

### An Editorial

## Caveat Emptor!

Wayne has been hit several times in recent weeks by the annual summer influx of itinerant peddlers purveying magazines, encyclopedias, photographs, etc.

Visits of these salesmen to local homes should, in most cases, be preceded by the Latin warning . . . Caveat Emptor. If you're in doubt it means "Let the Buyer Beware!"

Housewives are the most popular prey for these fast-talking salesmen who convince the woman she is really getting something for nothing. Oftimes the reverse is true, she's paying plenty for nothing.

In addition to the fact that itinerants seldom offer any services not readily available from a reputable merchant, the transients do nothing to pay for our schools, maintain our streets or contribute in any way to the community.

Many instances have been reported to local officials where preferred merchandise was never delivered. Several cases of checks issued in payment being cashed before the salesman left town are also in evidence.

Steps can be taken to curb the activities of itinerant salesmen in the area. The responsibility lies with the housewife or purchaser, however.

1. Ask to see the salesman's license, occupation tax receipt or permit issued by the city clerk.

2. Don't be taken in by fast talking and a glib line. Many salesmen list an address in a nearby community. In most cases, this is not true.

3. If you ask the salesman to leave and he persists with his sales pitch, report the action to the city police.

4. If you have any doubt about costs, quality or reputation, call a local merchant. In most cases he can offer you the same or superior merchandise for as little or less money.

## Changes Cited in Renewal Of Probationary Licenses

A new emergency law which went into effect May 28 will have considerable effect on renewal of probationary drivers' licenses. Probationary licensees are those issued to minors 16 years old and over who have not reached their twentieth birthday.

Under the old law, such licenses had to be renewed one year prior to the date of their original issuance. The new law makes all probationary licenses renewable.

### June 15 Deadline For Oats Clip on Acreage Reserve

Saturday is the final date for disposal of oats or wheat planted on soil bank acreage reserve tracts, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins reminded farmers this week.

In cases where the oats has not jointed by Saturday, the farmer must apply by writing at the ASC office for an extension of the disposal date. Latest possible extension is June 30.

Disposal date for corn planted on acreage reserves is July 31. Any praderie found to have excess corn will be notified by mail of the excess and the deadline for getting into compliance.

Reporters are now at work checking compliance on individual farms throughout the county. It is scheduled to be completed by June 30.

Farmers were also reminded that acreage reserve tracts must be clearly marked according to soil bank contracts.

### Control Measure Against Aphids Cited by Agent

County Agent Harold Ingalls this week cited control measures which may be used against aphids that are infesting nearly every kind of growing plants in Wayne from evergreens to grass.

Ingalls said a malathion or nicotine sulfate spray is recommended for control of these insects. He added that spraying of small trees is advisable since aphids can cause more damage to them.

Infestations in large trees are difficult to kill, he added, as high volume spray equipment is needed and because leaf curling protects the insects from the spray.

Ingalls said the aphids are more noticeable in elm trees because the numerous infestations cause the leaves to curl around the aphid colonies.





## Many Bill Reconsiderations May Bring Change in Rules

By Melvin Paul

Lincoln, It appears the Nebraska Legislature may set a record for length as well as bills introduced.

June 17 will be the 114th legislative day, the previous record

length set in 1955. Unless a way is found to speed up activity, most observers feel the senators will adjourn June 18 or 19.

A record number of bills have been introduced 614, as compared to the previous high of 585 filed in the 1953 session.

Some observers speculate reasion for the length of the 1957 session revolves around the numerous attempts to revive bills killed on the floor or in the committees.

Also, there have been an unusually large number of measures backed up for amendments during the various stages of legislation. The large number of reconsiderations may prompt a study of

Legislature. Sen. George Syas, led an amendment by Sen. Terry Omaha, says he is not happy with the current rule which permits a governor veto power over proposed building plans of state agencies for reconsideration of action on a measure.

Such a rule, Syas said, "honors indecision." He believes parliamentary procedure should be that no reconsideration could be had unless a motion is made by a senator who was on the prevailing side of a question.

There also has been some dissatisfaction with a change in committee alignments this session. The lawmakers decided to add a committee and cut the membership on all such groups.

But while some lawmakers argue this helped speed the session, others say it resulted in a lot of postponed decisions because of the small number of senators who heard arguments at public hearings. Often only a bare majority of committee members listened to testimony.

Some say this was part of the reason for so many moves to reconsider committee actions by the Senate as a whole.
