EDITORIAL COMMENT

Congratulations Due . . .

Any resident of Wayne who was immune to basketball fever the past month was made of stone. The bouncing sphere was the main topic in nearly every conversation . . . and most thoughts. For perhaps the first time in history the three local schools had a championship simultaneously.

WSTC was NCC champion and Nebraska representative to the NAIA tourney at Kansas City. Wayne Prep was Class D regional champion and Husker conference champ in both divisions.

Although both high schools lost in district playoff feelings were high and followers elated at their favorite schools' showing.

Coaches, squads and fans of all three schools are worthy of sincere congratulations. Without any one of these three factors the championships would have been lost.

And, while championships in themselves are not of utmost importance, the winning of one does tend to cement together supporters of the school.

As the high schools dropped their playoff games, attention was focused on WSTC in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics at Kansas City and Wayne fans rooted for another winner and national fame.

The Pendulum . . .

Current scandals and rumors of vice—many of which probably are true—among labor unions through out a natural evolution of the labor union movement. Not that we condone the acts—we see the reasons for them—and many are traceable to business methods of bygone days.

Back in the sweatshop days of the last century, workmen were forced to toil 12, 16 or 18 hours a day for starvation wages. Business had the upper hand and clamped down mercilessly.

Then, as the labor movement began to grow, the balance of strength began to swing like a pendulum toward the other extreme. Laws prohibiting child employment and regulating hours of work in some industries came into effect.

Unions, flexing their muscles like young giants, found they had more power than they had ever dreamed . . . that they were in a position to bargain with business. Public sentiment and public laws backed unions.

Memories of sweatshop days were not forgotten either and unions revealed in their new found power. It was only natural that labor should move from one extreme to the other.

It is only natural, too, that men of low morals should find their way to power in such a condition. Rough, tough men were required to meet and match industry's methods in early days of union growth and the tradition carried on.

With so much power vested in the hands of a man with greater love for a fast buck than a fair shake, it was inevitable that graft and corruption should creep in.

Soon now the pendulum will start its backswing! Taking from unions some of their power, letting business have a little more to say about its operations. The right to work laws in many states are forerunners of this trend.

We think the day will come soon when a more proper balance will be restored between business and labor . . . and that will be a better day for the nation.

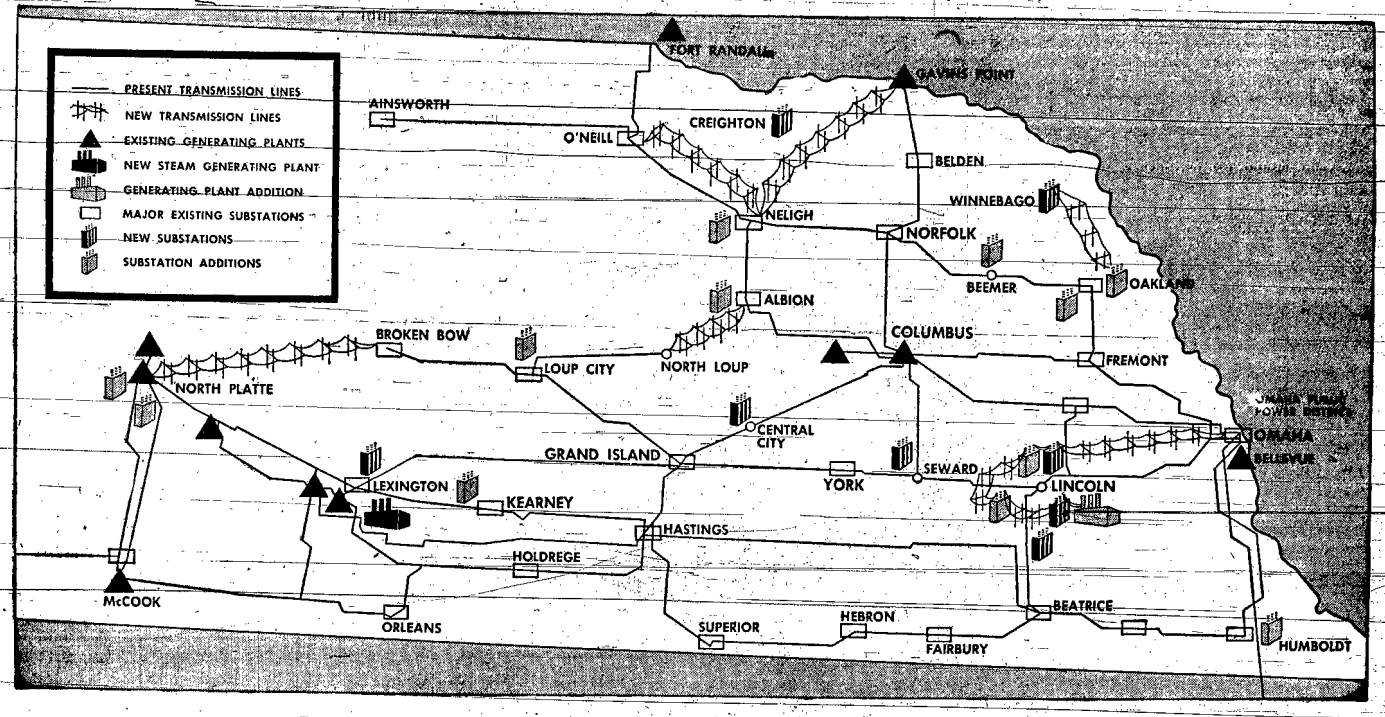
