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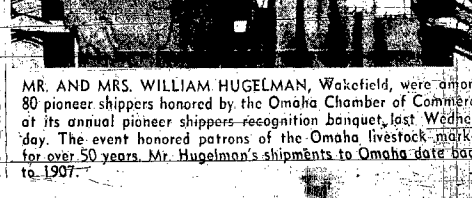

Dr. Maun, 47, Dies in Detroit Last Week

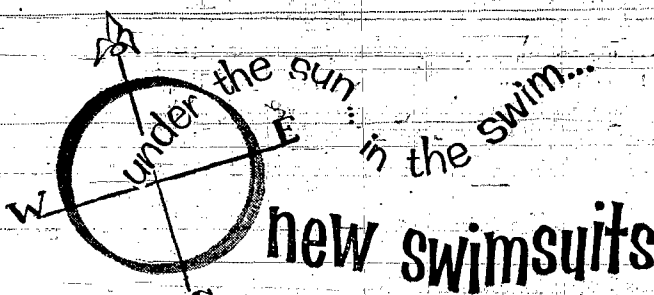

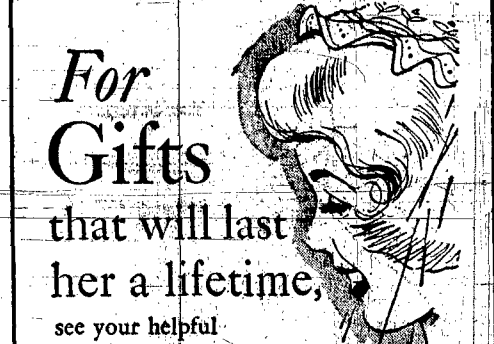

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts, before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Occasionally a member of a club or some type organization will stop in the office of this newspaper and ask this question . . . "Why does the (so-and-so) club get so much publicity and you hardly ever print any news about the (such-and-such) club that I belong to?"

This is a good question and a fair question that this publication is very glad to answer. Really the answer is quite simple.

Some clubs elect or appoint a reporter . . . or the organization includes in the secretary's job the duties of reporter. A club that does this and if the club reporter does his or her job well, your organization will receive considerable publicity.

If your club or organization does not have a reporter and the secretary does not assume the job, then it is difficult to obtain news about your organization.

After the meeting . . . not a week or two weeks after the organization's meeting . . . but preferably the next day or at the most two days after the

meeting the club reporter or secretary will write out a resume of the meeting. What plans or activities the organization has discussed . . . include in the report the date and place of the next meeting.

The Wayne Herald is anxious to carry the news of all organizations . . . but some make it next to impossible to obtain reports of their meetings so consequently you see little news about these groups in the newspaper.

If you feel that any organization you belong to should have better newspaper publicity of its activities; then suggest at the next meeting that a reporter be named.

Your organization is a good one . . . then let people know what they are doing . . . you will find your own members more interested and others will be interested in your activities.

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You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed, you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Proponents of a convention say that is the only way to change the constitution—all at once so the entire document can be scrutinized in relation to amendments proposed.

But opponents say that lobbying at such a gathering would be "tremendous" from special interest groups that would like legislation enacted into framework of the constitution.

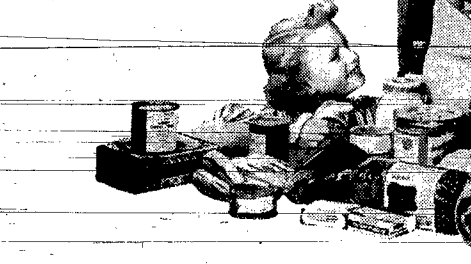
