Wayne May Get Cuts in Tax Levies

Wayne county's assessed valuation dropped over \$100,000 during the past year, Assessor Henry M. Lay said this week after a check of incomplete estate and personal property assessed valuation of the county for 1957 is about \$1,000,000. The county has \$7,190,000 for 1957. Motor vehicle and franchise levies are not included in these totals. Taxpayers, the valuation "drop" means a mill levied at the county or state level would raise approximately \$405 less this year than in 1956. To the individual, it would mean an increase of about eight cents per \$1,000 of valuation.

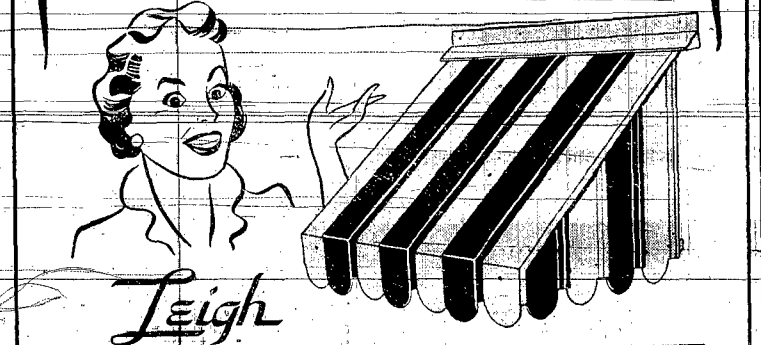

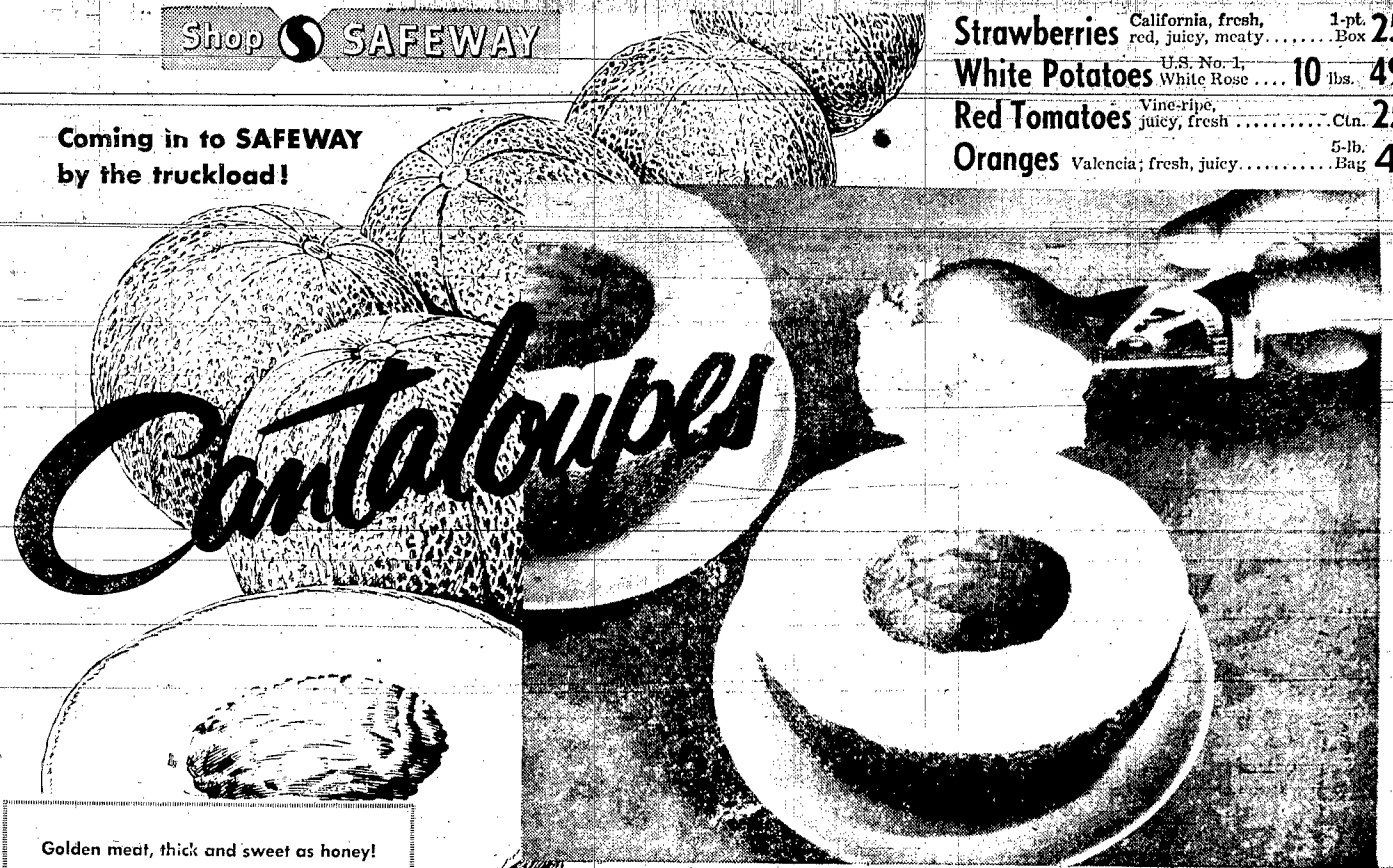

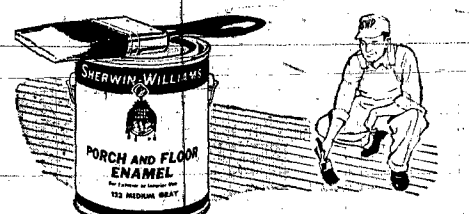
