

BRIEF and **IMPORTANT**

AIN STORAGE: Now that rains have increased our chances of some grain to store this year, some farmers may be constructing additional storage facilities. U.S.D.A. has extended the form storage laan program through June 30, table farmers to finance a large part of the cost of additional space and drying equipment. Applications are made ASC Offices, beans may be arranged either directly through these county offices or through a local bank and iterest rate of 4 percent.

1958 WHEAT PROGRAM: The Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed marketing quotas, on the 1958 wheat crop, for the fifth successive year. The National accessage allotment has been set at 55 million acres, the minimum allowed by law. Nebroska's allotment for 1958 will be 3,228,377 acres, 6,450 less than in 1957. The national average support price has been set at \$1.78 a bushel, 75 percent of parity, also the legal minimum. June 20, 1957, has been announced as the date on which wheat growers will-wote on whether they approve or disapprove marketing quotas. Watch the June issue for more details on this referending.

NEBRASKA'S ECONOMIC FUTURE

Nebroska and the other Plains Stores will play an im-portant role in meeting the farm-product needs of our grow-ing population and expanding economy in the next ten years.



The future for agriculture in the Plains region is optomistic on the demand side.

But bosic changes are needed on our farms, in our businesses and professions, and in our public services for better adaptation to the environment in which we live. The open secret of economic growth is that it resides in basic moral and political attitudes favoring change and adaptability. Today we stand on the threshold of a new era—an era of progress, prosperity and stability. We stand on the threshold, we have not yet entered in:

OUTLOOK FOR AGRICULTURE

In the decade ahead, there will be over 3 million new mouths-to-feed each year in this country. Our population will exceed 200 million by 1962 and 250 million by 1975. These people will not only be feed but will be fed increasingly well. This will mean an expanding market for farm products, including most of those produced in this area.

most of those produced in this area.

By 1970 beef production will have to increase about 35, percent, pork production, 40 percent; milk, 25 percent; poultry and eggs, 45 percent will require 35 percent more corn and grain sorghums, 30 percent more hay, 25 percent more soybeans. Even with this population, growth, the trend toward more meats, dairy products, fruits and vegetables in our diets will prevent the total consumption of wheat, tye and potates. From increasing, Rather a reduction of 10-12 percent in wheat is indicated unless the export santial improves markedly.

On the production side, American farmers can easily meet the foreseable domestic and foreign demand. Presently known and future output increasing techniques will continue to be applied to agricultural production.

to be applied to agricultural production.

In 1940, each worker in agriculture produced farm commodities for himself and ten others, today he does so for 19 others. The number of farm tractors is now three times that of 1940; fertilizer use is 40 percent higher. Investment per worker in productive resources has risen-from \$3,000 to \$15,000, national average; and from \$19,000 to \$59,000 on typical Corn-Belt; farms; from \$11,000 to \$54,000, on Plains, wheat farms; and from \$14,000 to \$59,000, on Northern Plains-cattle ranches. Yields per acre, production per hen, per cow and per sow have all increased, too.

TOWN AND COUNTRY PROBLEMS

Although the economic, political and sociological im-portance of agriculture is declining in the nation, in Nebraska and other Plains States the future of agriculture largely shape the future of the state and the region.

the future of the state and the region.

Exceptions to this are islands of industry and military, stablishments, although the industries located in Plains towns ore often tied to agriculture and rise or fall with agriculture. Agriculture is in trouble, beset with problems arising from being "a great unorganized industry in a world of highly organized corporate industry and a highly organized lobor farce."

Trouble on the farm means trouble on Main Street in areas such as Nebraska where agriculture is the primary industry. The history of life in the Great Plains is characterized by alternate periods of feast and famine.

The white man's era is no exception. The Plains economy is now interrelated with and interdependent upon the rest of the economy. The development of commercial farming and of transportation, communication and businesses and professions to serve the area has reduced isolation.

This partial integration into the nation's economy has not only failed to solve the economic and social problems of the area but has often intensified them. Prosperity in the na-



When drouth and low farm prices hit, assistance programs are mostly disaster relief in nature, providing temporary alleviation from hardship but not contributing much toward solving basic problems.

Far-reaching and far-sighted changes are required if we are to have a more stable and prosperous economy in Nebraska and the whole Plains area. Changes are needed in the organization-and operation of our governments, roads, schools, health and recreation facilities and other public services.

The adjustments called for are of truly heroic proportions. The question we must face is whether to make these changes or to perpetuate the cycle of feast-and-famine in this area. If the decision is in favor of change and adaptation for stability and progress, than the task of making the needed adjustment with the least economic and social disturbance is a great challenge to public servants, to social scientists engaged in research and education, to farmers, business and professional men, and to all citizens of our state and region.






