Funeral services for Rev. Paul H. Riggs, 58, pastor of the Hoskins Evan, United Brethren church, were held Wednesday morning in the church. Burial was held at York in the afternoon. Pastor at the Hoskins church since July, 1955, Rev. Riggs died Saturday afternoon at his home. He fell ill while working in his garden and had Mrs. Riggs summoned a physician. He died before the doctor could arrive. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Rev. Riggs has been EUB conference statistician 25 years and served 20 years as chairman of the ministerial training board. He was also director of audio-visual education. He served on the conference commission of union and was director and co-worker of youth camps 12 years.

In 1918 he and his mother and sister moved to York. He was graduated from college there in 1923. He married Veda May Ludwick June 6, 1923.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Betty Jean; Hanev, Wichita, Kan.; a son, Meryl L., Albuquerque, N. M.; and three grandchildren.

Chest X-rays Find 58 Cases in County

Eight findings suspicious of tuberculosis and 50 with suspicions of other ailments were found in Wayne county residents during the recent chest X-ray program in the county, according to an announcement from the state department of health.

The 50 were listed in the report as other conditions, such as abnormal heart or tumor.

Cases with suspicions of tuberculosis are listed as "S" cases in the report, while the others are listed as "O" cases.

A breakdown of the cases in the different communities shows:

Approximately 30 percent or 2103 of the county's residents were X-rayed during the program. This number compared favorably with the last free X-ray survey made in 1952 when 1644 X-rays were made.

An additional 622 were surveyed at WSTC in 1952.

WSTC students were not included in county totals this year. The information was revealed in a letter to Christmas Seal Chairman Mrs. Robert Benthaek.

Council Seeks Settlement For Break in Crankshaft

School Board Seats New Chairman

Experts Say Shaft Was 'Unsound'

Action to secure settlement for a broken crankshaft in a municipal plant engine was discussed at a meeting of Wayne's city council Tuesday night.

Joe Adams, representative of the Norberg Manufacturing company which sold the engine, met with the council and offered a settlement.

This called for the city to pay \$15,000 for a new crankshaft and bear all installation costs. Adams said the \$15,000 represented his firm's actual cost on the replacement part.

Earlier the council had received recommendations from its Omaha consulting engineers. Their report said they felt "the crankshaft was unsound from its very beginning."

They added that the city's share of the cost of the new shaft should not exceed \$5,000 plus installation.

Council members declined Adams' offer and instructed Attorney Budd Bornhoff to meet with the city's engineers to determine possible action for obtaining a reasonable settlement from the Norberg firm.

Bornhoff said he feels the city has some recourse under the original terms despite the fact the warranty period has expired. He will meet with the engineers Saturday.

Councilman William Pfeil said "the city should certainly have a right to expect something from Norberg after the engine's bearings burn out, a rag is found in the duct, a piece of scrap metal is found in a sealed water pump and the crankshaft breaks."

A 1957 budget estimate of \$513,500 was approved by the council. This is a drop of approximately \$75,000 from a year ago.

Largest reason for this decrease was the cut-in-light plant estimates. A new engine was purchased last year.

The budget estimate forms maximum expenditures by the city during the coming year. It does not reflect actual expenditures.

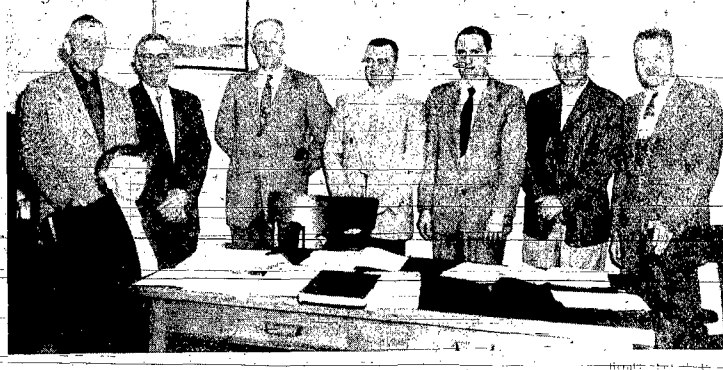
A request by Wayne Woman's club to erect a sign on Fifth and Main directing persons to the county museum at the courthouse was referred to the State Highway Department.

State Opinion Sought on Merger of Rural Schools

Equalization Board Meet At Wayne Next Week

County Supt. Gladys Porter held a hearing Tuesday morning the legality of a petition for merging School Districts 88 and 20.

Mrs. Porter found that although there was some misunderstanding as to the procedure for the merger, claims of misrepresentation had little basis.

State law governing such mergers states that 55 percent of the legal voters of the proposed merging district must sign the petition and that following such majority the county superintendent must merge the district, district 88 had 55 percent signatures while District 20 had 58 percent.

Further discussion considered several possibilities for different types of mergers. Majority of the 40 persons present represented District 20. They felt they now did not want the merger. These people said that the new district would make the school location too distant for their children to attend school.

County Attorney Charles McDermott was asked to write the attorney general for permission to renege on the petitions.

Million-dollar rains hit Wayne county during the past week, dumping a total of 2.69 inches on Wayne. Locally heavier amounts ranging up to as much as five inches were reported in the county.

The rains started with a gentle shower that dropped 21 inch last Thursday and followed with an additional .73 inch Saturday night and Sunday morning.

Monday evening 1.75 inches fell, according to Weatherman Archie Wert, bringing the total rain for that period to 2.69 inches.

Average rainfall for May is 3.24 inches and with half the month still to go there seems to be a good chance that the 1957 crop outlook will be further brightened by additional moisture.

Full details of the safety check will be carried in next week's Wayne Herald.

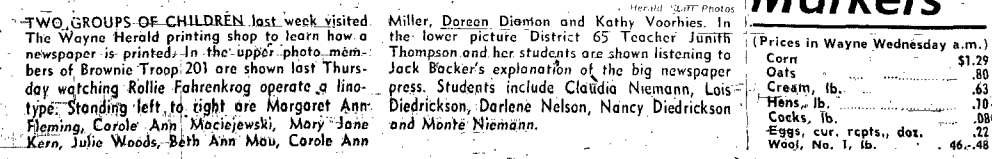

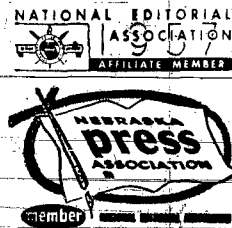

Pay Raises, Grain Tax Bring Top Debates in Legislature

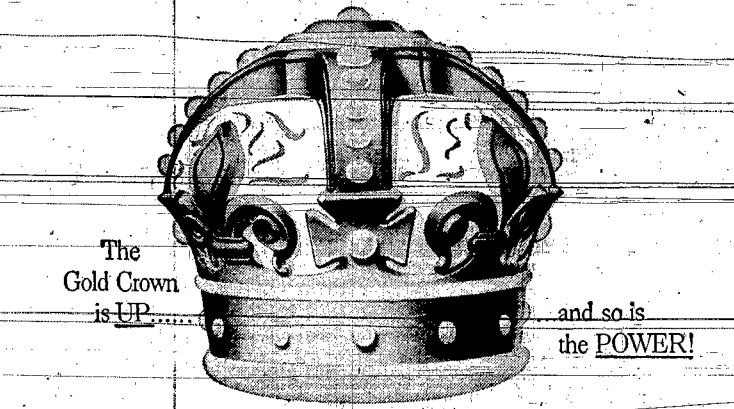
Lincoln—How much should key state officials be paid and which chiefs deserve higher salaries? That's the problem the Legislature has come to grips with and the result has been heavy debate. There are two schools of thought.

One is that you must pay the market price for qualified individuals or in the long run it will cost state government more to train new ones. The other is that salaries should not be increased sharply because the elected or appointed officials—as the case may be—don't know the salary when they took office.

In preliminary skirmishing on the question, the former school has won out and pay hikes have been authorized for 10 officials. Ceilings were set on two others.

Gov. Victor Anderson has officially entered the problem. He vetoed his first bill of the session and that would have clamped a lid of \$8,000 on the Game commission director's post.

THE PUBLIC LIBRARY IS EVERY MAN'S UNIVERSITY. There is no tuition on books to buy. No entrance exams, either. Take full advantage of this opportunity. Make better use of your library.

THE ONLY MONEY YOU PAY IS THROUGH YOUR EYES. If you wear glasses, you take out a rental book or have an overdue. Paying for a rental book simply gives you the privilege of getting it sooner and usually bring it back sooner if you are paying to read it. That way the new books move more quickly. The fines for overdue are one of our big headaches. If we had our way we would never collect any because, contrary to some opinions, dunning people for fines is not our favorite pastime. There are the people who rarely have an overdue and when they return it they pay up with apologetic apologies. There are those who pay grudgingly and others, though certainly in the minority, who intimate that we must have made a mistake and also the very few who simply refuse to either pay or even bring back the borrowed books or magazines. Seldom does that happen but when it does we wish we were paid to do housework or ditch digging. How thankful we are that the 99 percent bring their books back on time or pay up cheerfully. The spring of the year is the worst time for overdue because, perhaps, our thoughts are turning to other things besides books such as the outdoors, housecleaning or maybe love!

County Agent's Column

Seeding Rates Listed by Agent for Sorghum Crop

When moisture reserves are deficient both for fall and spring sorghum should be planted at the minimum rate. Many grain sorghum fields are planted too thick for satisfactory grain production. The recommended number of seeds per foot of row for sorghums planted in 40 to 42-inch rows are as follows:

- Grain sorghums: four to six seeds per foot of row.
 - Forage sorghums: eight to 10 seeds per foot.
- Immunize Versus Feeding**
- Many effects of the stillbirth implant have been in fattening cattle. Implants have given the same response as feeding hormone stillbirth in tests at the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station.
- Dr. John Matsushima, College of Agriculture, says that attempts to give the greatest response when fed to cattle on fattening or high energy rations compared to cattle fed a high roughage ration.

Tests show that stillbirth seems to give greatest response shortly after the hormone is given to cattle.

Pastures Short? — Try Sudan

Sudan grass is our most productive warm-season temporary pasture. It makes the best growth following planting in late May or early June and provides excellent pasture during July, August and early September. It is a lesser extent for provides pasture until growth is stopped by frost.

Cattle sometimes suffer from prussic acid poisoning after grazing Sudan that has been stunted by frost or drought. The new growth which occurs after the frost of the plant, causes the poisoning. The more mature growth is generally safe. After the Sudan is thoroughly dried either as hay or

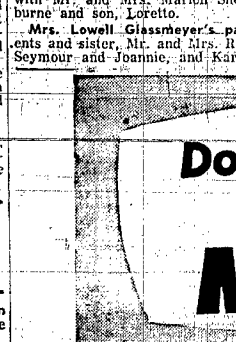

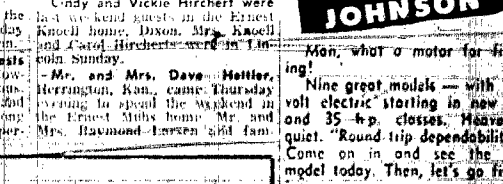
