He and his wife, Blanche, are the parents of a daughter, Judith, 11, and three sons, Stephen, 9, William, 6, and David, 4.

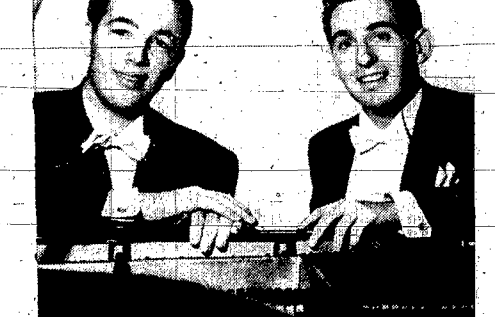

## An Editorial Caveat Emptor!

Wayne has been hit several times in recent weeks by the annual summer influx of itinerant peddlers purveying magazines, encyclopedias, photographs, etc.

Visits of these salesmen to local homes should, in most cases, be preceded by the Latin warning... Caveat Emptor. If you're in doubt it means "Let the Buyer Beware!"

Housewives are the most popular prey for these fast-talking salesmen who convince the woman she is really getting something for nothing. Ofttimes the reverse is true, she's paying plenty for nothing.

In addition to the fact that itinerants seldom offer any services not readily available from a reputable merchant, the transactions do nothing to pay for our schools, maintain our streets or contribute in any way to the community.

Many instances have been reported to local officials where proffered merchandise was never delivered. Several cases of checks issued in payment being cashed before the salesman left town are also in evidence.

Steps can be taken to curb the activities of itinerant salesmen in the area. The responsibility lies with the housewife or purchaser, however.

1. Ask to see the salesman's license, occupation tax receipt or permit issued by the city clerk.
2. Don't be taken in by fast talking and a glib line. Many salesmen list an address in a nearby community. In most cases, this is not true.
3. If you ask the salesman to leave and he persists with his sales pitch, report the action to the city police.
4. If you have any doubt about costs, quality or reputation, call a local merchant. In most cases he can offer you the same or superior merchandise for as little or less money.

## Changes Cited in Renewal Of Probationary Licenses

A new emergency law which went into effect Jan. 28 will have considerable effect on renewal of probationary driver's licenses. Probationary licenses are those issued to minors 16 years old and over who have not reached their twentieth birthday.

Under the old law, such licenses had to be renewed one year from the date of their original issuance. The new law makes all probationary licenses expire Sept. 1. They must then be renewed within 60 days.

However, drivers who renewed their probationary licenses before May 28, will not renew Sept. 1. County Treasurer Leola B. Jule explained this week. Such drivers must renew again one year from the date of issuance of the present renewal. They will then renew again Sept. 1, 1958.

### Tuesday Deadline for Swimming Lesson Signup; Seek One More Lifeguard

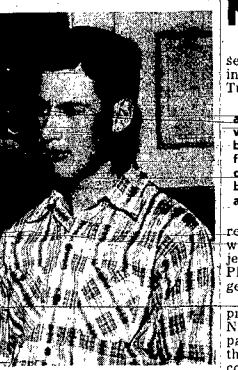
Friday is the final deadline for registration for swimming lessons at the Wayne municipal pool, Assistant Manager Duane Branstiter announced today.

### June 15 Deadline For Oats Clip on Acreage Reserve

Saturday is the final date for disposal of oats or wheat planted on soil bank acreage reserve tracts, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins reminded farmers this week.

In cases where the oats has not been clipped by Saturday, the farmer must apply in writing to the ASC office for an extension of the disposal date. Latest possible date is June 30.

Disposal date for corn planted on acreage reserves is July 31. Any producer found to have excess corn will be notified by mail of the excess and the deadline for getting into compliance.

Reporters are now at work checking compliance of individual farms throughout the county. It is scheduled to be completed by June 30. Farmers were also reminded that acreage reserve tracts must be clearly marked according to soil bank contracts.

## Park Development Slated Near City Swimming Pool

Wayne city council obtained settlement for a broken crankshaft in an engine at the city light plant Tuesday night.

The settlement, reached after a lengthy discussion with Milwaukee officials of the Nordberg Manufacturing Co., will see the city pay a maximum of \$13,500 for removal of the broken shaft and installation of a new one.

In addition the city will pay for repair of the generator damaged when the shaft broke. This project was estimated at \$1,500 by Plant Superintendent N. H. Drueger.

The final settlement was a compromise between the city and Nordberg. The manufacturing company had originally offered to sell the city a new shaft at exactly its cost, about \$15,000. The piece, which weighs about 13,000 pounds, sells for \$30,000 at full cost. The city was to bear all installation costs under this offer.

Council members had countered with an offer through City Attorney Budd Bernhoff. This called for Nordberg to furnish a new shaft free of charge with the city to pay installation costs.

Estimate of the repair cost for the completed project had earlier been set at about \$22,500 including installation. This total figures cost of the new shaft at \$15,000.

In presenting arguments before the settlement, Nordberg contended the shaft was in good condition when originally installed. The officials added that any defect at that time would have caused a break much sooner and within the warranty period of one year.

The city countered with a contention that its engineer's tests showed the broken shaft was defective from the time it was being cast and also that the city could seek recourse through general warranties throughout the contract with Nordberg despite the fact the one-year period had expired.

Just when the engine will be ready to operate again was not determined Tuesday. Nordberg said it would expedite the project as much as possible but that delivery on a new shaft from the forging plant is currently about 22 weeks. City officials hope to have the engine back in operation before the Christmas generating peak arrives.

In other action Tuesday the council adopted a motion to proceed with an engineer's plan for developing the swimming pool park. This would include paving a drive through the park and a parking lot for pool patrons. This project was estimated earlier at about \$22,500.

Paving of Douglas street between Twelfth and Thirteenth would also be done at the same time. This move had been requested by residents of the area.

A request of the Country Club for 800 feet of pipe to extend the watering system at the local golf course was approved. The council agreed to purchase plastic pipe and fittings at an approximate cost of \$150.

Councilmen also learned that construction of a National Guard armory on East Seventh street may be started in July. The city has been asked to furnish a sewer line to the site.

Permission to detour traffic was granted to the railroad for four or five days for repair of the rail crossing on Main street.

City Clerk Walter Bressler recently issued a building permit to Lloyd Bradford for a \$200 screened patio at his residence at 715 Windom.

## Police Warn Dog Owners About License Renewal

Police Chief W. H. Elyon again this week reminded dog owners about renewing 1957 licenses for their pets.

Deadline for obtaining the licenses has expired, Elyon said, but a few owners have yet to secure licenses for their dogs. Pets found without licenses can be impounded and destroyed by the police and the owner fined a maximum of \$25 for failure to secure a new license.

Before an owner can obtain a 1957 license, he must show a certificate that the dog has had a rabies vaccination.

## County's Alfalfa Harvest May Rate 'Best in Years'

First cuttings of alfalfa in Wayne county have been the best in years, County Agent Harold Ingalls said Wednesday. Most fields have been cut by now, he added.

Many farmers are cultivating corn now and the outlook for that crop is good, he said, while oats "haven't looked better at this stage in a long time."

Showers continue to drop spottily throughout the county, never in large amounts but providing surface moisture for plants.

Greatest amount recorded in Wayne during the past seven days was 28 inch last Wednesday, followed by 18 Fridays. Only a trace fell Tuesday morning.

Temperatures have been warm and the high humidity has provided almost perfect growing weather.

High reading for the week was 93 degrees last Thursday. Nighttime readings have remained above the 50-degree mark.
