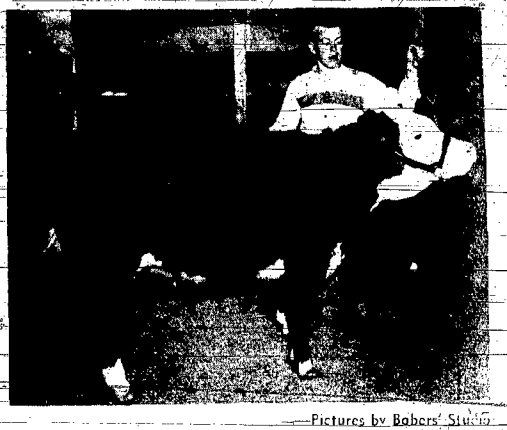
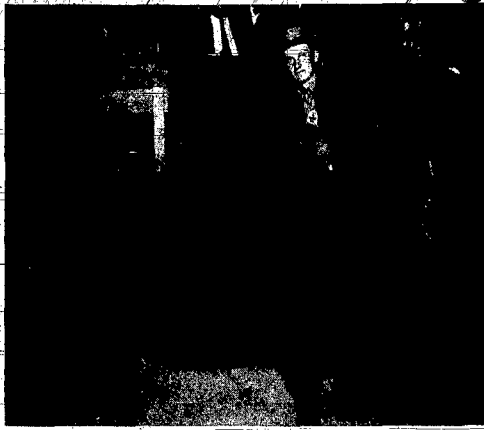


Meet The Champions of Wayne's First 4-H Beef Progress Show Saturday

Council Accepts Wright Addition Tuesday Night

Wayne's city council Tuesday night accepted a plat of Wright's addition to the city and passed an ordinance accepting streets and alleys in the subdivision. The 35-lot tract, owned by B. W. Wright, is located just east of Dearborn street between the railroad right-of-way and Seventh street. Other action Tuesday included a rather lengthy discussion with a representative of a parking meter firm, who demonstrated his company's product and offered to submit a plan to the city showing how meters could be installed on local streets. One suggestion by the council was to install meters on the parking spaces surrounding the city hall. No definite action was taken but the matter was referred to the streets committee. Beer licenses were approved for Norris Weible, Frank Wucher and Harlan Farrens after no objections were filed at hearings on their applications. Al Kern and an insurance company representative appeared to present a proposed plan for insurance on accident damages at the light plant. The proposal was taken under advisement. His request was referred to the dump committee for a recommendation. It was suggested that the position be rotated between Beck and the present manager, Arthur Jensen. Local Postoffice Service Cutback Slated Saturday

Cutbacks in service are scheduled Saturday at the Wayne postoffice. Acting Postmaster Don Wightman said Wednesday. Cutbacks from Postmaster General Arthur Sommerfield were received Monday. Summerfield ordered the cutbacks after Congress delayed action on his request for a \$20 million deficiency appropriation. Congressional withdrawal of his request is planned Friday but Wightman said it is doubtful if orders rescinding the cutback could be received in time to prevent enforcing them this week. The cutbacks would have the following effect at the local office: 1. The postoffice would be closed Saturday and operations would parallel those now used on Sunday. No city or rural carrier deliveries will be made Saturday. Collection service Saturday would operate on the present Sunday schedule. These orders would start Saturday and continue until rescinded. 2. Effective Monday windows at the local postoffice will be open from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. Thursday windows will be open the hour hour as at present. 3. Unless the deficiency appropriation is approved, Summerfield also ordered further cutbacks of Tuesday, Apr. 29. They would include discontinuance of money order service in all first and second class offices. This would include Wayne and Wakefield. Offices at Carroll, Winslow and Hoskins would not be affected. An embargo would be placed on all third class mailings except medicines, serums, drugs, and medical supplies.

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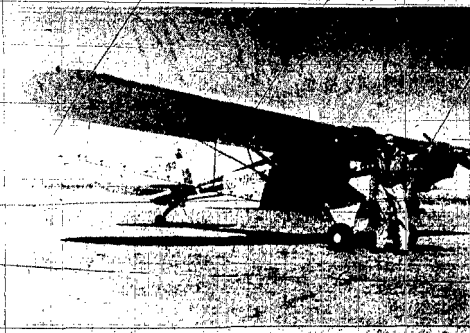
