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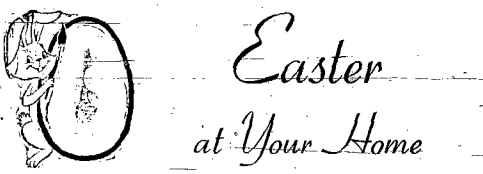

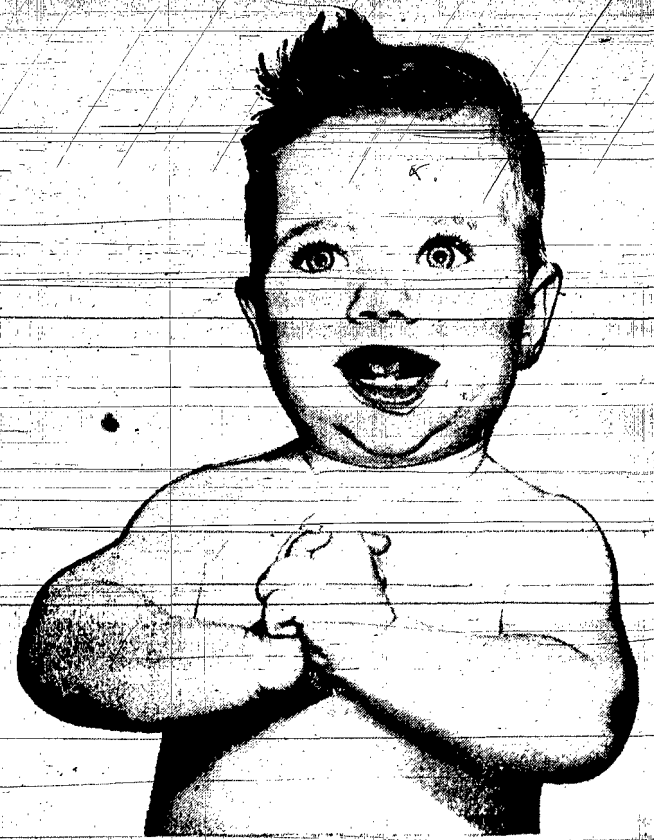

## The Postoffice Mess

One of the more spectacular results of the recent demands for a cut in unnecessary expense (this drive, thank you, inaugurated by Nebraska and Utah citizens) has been the exposing of the Postoffice department for its over-budget operations.

We have no criticism of postal service. On the local level it is tops. Apparently it must be tops, too, on district and national levels for the mail goes through rapidly with hardly ever a foul-up.

Yet, as Postmaster General Summerfield admitted, the nationwide service was some \$47 million behind being able to carry out its services for the current quarter, despite a \$2 billion authorization.

We think the same spotlight on all other government services would show even more startling waste of money assigned here, there and everywhere.

With citizens now aroused to the boiling point by never-dropping but always-rising income tax demands, we may see such a revelation, which will make the Postoffice department look good in comparison.

Our only real complaint against the postal service is that its masters (whether Democrat or Republican) seem to recoil at the very idea of charging more for what now really costs more.

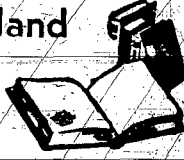
The Postoffice department bosses have heart attacks when anyone suggests that 3c first class mail ought to cost 5c or that the much-disputed third class mail (at 1 1/2c a throw) should be tossed out all together or else charged for at what it costs to handle and deliver.

These two simple corrections would change the U.S. mail service into a business-like agency for U.S. citizens much as the Canadian postal system already is.

If the postal service top brass can't see charging enough, especially for all that junk mail which irritates all of us every time we gather in our mail, then we say the same brass should get ready for a rugged deal from Senators and Congressmen who, if they never had the idea all by themselves, certainly have now received the word from their tax-harried constituents. — Blair Pilot-Tribune.

# Top Legislature Debate May Develop on Hard Tack Budget

A debate of top importance, meanwhile, faces the lawmakers on the "hard tack" budget of Gov. Victor Anderson.

Heavy argument will center about the state constitutional building levy which the governor wants cut drastically and the University of Nebraska medical college levy he wants eliminated.

The governor said he will fight to increase the levies over his recommendations.

# New Chemical Shows Great Promise to Kill Bindweed

Beat Drouth. Short season varieties of corn may stretch short moisture supplies available in the soil at time of planting.

A comparison of a short season corn variety with a full season variety, both planted at the same time and under the same conditions, showed the former made less stover per acre and less stover per bushel of grain than the full-season varieties, which may account for this fact.

Iowa researchers suggest that in order to avoid excessive heat and drought during the critical stage of tasseling and silking, it may be desirable to plant the earlier maturing variety earlier than customarily and the late maturing variety later.

New Bindweed Chemical. A new chemical, polychlorobenzoic acid, shows great promise for killing field bindweed, according to results of experiments described in the research report of the North Central Weed Control conference.

The new chemical has given kills of 95-100 percent with one application of a pound per square foot on non-cropped land. It is absorbed through leaves and roots of bindweed plants and treatments made any time during the growing season give excellent control.

William M. Phillips, USDA, reports that in all plots treated with the benzoic chemical at Hastings, Kan. station, stands of bindweed were reduced 95 percent or more.

Paul F. Sand, agronomist at the University of Nebraska, reports up to 100 percent kills of bindweed with benzoic acid. At this station the lowest rate of benzoic controlled bindweed to the same degree as the high rates of the other chemicals tested.

In view of these outstanding results on non-cropped land, the

American Chemical Paint company, Ambler, Pa., announced the new chemical will be available for purchase by farmers in 1957. It will be offered for trial under the trade name "benzoic 103". An application of 20 gallons per acre or one gallon per 2,100 square feet is suggested.

What kinds of hogs are most popular among farmers? At the recent midwest hog show, 49 percent of the 868 hogs shown were crossbreeds.

Fifty-one percent of the crossbreeds shown accounted for 77 percent each and the remaining 15 percent was divided among hybrids and other breeds.
