About 250 persons are expected to attend Wayne's second annual sports banquet Monday night at the city auditorium.

Instructors, Kindergarten Age Occupy School Board

Teacher positions and kindergarten entrance requirements were discussed by Wayne city school board Monday night.

Resignations for Ed Love and Dorothy Bilson were accepted. Love teaches shop and mechanical drawing, is assistant coach and driver training instructor. Miss Bilson teaches home economics, FHA and car physical education. Neither of the two positions has been filled.

Elected to fill the science instructor's post was Richard Mitchell, who will be graduated from WSTC in June.

Tuesday the board met to elect Monty McMahon, Lincoln, to the vocal music position. McMahon has been teaching part time at Lincoln. Mr. McMahon is a consolidated school and attending the University of Nebraska. He will be graduated in June.

Also approved at the Monday meeting was a change in school board policy on entrance requirements for kindergarten students.

Present policy permits the school to accept students who will be five years old by Oct. 15 of the year they enroll, except that an entrance examination is available for students who will be five years old by Jan. 1 following enrollment.

Provisions permitting the examination were deleted from the policy for next year, with the result that all children entering kindergarten must be five by Oct. 15. No testing will be done.

Reason for the change, Supt. E. W. Willert said, was because some children may not be emotionally or socially ready for kindergarten even though the test would indicate mental readiness. Educators feel permitting the child to enter school too early may weaken his ability in later grades, Willert explained.

In the event the child continues to show exceptional ability, he may be accelerated in some of the later grades, Willert said.

Legislature Kills Measure To Boost Normal Tuition

A bill which would have required WSTC and Nebraska's three other state teachers colleges to charge non-resident students double the tuition charged Nebraska students was killed 28-6 by the Legislature Monday.

Sen. John Donner, Elgin, co-introducer of LB 509 with Sen. Marvin Lautenschlager, Grand Island, joined in urging the bill's defeat.

Since the measure was introduced by the State Normal Board has ordered tuition increases in effect starting next fall. The new tuition schedule charges non-residents twice the tuition for resident students and that puts the students at Kearney, Wayne, Peru and Chadron into compliance with the intent of LB 509.

Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, urged passage, pointing to show the new tuition rates run higher than the rates for comparable schools in adjoining states. The table below shows this comparison of charges for tuition and fees:

Everett Rees was elected Second ward councilman in succession to J. Hughes, who declined to seek another term. Harold E. Hein replaces Paul R. Mines as a member of the school board.

About 25 entries had been received by noon Wednesday. They included calves from Hartington, Cuming and Wayne counties. Others were expected from Dixon and Madison counties before Wednesday's final deadline, Herman said.

The event, sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, will be held on Second street between Logan and Nebraska. Entries must be in place by 9 a. m. with judging scheduled to start at 1 p. m.

Judge will be Dr. Paul Geyer, University of Nebraska—animal husbandry specialist. He will conduct a beef management demonstration at 10 a. m.

The show is open to any 4-H or FFA member in the Wayne time area who has not completed one semester of school work above high school. There are two divisions: Junior Top Youth 14 to 17 and Misses and Senior to those 18 or older.

There will be three classes in each division: steers, heifer and purebred breeding heifers. Places will be awarded to first place in each class. Merchandise prizes will be awarded in the first three placings in each class. Ribbon awards will go to all exhibitors.

Each exhibitor may show two calves provided they are not in the same class. There will be no breed divisions. Exhibitors are asked to provide bedding for their calves.

Judging will be based as follows: Record book, 20 percent; placing of animal in show ring, 40; evidence of training by animal while being shown, 20, and showmanship, 20.

Efforts of the Western Nebraska United Chambers of Commerce to help the University of Nebraska and the four teachers colleges with their budgetary requests have developed that the funds in question are in trouble.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Your letter of Mar. 16 addressed to the chairman of the budget committee has been referred to me and from it I note that the Western Nebraska United Chambers of Commerce urge support of the budgets of both the university and the state normal schools without reduction and as requested. Your letter will receive the attention of the committee.

It was interesting to me to note that you gentlemen of the United Chambers of Commerce feel competent to advise on a matter of this kind without being in possession of all the facts and which I am sure you do not have.

What Senator Vogel didn't know was that several of the WNUCC directors have seen the detailed budget proposals in question and have had them explained by the officials of the educational institutions involved.

But apparently Senator Vogel is one of those all-knowing fellows who doesn't choose to listen to a civic group that represents much of the "West End" of the state; an organization of businessmen willing to help fork over the taxes to keep our educational institutions from deteriorating.

That's his business, of course, as he seems to make clear in his rather provocative letter. But if the WNUCC hasn't done anything else for the university, Chadron State or the other teachers colleges, it has uncovered one apparent barrier that budgets still must hurdle.

Tactics Are Growing Rougher
The battle of redistributing is growing rougher. It seems a shame that redistributing cannot grow of its own accord.

There are many benefits to redistributing but if powers at Lincoln are going to shove redistributing down the throats of taxpayers the final result is going to be a bitter feeling between the public and state education officials, a wound that will cause trouble for many, many years.

Those persons favoring redistributing have tried to get laws passed to force redistributing. They have tried to stop funds coming to small districts.

Redistributing is needed in Nebraska but let it come in an orderly manner. The biggest mistake to date is the complete failure of those favoring redistributing to explain the benefits to the public.

Instead of trying to lobby state legislature bills to kill small districts why don't these groups come out in the rural area and explain that redistributing does not mean closing all rural schools.

Redistributing has many advantages if explained on the local level it would probably be desired. If you try to cram it down on the public it is only natural they will resist.

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
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


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
