrives on secrecy. Guilt is nurtured by secrecy. Immorality requires secrecy. Take away the shield of secrecy . . . publish the names and watch the crime rate drop.

As one law publisher put it:

"I fear we're coddling those guilty of"

casual misdemeanors so much that we give them encouragement to venture farther astray, feeling confident they will not encounter unfavorable publicity in so doing."

That's putting it mildly. We've been threatened with a punch in the nose for printing names of persons involved in misdemeanors . . . by persons who previously have had their names withheld from publication because they were minors.

If publicity hurts that much, let's give them publicity and plenty of it. Perhaps it seems tough, too tough, but the average youngster out on a prank thinks seldom of the consequences of the act. Inherently he dreads disclosure or publicity probably as much as he fears confinement. No doubt he fears publicity much more than he does a fine.

Specialist Warns Against Buying of Sorghum Alnum

C. Swinbank, crops specialist at the college of agriculture, warns "don't buy sorghum alnum". He says it is being sold at high prices and could become a serious weed pest.

The plant originated in Argentina as a hybrid between sorghum and Johnson grass. It is also known as sorgho negro, sudan negro and Columbus grass. Sudan grass is far superior for both grazing and hay in this area.

Corn, Beans and Oats

Dry weather in the cornbelt has reduced corn boiter damage in recent seasons. However the potential is still serious as indicated by last fall's survey.

The count in Wayne county (287 per 100 stalks) was among the highest in the state.

Capitol News . . .

Anderson's Hard Tack Budget Top Interest in Legislature

Lincoln, Feb. 10. Gov. Victor Anderson's "hard tack" budget is becoming more and more the center of attention in the Legislature on the governor's budget and how responsible the chief executive is for it.

By custom the governor, early in each session of the lawmaking body, submits his recommendations for state spending for the next two year period. After the governor's recommendations are made, he loses control of the budget and whether it is lowered or increased is up to the Legislature.

The problem came into sharp focus last week when Sen. Carpenter, Scottsbluff, was successful in an unprecedented vote by the Legislature, in forcing the budget out of committee.

After an hour of wrangling during which the governor's recommendations committee tried to resign, the lawmakers reversed themselves and left the budget with the committee.

The committee holds hearings most of the legislative session, then comes to the floor for debate, just the way the governor presented it without public hearings. This should be done, Carpenter argued, so the governor would be more responsible for his recommendations.

Gov. Anderson said that he cannot anticipate before a legislative session what bills will be introduced to either lower or increase his budget.

The two schools of thought in the governor and his relationship to the budget are:

That the governor's recommendations are merely a framework from which the legislators should proceed.

That the governor should be held accountable for increase in budget which are caused by legislation.

In past years, the governor's budget has been a starting point for lawmakers and always has been increased by the senators. This comes about through legislation that would require state appropriations.

But this session senators are keenly aware of the economy of the state and are generally more skittish about being placed in a position of going above the governor's recommendations, even though this has been done in the past.

The budget committee, headed by Sen. Karl Vogel, Omaha, has been working at a fast clip to get the budget in shape as soon as possible. The legislature is a third of the way through public hearings on requests of state agencies. Vogel said "substantial" reductions have been made from the governor's "hold the line" budget so far.

The governor commented on the floor discussion of his budget that last week was touched off by the Carpenter maneuver. Gov. Anderson said the discussion "proves the legislature is more conservative and wants to hold the line." And, the chief executive said he has "high regard" for the budget committee.

National Guard

The rickety between the Defense department in Washington and the National Guard has not escaped the scrutiny of the Nebraska Legislature.

A statement by Secretary of Defense Wilson stated the year. He said the Guard has been a haven for draft dodgers. Another bone of contention is an order that would require all guardsmen recruits to take six months of active duty.

A resolution was passed by the Legislature 35-1 that said the Nebraska lawmakers view "with alarm and disapproval" Defense department policies relating to the Guard.

Then came a report from Washington stating that guardsmen "bunked" field tests when put up against regular army personnel. This drew fire from Maj. Gen. Gus Hoenigert, commander of the Nebraska Guard.

Hoenigert said Nebraska's new Secretary of the committee is a 24-year-old and several others satisfactory during an inspection by all of regular army officers.
