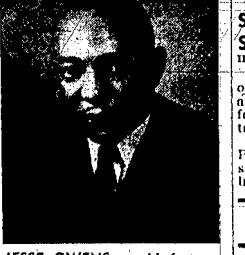

 tuition paid in rural areas is not so free. In 1946 rural area residents paid about \$59,000 and 10 years later had to pay about \$125,000. Indications are the figure will be even higher this year.
 Total tax collections for public schools in Wayne county increased about 60 percent in the past 10 years. Bulk of this increase was in general operating funds and free high school tuition. A slight reduction was shown in the school bond fund.
 Some of the collections do not have such an evident effect on the purses of taxpayers, yet they run to considerable amounts. One such item is gasoline taxes. Gasoline tax tripled over the 10-year period. Three major tax needs were added by the state during the 10-year period. In 1956 collections from county taxpayers for these three funds (state building, service annuity and university hospital building) totalled about \$50,000.
