

Blue Devils, Wayne Prep Cop Regional Tourney Titles

Plainview Falls 71-44 Here Friday

Wayne High's Blue Devils copied their fourth straight Class B regional tournament championship Friday night at the city auditorium by overwhelming Plainview's Pirates 71-44.

Wayne thus qualified for a playoff game with Madison at Norfolk last night. Winner of that tilt will represent NE-Nebraska in the state Class B tourney which opens in Lincoln next Thursday.

The Blue Devils opened Friday's championship game with a torrid 9-0 run over Creighton Thursday night. Plainview was pressed in the semi-finals by Pender but emerged a 54-48 victor.

With both teams cold from the floor, Wayne took a 15-6 lead in the first quarter against Plainview after trailing 6-5 with a little less than half the quarter remaining.

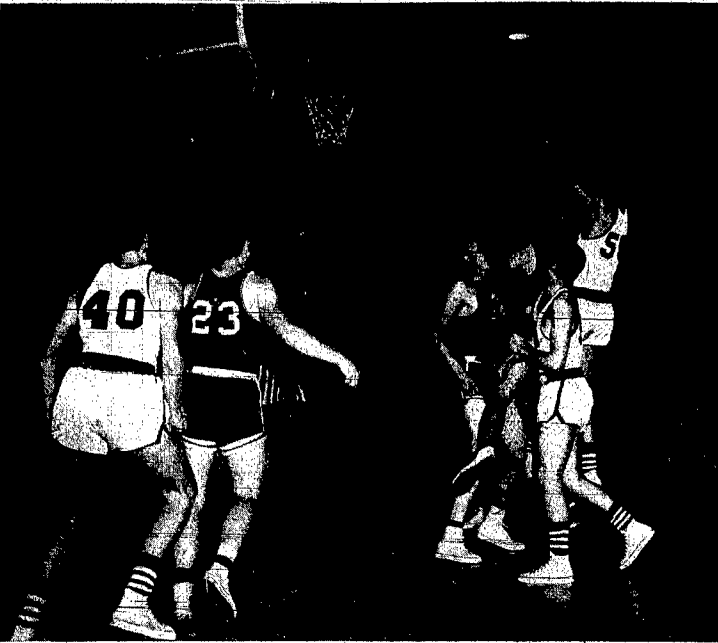
Both teams warmed slightly in the second quarter with Wayne extending its lead to 30-18 at half-time. Wayne held without a field goal in the first quarter, hit four quick baskets in this period. Three of them came after Plainview's Arlo Remmen was benched with four personal fouls.

Bob Patras kept Plainview in the game with a torrid third quarter that saw him drop five fielders. They were the only Pirate baskets in the quarter. Wayne led 50-30 entering the final eight minutes.

Dahl and Roger Denesia paced Wayne in the final quarter with three baskets each. Dahl left the game on fouls with a minute remaining.

Prep Upsets Waterbury Friday Night

Wayne Prep's Panthers, supposedly in the rebuilding process after heavy graduation losses, surprised the forecasters Friday night by winning the Class C regional title at Pierce.

A 36-34 upset win over Waterbury put Coach Frank Williams' Panthers in a four-team playoff which opened Tuesday night at Plainview. Prep was paired against a strong Center team which boasted a 26-1 record for the season.

Prior to the Waterbury game, Prep whipped Oakdale 60-53 in the semi-finals Thursday and Dakota City 45-41 in a first round game last Monday.

Prep took an early 8-2 lead against twice-beaten Waterbury and then cooled off. The losers led 11-8 after the opening period. Prep regained the lead in the second quarter but again fell back to trail 21-18 at intermission.

John Kessler started things rolling in the third quarter with two free throws to make it 21-20. From there on it was nip-and-tuck with neither team able to gain a big advantage. The count was knotted at 29-all after three quarters.

The victory came in the closing minutes of the quarter. Kessler and John Bernthal were the heroes on a double foul and Vince Magnuson, his replacement, dropped the free throw to give Prep a 35-34 lead. With 40 seconds left Robbie Myers hit another gift

points, well below his average of 30 for the season. Bernthal for the winners was Joe Johnson, who collected eight points in the final quarter.

Prep's last threat came with three minutes left. Center then held a 30-44 lead.

Coach Frank Williams' quint presented a balanced scoring attack with Gary Kingston's 12 points tops. John Bernthal and John Kessler added 11 apiece.

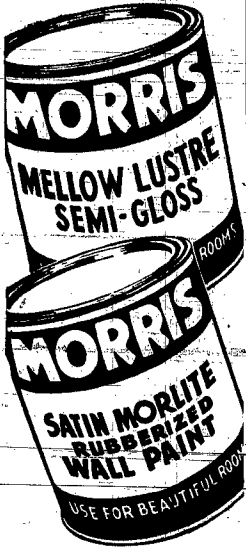

Wayne State Tips Kearney To Gain NAIAT Tournament

WSTC's Wildcats, Nebraska College conference champions, earned the District 11 berth in the Kansas City NAIAT tournament Tuesday night by downing Kearney in the second straight of a best-of-three series.

The Wildcats overcame Kearney leads in both halves Monday night to down the Antelopes 75-67. Tuesday night they overcame a 16-point Kearney margin and eked out an 83-82 overtime win.

Free throws provided the difference in both games. Kearney outshot Wayne 28-20 from the field Monday night and 32-25 Tuesday. However, Wayne dunked 35 of 46 gift tosses Monday and 33 of 46 Tuesday.

In Monday's game at Nebraska Wesleyan, Wayne surged in front midway in the second half and used a stall the last five minutes to insure the victory. Erik Radke was the top point getter with 25 points. Weford led Kearney with 23.

Kearney led until midway in the third period Tuesday night. The teams were knotted at 70-all when the regulation game ended. Larry Dahl led the scoring with 19 but Gerald Wisniewski followed closely with 18.

Wayne will go to Kansas City for the opening round of NAIAT play Monday. Pairings have not yet been announced.

Blue Devils Set Scoring Records

Wayne High's Blue Devils were the top scoring team in Class B regional tournaments throughout the state last week. This is the third straight year Wayne has topped the class.

Coach Harold Maciejewski's Blue Devils averaged 87 points in three games for a record 261 points. Wayne led with 245 last year and 224 in 1955.

Wayne's 93-point total margin of victory was also a record. Loup City compiled 87 a year ago.

Kenny Dahl was top Class B individual scorer with 81 points in three games. Bob Schwarzenbach was fourth in the state with 62. His 31 points against Creighton was the fourth best individual performance. Dahl's 30 against Pierce was fifth.
