Teacher positions and kindergarten entrance requirements were discussed by Wayne city school board Monday night.



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



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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

The Schools and Senator Vogel . . .

Efforts of the Western Nebraska United Chambers of Commerce to help the University of Nebraska and the four teachers colleges with their budgetary requests have developed that the funds in question are in trouble.

They are, at least, if a letter the WNUCC received in return from Sen. Karl Vogel, Omaha, chairman of the Unicameral's budget committee, is any criterion.

Action of the WNUCC in urging that the budget committee report to the floor the requests of the normal schools and the university "without reductions" was "respectfully" submitted to Senator Vogel. Also included was the information that the WNUCC favored the continuing of the institutional-building-fund levy at "not less than three-fourths of a mill." Vogel's answer was something less than encouraging. It follows:

"Your letter of Mar. 16 addressed to the chairman of the budget committee has been referred to me and from it I note that the Western Nebraska United Chambers of Commerce urge support of the budgets of both the university and the state normal schools without reductions and as requested. Your letter will receive the attention of the committee. The committee has already spent considerable time on both these budgets and we will have to spend considerable more time before we can come to a decision as to what the state really needs."

"It was interesting to me to note that you gentlemen of the United Chambers of Commerce feel competent to advise on a matter of this kind without being in possession of all the facts and which I am sure you do not have. Of course, it will only make a difference of 1 or 2 million dollars to the tax load, which I presume in your opinion is insignificant."

What Senator Vogel didn't know was that several of the WNUCC directors have seen the detailed budget proposals in question and have had them explained by the officials of the educational institutions involved. This has served to provide the members with perhaps as much information about the budgets as is now in possession of the budget committee.

But apparently Senator Vogel is one of those all-knowing fellows who doesn't choose to listen to a civic group that represents much of the "West End" of the state; an organization of businessmen willing to help fork over the taxes to keep our educational institutions from deteriorating.

That's his business, of course, as he seems to make clear in his rather provocative letter.

But if the WNUCC hasn't done anything else for the university, Chadron State or the other teachers colleges, it has uncovered one apparent barrier that budgets still must hurdle. That barrier is Senator Vogel. —Reprinted from the Alliance Daily Times-Herald.

Tactics Are Growing Rougher . . .

The battle of redistricting is growing rougher . . . it seems a shame that redistricting cannot grow of its own accord.

There are many benefits to redistricting . . . but if powers at Lincoln are going to shove redistricting down the throats of taxpayers the final result is going to be a bitter feeling between the public and state education officials, woud that will cause trouble for many, many years.

Those persons favoring redistricting have tried to get laws passed to force redistricting . . . they have tried to stop funds coming to small districts . . . they have tried to make small districts bend down to the will of others.

Redistricting is needed in Nebraska . . . but let it come in an orderly manner. The biggest mistake to date is the complete failure of those favoring redistricting to explain the benefits to the public.

Instead of trying to lobby state legislature bills to kill small districts; why don't these groups come out in the rural areas and explain that redistricting does not mean closing all rural schools. Those favoring redistricting should come out into rural areas and show how redistricting can cut expenses and provide better teaching facilities.

Redistricting has many advantages . . . if explained on the local level it would probably be desired . . . if you try to cram it down on the public it is only natural they will resist . . . and they are

Capitol News . . .

Close Vote Boosts Hopes of State's Sales Tax Advocates

Lincoln. Hopes of sales tax advocates have taken a sharp climb upwards. Reason for the feeling is the close vote in the legislature last week on a bill calling for a combination sales and income tax.

Opponents of the measure barely scraped up the necessary 22 votes needed to kill the bill, whose principal introducer was Sen. Norman D. Kearney. The final count of 22-19 for killing the bill was a surprise, even to supporters of the measure. Many observers had felt the combination proposal would not fare as well as the straight sales tax bill defeated earlier by a 26-15 margin.

As of now, one thing appears certain. One or more sales and/or income tax proposals will be put up in the 1959 legislature and that may well be a decisive year on the question.

Sales tax proposals began hitting the Unicameral regularly in 1959. The vote last week was the strongest show of strength in history for sales and income tax bills.

Meanwhile, in the background looms the announced intention of Sen. Monroe Blakler, Harrison, a senator, to start a petition drive calling for a vote in November 1958 on a Constitutional amendment.

The amendment would take the state out of the property tax field, thus clearing the route for legislative enactment of a sales levy or an income tax or both.

Bixler previously said he would drop his petition drive if a sales tax got through the Legislature this session.

University Budget

The University of Nebraska is awaiting action, like most other large state spenders—and some small ones—that the Legislature's budget committee will take on its request for funds.

For the 1959-60 biennium, the school wants an additional \$5.5 million in state property tax money. Gov. Victor Anderson recommended the Legislature appropriate only \$2 million, most of which should go for salaries.

The University made two appearances before the budget committee—the second being on a more friendly tone.

Sen. Karl Vogel, Omaha, committee chairman, asked the school to come back for the second hearing. At that meeting, Chancellor Clifford Hardin said about \$300,000 of the requested budget, largely for building repair, could come from the state institutional building fund.

Asked about tuition hikes, the chancellor said this matter is under study by the Board of Regents.

But he said the board has taken no action yet and likely will not until the budget committee's action is known.

The budget bills normally are among the last to be considered by the Unicameral. Generally the senators follow recommendations of the committee closely.

On the problem of tuition, the chancellor said present rates of \$120 per semester for resident students. A \$30 increase per semester, he said, would not materially affect enrollment but beyond that point there would be an effect.

A \$10 increase in tuition per semester would bring in about \$30,000 for a two-year period.




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
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
