


Blue Devils Cop Husker Playoff Thursday

County Assessment to Start Friday; Assistants' Meet Set

Apr. 20 Final Deadline for Schedules

Wayne county's 1957 assessment will get underway Friday. County Assessor Henry App said this week. Fourteen assistant assessors will take to the field to call at individual farms, homes and businesses.

Assessing will be done in the same manner as 1956. It is expected to be completed by Apr. 20. Taxpayers need not report for assessment unless they have not been contacted by an assistant assessor by the Apr. 20 deadline.

Valuation figures obtained on assessment schedules will be reduced 50 percent to conform with Nebraska law which calls for half the actual value as the basis for taxes.

There are detailed depreciation schedules for farm machinery and household goods. Assistant assessors will meet at the court house today to study these schedules and discuss assessment procedures and changes.

Basically most valuations used for farm livestock and crops will be about the same as a year ago. The table below gives a comparison of full values for 1957 and 1956.

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\$60,000 Balance Remains in County's Soil Bank Allocation

Farmers Ask \$114,000 for Extra Acres

Only about \$60,000 remains of Wayne county's fund allocation for 1957 soil bank acreage reserve payments, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins announced Wednesday.

Totals Tuesday night showed 358 agreements had been signed covering about 6,800 acres. Payments for these banked acres would amount to about \$218,000. The county allocation was \$278,000.

Deadline for sign up in the acreage reserve is Mar. 8. Jenkins added that if applications to participate in the acreage reserve exceed the allocation, the county committee will approve agreements on a "first come-first served" basis.

Corn producers can place a maximum of 20 acres or 30 percent of their 1957 corn allotment, whichever is larger, in the acreage reserve.

Additional acreages over this maximum will be allowed, Jenkins said, if the county fund allocation is not exhausted by the Mar. 8 deadline or if additional funds are released for the county.

County farmers have already placed about 3,400 acres above these maximums if funds are not exhausted. Payments for these added acres would total about \$114,000, making total acreage reserve payments in the county about \$332,000.

Jenkins said ASC reports started inspection of designated acreage reserves on individual farms Friday.

Sign up for the conservation reserve portion of the soil bank will start as soon as the loan for acreage reserves slackens. This portion provides for payments of \$11 per acre. Conservation reserve agreements cover periods ranging from three to 15 years.

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Eligible Farmers Will Get \$1.50 Feed Grain Subsidy

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County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins received word Monday morning of the designation. Only a week earlier, Wayne and seven other NE Nebraska counties were rejected on the basis conditions in those counties did not meet minimum standards established for eligibility for the program. Pierce county was another of those rejected which received approval this week.

Designation as a drouth area will allow county farmers who prove eligibility to purchase corn, oats, barley and grain sorghums at \$1.50 per hundredweight reduced price when it is used to feed normal dairy herds, herd foundation cattle and ewes. There is no provision for chickens or hogs.

County FHA Supervisor Lawrence Fuchs said applications for emergency feed are now being accepted at the Wayne ASC office. He added, however, that action by the county committee will be made on any applications until late next week after details of the county program are arranged.

The table below shows the cost of feeds under the drouth area designation with the \$1.50 per hundredweight paid by the U.S. government. Market prices are only approximated.

Monday Wayne and Pierce counties were declared eligible for emergency drought relief. Only a week previously the same counties were in a group of eight Nebraska counties rejected for the same benefits. Certainly nothing has happened in the intervening week to change the situation here.

The move seems to smack of political fence-mending... this sudden change of attitude by the USDA. It might even be considered using the farmer's plight as a political football.

It has been an excellent opportunity for Rep. Bob Harrison, Norfolk, to bolster his shaky political strength. The Norfolk Republican barely squeaked through with a November election victory over Democrat Larry Brock, Wakefield. Only a strong mail vote turned the tide in favor of Harrison.

Although Harrison held a small majority in the final vote tally, he carried only 11 counties of the Third district as compared to 13 for Brock. Since then NE Nebraska Republicans have been wondering what to do with such a weak candidate. Brock's strong showing in a traditionally Republican district told the knell of Harrison's Congressional career. The on-again-off-again drought relief decision appears a move to appease Harrison to the voters who rejected him last fall.

Republican leaders have two years to come up with a suitable candidate. Merle Haynes, South Sioux City, has announced his intentions to again seek the post. This is no solution for Republican leaders since area voters soundly rejected him in last year's primary race with Harrison.

That's a problem for Republicans. It's not one they should try to solve by using the farmer's plight to score political touchdowns.

Small Quail Causes Uproar In Legislature's Investigation

Statehouse Correspondent Lincoln: A quail was shot in a legislative investigation has been the talk of the statehouse and in much of Nebraska. It is, of course, the quail involved in the furor over a hunting trip near Tecumseh on Johnson county land, Nov. 21, 1955, in which Game Commissioner Dan Robertson, North Platte, participated.

In chronological order, here's how the events occurred: May 3, 1956 a charge of shooting a game bird from a public highway was filed against Robertson in Johnson county, Warden Harland Hippert, Falls City, lodged the complaint. July 6, 1956, the complaint was ordered dismissed by Commission Director Mel Steen. Then came the fireworks. Robertson's New York "fix" was on. Others circulated that the fixing was the result of an internal fight within the game commission itself. The Legislature convened, took up the case and named a special investigating committee. Before the senators convened in regular session, a Legislative council committee studied the matter, said Steen was justified in ordering the complaint withdrawn, but asked Robertson to resign. The game commissioner declined. So, last week, the special committee headed by Sen. Donald McGinley, Ogallala, held three days of public hearings on the matter. In a nutshell, here are the arguments of both sides: Robertson contended he did not

shoot the bird from the middle of the road as claimed by Hippert, but did so "10 to 15 feet" back of the road surface. Steen at the time he ordered the dismissal he felt he was justified, but because of the controversy that developed, he now thinks he should have let the court decide the matter. John Crump Attorney Raymond Morrissey testified he did not have sufficient evidence for a conviction in that one witness to the alleged incident was dead and another changed his story and now says he did not see Robertson actually shoot the quail. The attorney said game commission officials did not tell him a commissioner was involved and thus "tricked" him. Hippert's attorney claimed pressure was used on the witness and that Morrissey was a superior officer. Bill Cunningham, attorney for Hippert and Cunningham, represented George Dent, North Platte, Robertson's counsel, contended prejudice on the part of Cunningham against Robertson was involved in filing of the complaint and that Cunningham was not right about waiting several months to file the charge. Cunningham denied he had prejudice against Robertson. Robertson said he was ready to go to trial at all times and was "disappointed" when Steen had the complaint dismissed. Morrissey said he would not refile the complaint unless ordered to do so by the attorney general who testified he can not order a county attorney to take such action.

State Car Colors State-owned automobiles have always been subject of discussion, especially when money is mentioned. But the state gets them new at bargain rates. Now a bill has been signed into law by Gov. Victor Anderson that is designed to boost the re-sale price. The law previously restricted most state cars to black in color. Under a bill passed by the Legislature different colored vehicles may be ordered. Also reflected material may be used to designate the vehicles instead of white paint. State Purchasing Agent Tom Coffey says it is difficult to re-sell black cars because there is not too much demand for a vehicle of this color.

Tax Bills Action Legislators hurried this week to take positive action on bills that would affect taxpayers this year. Three measures were involved. One would provide a short cut to determine the taxable value of property. Another gives broad powers to the tax commissioner in prescribing how county assessors should go about valuing property for tax purposes. The third would require warehousemen to furnish county assessors with a list of goods stored in the warehouses and who owns it. Probably the two most important are the short-cut measure and that giving more power to the tax commissioner.

Under present law, property is assessed on a basic value formula. Basic value is determined through the formula and "taxation" is half that figure. This figures out at 35 percent of actual or "market" value. The law, as reported out of revenue committee, would strike any reference to "basic" in the present law and just say property should be taxed at 35 percent of its actual value. However, the formula would be retained under the committee's idea to help determine actual value. Gov. Victor Anderson and the state board of equalization have urged lawmakers to take whatever action deemed necessary as soon as possible. "This the governor said, should be done so taxpayers and assessors know what the law is on Mar. 1, when property is assessed."

Cultivation for wood control is a must for the first several years and is recommended throughout the growing period.

Fertility Requirements Sorghum and corn have about the same fertility requirements. For big yields, when moisture is adequate, both need large amounts of nitrogen. Sorghum is more responsive to phosphate or mixed fertilizers containing phosphate. Soil tests and the best method of finding the fertilizer needs of both sorghum and corn.

Bulk Milk Tanks It appears now that a majority of milk producers will be using bulk tanks within a few years. There are now more than 600 in use in the state. Most of these have been installed in the past two years. Marketing milk through bulk tanks will be discussed at a series
