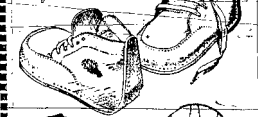

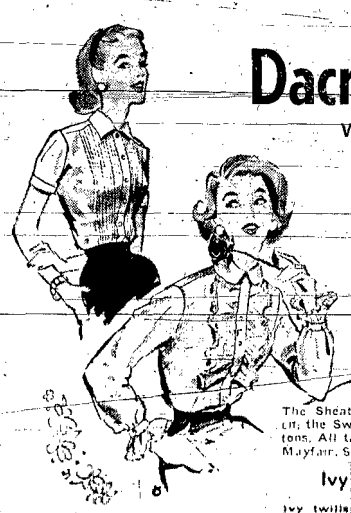

Capitol News...

Gasoline Tax Hike to Face Strong Opposition on Floor

The bill to hike the state gasoline tax from six to seven cents is expected to draw considerable debate on the floor. R. S. Riss said the \$39.4 million worth of work is in addition to the \$39.4 million in construction previously announced as the regular two-year building program. The total does not include about \$77 million in interstate highway construction in Nebraska.

Riss has said that no one in Nebraska knows the full impact of such a gigantic program as that for the interstate highway program. He mentioned the engineer: "If we fall behind even six months on a program of this scope, somebody will be in trouble."

The farm-petroleum-trucker combine has lined up again as opponents to a gasoline tax hike. Originally thinking was that if some concessions on length, height and width of trucks were given by the Legislature, thereby permitting more weight to be hauled, the combine, or at least the truckers, would not be taken open opposition to the gasoline tax hike.

But the Legislature last week refused to go along with the truck length bill and observers now speculate truckers will vigorously oppose any additional revenue.

It has appeared fairly certain since the session began that some type of additional highway revenue would be enacted. Not certain of course is where this would come from. Now looming as possibilities are the one-cent gasoline tax increase and stiffer taxes on the big trucks.

University of Nebraska

A new budget hearing is scheduled soon for University of Nebraska. The schools' top officials already have gone before the Legislature's budget committee where they presented graphs, charts and figures on why more money is needed.

Sought is \$5.5 million more in State tax funds. Gov. Victor Anderson has recommended \$3.2 million. The tough budget committee may balk at even \$3.2 million. There has been some sentiment for putting the school's budget low enough so it will have to increase tuition to come up to \$3.2 million.

His man on the budget committee is Sen. Karl Vetter. Omaha, a veteran executive of an Omaha street industrial firm. The new hearing may be next week depending upon how soon the committee goes through with its regularly scheduled hearings. After the first hearing, the committee chairman told Chancellor Clifford Hardin to take the budget back and cut it. The budget, for the 1957-59 period, will be easier cut by the University than the budget committee. But he said the committee will chop it if necessary. Gov. Anderson told the school exactly the same after his budget hearings. But, at that time, the school said it had submitted a budget covering a week but not asking.

Vogel said the committee also didn't like the form in which the school's budget had been prepared because it didn't match with committee forms. This was asked to be changed also. One of the problems was to find in which category increases were sought. The committee works by account

Seen To Go

Letters to The Editor

Veteran's Rights
There are certain facts concerning the postmastership at Wayne that we feel the voting public of our community are entitled to know.

We find in the Postoffice Manual that in first class offices, postmaster appointment is made without term by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate. Appointment shall be in accordance with Civil Service acts and rules as provided in Public Law 720 by promotion from within postal service or by competitive examination.

In regard to competitive examinations for postmaster positions, we quote from Public Law 721: "In filling a vacancy by means of open competitive examination the names of the highest three eligibles are certified to the Postoffice department for its consideration in making a selection for appointment. Under the Civil Service rules and regulations the appointing officer, with due regard to merit and fitness, may select any one of the three names certified. However, when the appointing officer makes a selection he tentatively selects a non-veteran but shall submit his reasons for not selecting the veteran to the commission for a determination as to their sufficiency.

The appointing officer shall withhold further action on the appointment of the non-veteran until he receives the commission findings. If the reasons are found to be sufficient, the appointing officer may then appoint the non-veteran; if the reasons are found to be insufficient, the appointing officer may not pass over the veteran and appoint the non-veteran.

These facts make it clear that any veteran who can attain a rating among the top three competitors and who has the experience and ability for the position should be appointed to that position.

In the examination given by the postmaster position in Wayne, a veteran was not just among the top three but was high scorer. He was also a qualified man, not only in bookkeeping experience but in character, personality and background. Why, then, was he not appointed?

The answer would appear to be politics. It seems the Republican Central committee in Wayne wants to dictate to the Postoffice Department and Civil Service who is to be the new postmaster.

This is hard for the veteran's organization to swallow. We think it should be very hard for any free-thinking American to sit on his hands and let this happen. Veterans were on the front line risking their lives while most of the Central committee was safe at home. Now they want to deny a veteran the chance to a decent job. Smacks of Russia doesn't it?

I don't remember asking my political affiliation before being inducted into the service. And rightly not, because in a democracy

Steen became the center of a raging controversy when he ordered a game warden to drop a charge against Robertson on grounds the action was "persecution."

How to Prune Fruit Trees



A demonstration meeting on fruit tree pruning will be held at the Merle Tretson orchard at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday. The speaker will be Mr. W. H. Whitney, Lincoln specialist. He will conduct the demonstration and answer other questions on fruits, vegetables, ornamentals and landscaping. The meeting site is on the highway at the south edge of Wayne. Everyone is invited to attend.

Depreciation Costly
Modern farms have a large investment in machinery. As they wear out they represent a heavy loss. A recent study in Iowa shows depreciation makes up half the cost of owning machinery. That means cash expenses for gasoline, oil, tires and repairs are just about equal to the unseen cost of depreciation each year.

Early Planting Pays
Out yields have averaged best from plantings April 1 to 10. Long time records show an average decrease of five percent the following week and 10 percent each succeeding week.

One Horse Farms
It is common knowledge here in the Midwest that farms are growing steadily larger. However, there's some talk of a trend to part-time and hobby farming is arising.

People living on farms receive 1/3 of their income from off-farm employment. That means more small farms near towns and cities. In fact 1/3 of the farms in the

United States today are less than 50 acres in size. More surprising, nearly 1/2 of all farms in the United States do not have tractors. It would seem there should be a big demand for a low cost tractor for small farms.

Price Comment
A local farmer who complains about muddy roads and foot lots ought to have his head examined.

Are You Keeping Pace?
How much are you saving by handling grain with a scoop shovel? Here are some figures from a recent study at one of our Experiment Stations.

A one-horsepower electric motor will move as much grain in one hour as an average man will scoop in a 10-hour day. The cost of electricity—less than five cents. So what is your time (a ten-hour day) worth?

An average farmer spends over 30 percent of his time doing chores. And, worst of all, chores are taking an increasing amount of time as compared to field work. Use of chore-saving equipment isn't keeping pace with field mechanization.
