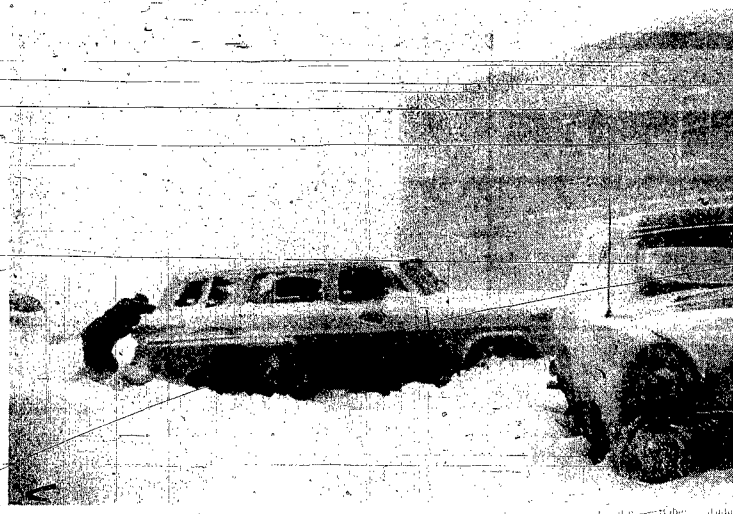


Heavy Snow Slows Auto Traffic

He received a certificate of honor in recognition of his faithfulness. He served as an elder in the church and on the past few years served in the honorary capacity of Elder Emeritus. Last year on Father's Day he was chosen by the congregation to be honored as "King Bear a Day" in the Bible school department. His brother, Dr. J. M. Packer, Ashland, died last June. Total May Reach Over \$400,000

About \$110,000 will be available to Wayne county farmers for soil bank acreage reserve payments, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins said Wednesday. This represents an increase of \$20,000 over the county's original total allocation of \$90,000. The increase was authorized this week by the State ASC committee. Jenkins said all farmers who requested to participate above the specified minimum in their original contracts will be allowed to do so. No other farmers will be allowed to bank additional acres. Original maximums were 20 acres or 30 percent of the 1957 corn allotment, whichever was less. Farmers who requested to be allowed to bank additional acres are now being notified by mail. They have 10 days in which to sign a modified soil bank contract at the ASC office, Jenkins said. If all farmers who ask for additional acres accept the new plan, approximately 12,700 acres will be placed in the acreage reserve in Wayne county in 1957. Payments for these banked acres would total about \$100,000. A total of 408 agreements were originally signed by local farmers. Twenty-six of those have been cancelled. These agreements banked 8,440 acres for payments totaling about \$269,000. About 4,300 additional acres for the reserve were requested by county farmers. With the new allotment, this would increase payments about \$110,000. A list of approved cover crops for tracts placed in the acreage reserve was released last week. They include all legumes, cereals, wheat, rye, oats, barley, sudan grass and forage sorghums. Grain sorghums are not approved. Wheat, oats, rye and barley planted or banked acres must be clipped or plowed under by June 15. Sudan grass and forage sorghums must be clipped by Sept. 15. There is a deposition date for legumes or grasses. Farmers must also keep the tracts free of noxious weeds.

Auto Mishaps Numerous as Storm Rages

Life giving moisture fell on NE Nebraska during the past week, bringing a total of 1.52 inches in two separate storms. Last Thursday's five-inch snowfall descended as a raging blizzard, plugging roads and piling drifts to 12-foot heights. Trainers were stranded at farm homes and in their cars as visibility dropped to zero at the storm's peak. Wreckers and tow trucks were busy Thursday night and Friday hauling in stranded vehicles and wrecked cars, many of which were abandoned in the roadways when they could go no further. Several accidents were direct results of Thursday's storm. Recieved minor injuries when he collided with a truck south of Wayne on Highway 15. The truck had slowed to aid a stalled motorist. In another accident, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Krause, Omaha, escaped injury when their car and a road maintainer collided about four miles south of Wayne. They were enroute to Wayne to visit Mrs. Krause's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Woods. A Norfolk-bound bus slid into the ditch south of Wayne and required a wrecker and a tractor to get back on the highway. The bus returned to Wayne for the night. Four cars were stalled in the middle of Highway 15 4 1/2 miles north of town. The five occupants stayed with the Percy Christiansen family until a patrol was able to open the road a little after midnight. About 14 miles south of Wayne two cars met head-on when snow obscured visibility. The cars were driven by Henry Ley and Don Debeck. School children were released early Thursday as the storm's intensity mounted and some classes were suspended Friday morning. The storm was welcomed by everyone, however, as it brought much-needed moisture to parched soil. High moisture content of the snow promised a better crop outlook to farmers and better business conditions throughout the northeast corner of the state. Following closely on the heels of Thursday's storm, mixed rain and snow started Sunday, accumulating to 1.12 inches before it stop-

County Shows Decrease in Population Since '54; One of 28 in State

Lincoln—Wayne was one of 28 Nebraska counties which showed a decrease in population last year compared with 1954, a survey in the March issue of Business in Nebraska revealed this week. The survey shows Wayne county had a population of 10,288 in 1954 and 10,237 in 1955. Population estimates for other NE Nebraska counties were: Cedar, 13,885 (15,551); Cuming, 13,059 (12,854); Dixon, 9,545 (9,125); Pierce, 9,955 (8,988); Stanton, 8,504 (6,256); and Thurston, 8,848 (8,538). The 1954 census figures are shown in parentheses.

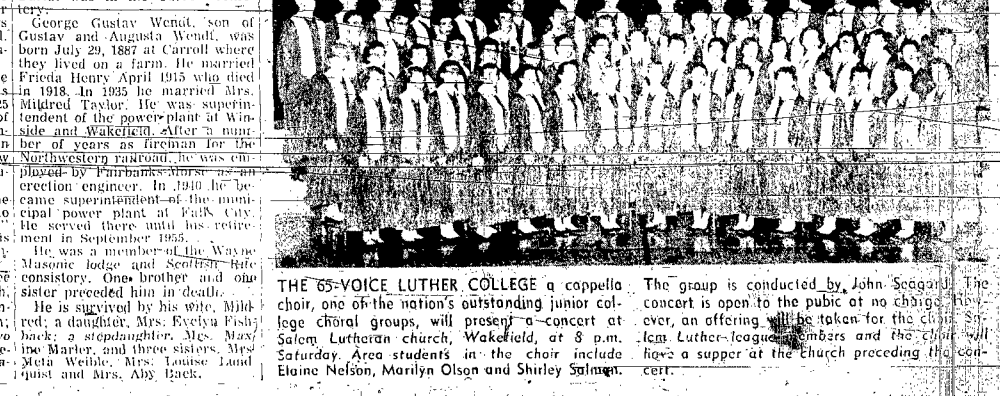
Home Agent Speaks At Wakefield Today

What's Ahead in Cattle Prices

Slightly higher average cattle prices and less seasonal price movement appear likely for fat cattle in 1957. This assumes no serious recession or sharp upturn in general business activity and feed production about as good as in 1956.

Demand for beef is expected to continue strong in 1957. Employment and consumers income will be high this year. Our consumers eat more meat when they are working steadily at good wages and salaries.



Beef consumption at 83.5 pounds set a new record equal to the long time average. Meat supplies per person will be slightly lower in 1957, around 157 pounds with about 3 pounds less of beef and of pork.

Fat cattle prices are expected to average a little higher over the year 1957 than last year. Prices this winter have been disappointing but are \$1.50 - \$2.00 higher than a year ago.

Cattle feeders over the nation had 4 percent more cattle on feed Jan. 1, 1957, than a year ago. Even in drouth-stricken Nebraska, there was an increase of 3 percent.

The summer price rise for good and choice fat cattle will be less than in 1956. More calves are on feed this year which means heavier marketings in the second half of the year.

The spring and summer pig crop may also be larger than 1956 because of the recent favorable market for slaughter pigs. This could bring market conditions this fall something like those in 1955, although not so serious.

Looking ahead to the 1957-58 feeding season, the supply of stockers and feeders coming to market next fall should be fairly large. A break in the drouth would mean fewer heifers as ranchers start to rebuild breeding herds.

Pig Production

Plans and Prices

Farmers in Nebraska and other Corn Belt States show signs of over-optimism regarding the outlook for hog production and profits in 1957. Recent high prices paid for bred gilts and sows and for boars indicates that an increase in late spring and summer farrowings is being planned by many hog producers in the Midwest.

Market hog prices have been considerably higher than a year earlier from mid-October on as shown by the average prices for selected weeks in Table 1. Note that the price was almost the same for the third week of September. From then on the spread widened to over \$6 in the first week of January and has continued nearly \$5 higher than in early 1956.

The reason for more favorable prices this winter is that farmers cut back hog production in 1956 following the low prices of late '55 and early '56. The drouth in Nebraska and Western Iowa also contributed to this reduction. The numbers of sows farrowing in the

months April-July were 11-19 percent below the same months of 1955. By November, '56, this production cut was reflected in reduced slaughter and rising prices, which reached their seasonal high in late January, '57. Hog prices are now showing some seasonal weakness as fall pigs come to market but will still be \$2-4 higher than a year ago through the spring and summer months.

The big question now is whether producers will overdo their expansion plans in 1957. A substantial increase in late spring and summer farrowings could result in a situation similar to that of the 1955-56 marketing season. The U.S. pig crop was 95.6 million head in 1955 and 89.7 million in 1956.

The December pig report issued by USDA showed that farmers at that time planned a slightly smaller spring pig crop in '57 than a year ago. Recent activity in purchasing breeding stock provides strong evidence that these plans are being revised upward.

We can use more hogs than were raised in 1956 but production plans should not be based on an expected price of \$20 per cwt. The USDA pig crop report for March should be checked carefully and plans for summer litters revised downward if a substantial increase is reported. Less production variation can help prevent wide price fluctuations such as we have experienced in the last four years.

BRIEF and IMPORTANT CORN PRICE SUPPORTS

Changes in the 1957 corn program are now being considered by Congress. Cut in this year's corn allotment, as required by law, was so severe that many eastern Corn Belt farmers will shopped their allotment...

Lower support prices or loan rates were announced recently for the 1957 crops of oats, barley, grain sorghums, and soybeans. This year's prices compared with those for 1956 are: oats, 60c a bushel vs. 65c; barley, 94c per cwt. vs. \$1.02; grain sorghums, \$1.83 per cwt. vs. \$1.97; soybeans, \$2.09 a bushel vs. \$2.15. All prices are U.S. average, state and county rates will be announced later.

Capitol News

New Sales Tax Controversy May Follow Bixler's Action

Lincoln—The sales tax question has taken on new controversy as the result of a filing with the Secretary of State's office. The filing was by Sen. Monroe Bixler, Harney, an advocate of a sales tax. Bixler notified the office of his intention to form a "Peoples Tax Relief committee."

This group, according to the senator, would circulate petitions calling for a vote on a constitutional amendment to take the state out of the property tax field. But, Bixler said, he would drop his petition drive if the Legislature enacts a combination sales and income tax measure that would produce an estimated 50 million per year in revenue.

The sales and income tax proposal was sent to floor for debate by Bixler's revenue committee the same day that he filed his petition form with the Secretary of State.

Under the petition proposal, non-veterans owning homes would get tax exemptions of 35 percent but not exceeding \$85. Veterans would get a credit of 45 percent or not more than \$100.

Bixler said revenue lost by local governments such as counties and school districts would be replaced by higher taxes on personal property. The proposed change if approved by voters would be effective after July 1, 1960.

There was some reserved comment on Bixler's proposal from sales tax backers. Opponents announced they would fight such a petition drive. For instance the State Teachers' Bureau, long a champion of the sales tax, was not sure at first glance whether it would go along with the drive, a spokesman said.

The proposal caused most groups to engage in a study to determine all affects it would have on taxation. There were two schools of thought on the petition drive. One was that it would be used as a club to gather votes for the combination tax bill. The other school of thought is that senators might find the bill less objectionable than the sweeping changes proposed in the petition.

But the other thinking trend is that sponsoring Bixler's petition drive is an admitted defeat. The sales tax is a dead issue this session of the Legislature. And this thinking is also that the petition proposal will impair chances of the sales and income bill on the floor.

Tuition Hikes
 It will cost more to attend a college in Nebraska this fall. Rates at the schools at Wayne, Kearney, Peru and Chadron were boosted by the State Normal board governing group for the colleges.

For Nebraska residents the tab will be \$75 per semester instead of \$60 and \$45 instead of \$35 for summer sessions. For non-residents the bill will be \$125 per semester instead of \$70 and \$75 instead of \$40 for summer school.

Normal board officials were not able to estimate how the rates would affect revenue. The officials said they expected some loss of out of state enrollment. Not immediately determined either was effect of the announcement on the budget request the four schools submitted to the Legislature's budget committee.

That remained in doubt until the committee decides whether to follow Gov. Victor Anderson's recommendations and let the tuition hike accrue above that figure or cut the tax take correspondingly to come out at the same level.

Hardtack Dented
 The hardtack budget approach of Gov. Victor Anderson got dented

slightly by action of the Legislature's revenue committee. The committee declined to go along with the governor's request that the teachers' retirement levy be cut from 50 cents per \$1,000 worth of taxable property to 33 1/3 cents.

However, it did decide to make a thorough inspection of state buildings before taking a vote on two of the remaining key proposals in the governor's outline for state spending in 1957-58.

Those bills would reduce the state institutional building fund from \$1.10 per \$1,000 to 50 cents and eliminate entirely the 25 cents per \$1,000 levy for the University of Nebraska Medical College building fund.

The State Board of Control objected to the bill proposed in the institutional building fund bill. The board, which governs state institutions, now gets 45 of each mill collected. It would get 19 percent under the new legislation proposed.

Harold Peterson, board administrator, said this would not be enough to maintain present structures let alone permit any new building. He said three structures, two at Beatrice and one at Hastings, have been condemned by the state fire marshal and must be replaced.

Interstate Highway
 State Engineer L. R. Riss says Nebraska can't waste any more time in getting its interstate highway program in high gear.

The federal government is exerting pressure on the highway department to schedule more projects, Riss said. But he told the Legislature's budget committee that by June, 1959, the state will be short \$7.5 million in matching funds for levels of construction Nebraska needs from \$3 million to possibly \$5.5 million per year to match interstate highway funds.

Riss said. The engineer said Nebraska is one of five states that have not yet matched federal interstate money provided on a 90 Federal, 10 State basis.

County Agent Cites Rain Average, Defensive Need

Archie Wert gave us some interesting data on precipitation at Wayne during the past 50 years. I was surprised to learn that the most recent 40 year average (22.3 inches) was considerably less than the 27 inches I thought was normal. Here are the figures for the past seven years at Wayne:

1954	28.6
1953	24.3
1952	23.4
1951	32.8
1950	24.1

The average for the 1950-1956, seven-year period was 24.3 inches. The average again for the 1913-1950 period was 22.3 inches. Before last week's storm in fields about six inches of moisture soil in stubble but practically nine in fields which grew corn.

It is traditional that farmers are optimistic and particularly as the new planting season approaches. We, too, are hopeful that good spring rains will come. However, a realistic appraisal must reckon with the possibility of a short crop year again. A military general would say, "Now is the time for defensive action."

Temporary Pastures
 Every livestockman knows that good pastures are the best feed savers. Drought stricken, severely grazed brome pastures need more moisture alone to recover. A minimum of six inches growth should be allowed before pasturing. Heavy applications of nitrogen fertilizer will help when moisture is available. Such things as early snow

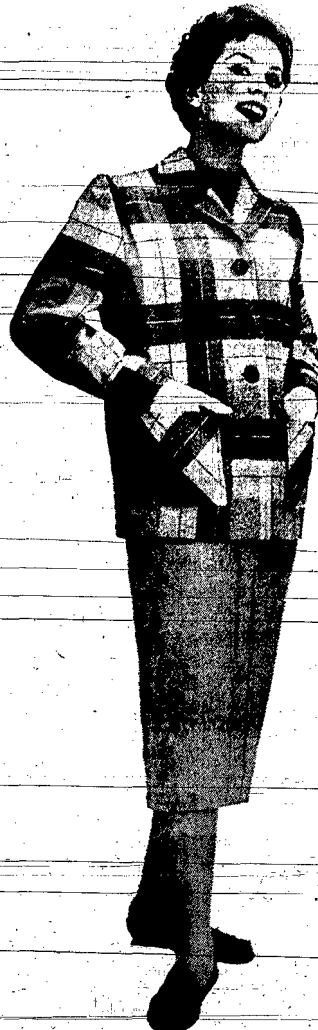

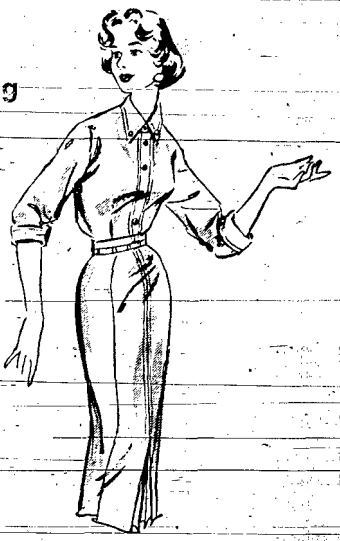
