



New Chemical Shows Great Promise to Kill Bindweed

Iterance.
The new chemical has given kills of 95-100 percent with one application of '1 pound per square rod on non-cropped land, it is absorbed through leaves and roots of bindweed plants and treatments made any time during the growing season give excellent confrol.
William M. Phillips. USDA. reports that in all plots treated with the benzoic chemical at Hays Kan. station, stands of bindweed were reduced \$\$ percent or more. Treatments made during the spring and fall were equally effective. Again, the benzoic was equal to or better than any of the joiner diemicals used.

Paul F. Sand. agronomist at the University of Nebraska, reports up to 100 percent kills of hindweed with henzoic acid. At this station, the lowest rate of benzoic controlled bindweed to the same degree as the high rates of the other chemicals tested.






