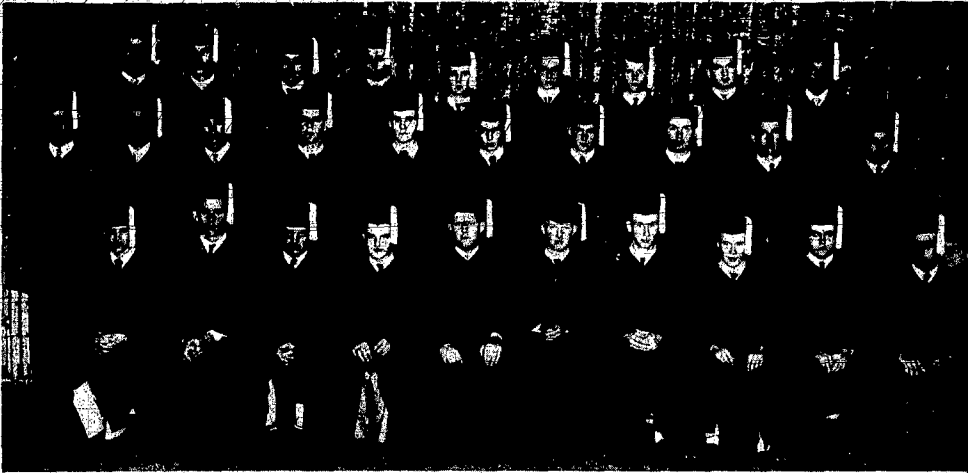

Continued Rains Brighten Crop Prospects in County

Wayne county's crop outlook continues to improve as intermittent rains soak NE Nebraska. May rainfall to date stands at 3.77 inches, more than one-half inch above average. The year's total now is 6.98 inches. Total moisture for the year now is slightly ahead of the average. In the first five months of the year average rainfall amounts to 6.83 inches. All of May's rain has fallen since May 9, falling nine of 13 days since then. Heaviest single rain was May 14 when 1.60 inches fell. During the past seven days 1.08 inches fell in Wayne with heavier amounts in some parts of the county. Cloudy skies have kept temperatures down, with most daytime readings cresting in the 50's. Highest reading was Tuesday's 73 degrees. Nighttime temperatures have been in the 40's. County Agent Harold Ingalls said the rains have made corn pros-

Real Estate Owners Face Bigger Share of Tax Load

Indications are rural precinct real estate owners will bear a greater share of tax load in 1957. County Assessor Henry Arp said this week. First tabulations of personal property assessments in the county's 13 rural precincts show a decrease of 12.6 percent over a year ago, Arp said. The drop in valuation was nearly \$482,000. Real estate assessments are expected to remain about the same as 1956. Hancock, Wilbur and Cuapin precincts showed the biggest decreases percentage-wise, the assessor stated. Hancock headed the list with 23.2 percent. Wilbur dropped 18.6 percent and Chapin 16.3. Total personal valuation for the 13 precincts was \$4,332,650. This compares with \$3,814,560 last year. The table below lists the 1957 personal valuation (50%) of each precinct and the percentage of decrease.

County Schools Share \$24,000 in Apportionment

Wayne county schools shared in slightly over \$24,000 in state school apportionment. County Supt. Gladys M. Porter announced this week. Mrs. Porter added that 12 county schools will not receive these funds as in the past because they are closed and contracting with other districts. This follows an attorney general's ruling that only districts holding school are eligible to receive the apportionment. Districts which will receive no funds are 5, 11, 12, 14, 20, 37, 38, 43, 50, 81, 82 and 85. Biggest share of the monies goes to the town schools since the division is based partially on the 1956 school census. Rural schools receive an average of \$265. Amounts for the four town schools were: Wayne, \$3,662.66; Winside, \$1,127.31; Carroll, \$630.17 and Hoskins, \$477.69. The formula for distributing the funds divides one-fourth of the total equally to all districts and the remaining three-fourths is divided on the basis of the school census.



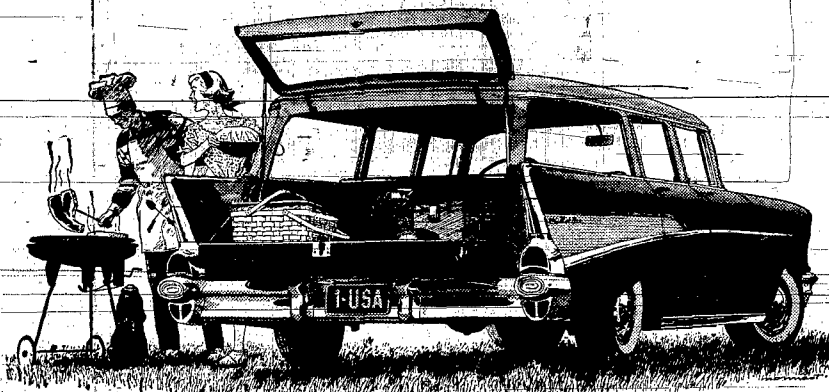

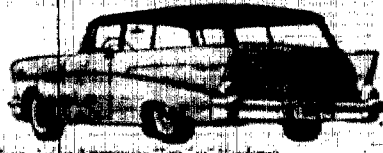

Preliminary Approval Gained For Increased Gasoline Tax

Statehouse Correspondent Lincoln. The Legislature had a tough time hammering out a preliminary program to increase road money that would withstand lobbying pressure. Preliminary approval was given last week to a program that would provide the Highway Department with \$5 million more revenue per year. Of the increase highway revenue, \$1.1 million would go to counties from the state gasoline tax.

But the opponents said existing revenue would produce a record-breaking program and that engineering and planning would be the problem in Nebraska rather than money. Lockwood said he doubted the state could keep pace engineering-wise now with the amounts of money available and that will be matched by the department.

Harvesting Oats Silage Oats makes the highest yield in feed value when harvested as silage. The proper time to cut oat forage for silage is when the grain is in the soft dough stage and the moisture content is 70 to 75 percent.

Since the hollow stems cause it to dry rapidly, a field chopper, cutting two or three-inch lengths, would reduce moisture loss. Preservatives are not necessary, but the chopped oat forage should be properly packed at the time of ensiling.

The feed value of oat silage generally is a little lower than corn silage. One of the factors for this difference is due to higher fibre content in oat silage. When

oat silage is to be fed as a major feed in a ration for a long period, stockmen should keep in mind its low carotene content. However, oat silage generally contains about the same amount of protein as corn silage.

Several dairy cattle insect controls approved in the past are no longer recommended, according to Bob Roselle at the college of agriculture.

These insecticides include methoxychlor, lindane, DDT, chlordane and TDE. All these chemicals are called chlorinated hydrocarbons. It was found that these chemicals are likely to be excreted in milk when applied directly to milking animals.

Other chemicals called pyrethrin, with a synergist or organic pyrethrin, are approved for use against horn, stable and other blood-sucking flies. Roselle points out.
