New Soil Bank Policy Offers Farmers Corn Loan Reduction

Can Save Up To 26 Cents Per Bushel

Wayne county farmers with 1955 or 1956-crop corn under CCC loan or purchase agreement can get reductions up to 26 cents per bushel by using their 1957 soil bank payments to redeem their CCC ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins pointed out this week.

The reductions are made possible by a new policy concerning redemption of farm-stored corn with soil bank certificates. Last year farmers who redeemed farm stored corn with their certificates received a personal increase in the face value of their certificates. Under the new policy such corn can be redeemed at five percent less than the 1957 support price.

Wayne county's 1957 rate has tentatively been set at \$1.30. This means farmers could redeem farm-stored 1956 and 1955-crop corn at \$1.25 per bushel. Corn was sealed in Wayne county at \$1.43 and \$1.51, respectively, for 1956 and 1955.

Thus a farmer with 1,000 bushels of 1956-crop corn under loan at \$1.43 per bushel or \$1,430 could redeem the corn for only \$1,250. The reduction for 1,000 bushels of 1955-crop corn would be from \$1,510 to \$1,250.

There is one drawback concerning the program. Farmers cannot redeem their farm-stored corn until after Nov. 15, the end of the normal Nebraska corn harvesting season. The reason for the new policy was explained by the fact that many producers who wished to obtain grain in exchange for his soil

Payment Rates Set for 1956 Wool Program

Incentive payment rates for shorn wool under the 1956 wool incentive program will amount to 40 percent of the dollar returns each producer received for his wool, County ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins said today.

This means that for every \$100 received by the producer from sale of shorn wool, a payment of \$40 will be made. The method of payment calculation results in the grower who receives the higher price for his wool being eligible for a larger incentive payment than the grower who gets the lower price for the same quality and quantity of wool.

Jenkins explained that the payment rate on sales of unshorn lambs to compensate for the wool on them will be 71 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold.

The shorn wool payment rate was determined on the basis of the average price producers received for shorn wool in 1956, according to prices reported by farmers in their application for payment.

The county ASC office will begin making payments next week. Applications for payments must have been filed with the ASC office by Apr. 30. Payments will be made on shorn wool and lambs marketed through the end of August and Mar. 31, 1957. To be eligible for payments, the wool must have been shorn after Jan. 1, 1955 and lambs must never have been shorn.

The 1956 and 1957 lamb payments will be shared by the producers or feeder owners who held the lambs over 30 days on the basis of the gain in weight during each ownership. Jenkins pointed out that the incentive rate for the 1957 marketing year is being continued at 62 cents per pound grease basis. The payment rates for the 1957 program will be determined in mid-1958 when the average wool price on 1957 marketings becomes known.

Delivery notices will be mailed after that date to all farmers who signed earlier their intention to deliver farm-stored corn under CCC loan.

Proposed Reorganization Plan

The table printed here contains information and estimated operating costs of the two main areas proposed in Wayne county's comprehensive school reorganization plan formulated by the Wayne County School Reorganization committee.

Area I includes districts surrounding Wayne. Attendance units for this area would include the present Wayne High building and construction of an elementary school, high school, gymnasium, library and cafeteria.

Area II would include districts in the Winside-Carroll-Hoskins area. Attendance units here would include kindergarten through sixth grade buildings at Carroll, Winside and Hoskins. Present school buildings would serve as these facilities. Construction would include a centrally-located junior-senior high school building.

The Area I plan assumes that approximately 350 pupils would be educated by WSTC through present Wayne Prep facilities. The budget includes \$10,000 for tuition for such students.

County Social Security Payments Near \$11,500; About 200 More Qualify

About 260 Wayne county beneficiaries were getting monthly Social Security benefits totaling approximately \$11,500 a month at the end of 1956, Norfolk Office Manager Clifford Kittelson reported this week.

Since Jan. 1 approximately 190 more persons have qualified for benefits, Kittelson said. Farmers qualify for the first-time accounts for the bulk of the increase this year.

About 40 percent of the beneficiaries are dependents; the other 60 percent receive benefits on their own earnings.

Jump Would Hike Taxes By \$35,000

A tentative levy of 6.44 mills to meet the 1957 Wayne county budget has been calculated this week by County Clerk C. A. Baird.

County commissioners will hold a public hearing July 31 on the budget proposal.

The 1957 levy represents an increase of 1.44 mills over the 1956 levy. This means taxes would increase \$1.44 for each \$1,000 of valuation. Taxes on a house assessed at \$4,000 would increase \$57.60, taxes on a farm valued at \$10,000 would increase \$140.

The increase was partially caused by a decrease in the county's assessed valuation. This year's total is \$26,189,128 as compared to \$26,688,500, thus each mill levied in 1957 will bring about \$26,189 as compared to \$26,689 last year.

If the budget is adopted after the July 31 hearing, county taxpayers would pay about \$35,000 more in county taxes than they paid a year ago.

County budget requirements for 1957 total about \$390,000, an increase of approximately \$15,000 over 1956. Biggest increase is created by the higher costs of county relief. Budget for this fund was \$75,000 approximately \$7,000 over a year ago. This forced a levy increase from .54 to .88 mills.

Because current funds are about \$20,000 under the total for last year, about \$25,000 additional must be raised for county road expenditures. This brings a levy increase from .46 mills to 1.44.

In all cases, the prices are lower than the support rates for the county a year ago. Oats price this year is 56 cents per bushel as compared to 61 cents for 1956.

The barley price for No. 2 grade is 98 cents per bushel compared to \$1.05 last year. Sorghum price for 1957 is \$1.80 per hundredweight. The county rate last year was \$1.95.

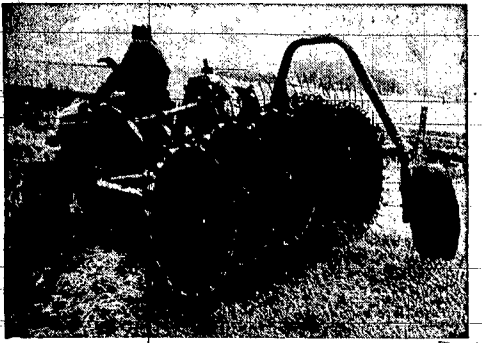

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Why Legals?

The question is occasionally asked us, "Why do you print legal notices, especially board proceedings?" Generally the question is followed by the statement, "Of course I like to know how the money is being spent; but..."

The Wayne Herald's legal page has in its heading this statement: "Every government official or board that handles public monies should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it showing where and how each dollar is spent. We hold this to be a fundamental principle of democratic government."

Most governing bodies are required by law to make such accountings since legislators have realized the dangerous precedent created when governing bodies are not required to do so.

Public money belongs to everyone and no one therefore an accounting of the uses and amounts of such funds is vitally important to the populace.

In days gone by... and in some instances today... public officials have mismanaged or embezzled funds. This usually is found in a community where taxpayers have exhibited little or no interest in the functions of the governing body and pay little attention to how money is spent.

You may not agree with an editorial... but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained value as a reader. Have a careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

It is only good business for the stockholders (taxpayers) to know how their money is being spent by the business (government).

No reflection is intended on any official by laws requiring publication. The laws work for the protection of the taxpayer and the board involved. Few persons would think of handing anyone a blank, signed check, yet the same principle is involved when the people get no accounting of the uses of public money.

Just think of the possible situations that could arise if public officials did not have to account publicly for their expenditures. Within a short time public office would be the most sought after post in the nation... and taxes would go sky-high to provide money for grafting officials.

It would not be practical for every citizen to attend meetings of his county board, city council, school board, etc. Published accounts of these meetings and the expenditures authorized at them are a convenient and economical method to acquaint the public with the activities of their officials.

Biggest Road Fight in State History Looms on Gas Taxes

Lincoln. What may be the biggest road fight in Nebraska history is gathering steam rapidly. It appears this battle over an extra cent of state gasoline tax authorized by the Legislature will surpass the recent fight over a proposed ton-mile tax for trucks.

And left far in the dust also will be the intensity of a previous referendum in 1950 in which farm, petroleum and trucking groups knocked out a penny increase in the gasoline tax.

This fight, however, has several different angles. Gov. Victor Anderson has gone on record strongly for the extra cent of gasoline tax, most of which would go for matching Federal funds for the Interstate highway.

The governor has said if the petition drive announced by the farm groups blocks the seven-cent per-gallon tax, from becoming effective Sept. 20, he may have to convene a special session of the Legislature. This, the governor indicated, would be to provide road revenue.

Meanwhile, the Better Nebraska association announced serious consideration was being given to another campaign to put the ton-mile tax for trucks matter up to voters again.

And also in the background loomed reports that a group may start another petition drive to repeal the law that allows farmers to get a refund of the state tax on gasoline used for agricultural purposes.

Unopposed, farm group officials including the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union and State Grange filed notice with Secretary of State Frank Marsh of the form of the petition to be circulated.

It will take 28,397 legal signatures to put the repeal question to the voters. If the groups get 56,794 signatures, the law boosting the gasoline tax would not take effect as scheduled Sept. 20.

In the midst of the furor State Engineer L. N. Riss announced he has stopped all planning on about \$37.2 million worth of extra road building that would have been possible with the extra penny revenue.

Of the \$37.2 million total, \$30 million would be construction on the Interstate highway between Lincoln and Omaha and the remaining \$7.2 million on regular roads. Riss said he can not undertake any long-range planning without knowing how much revenue he will get and when it will be available. The action of the state engineer will slow and possibly stall action on the Interstate highway between Omaha and Lincoln.

Gov. Anderson, meanwhile, said: "I just don't believe the people of Nebraska want us not to go forward with the Interstate highway. The governor said the four-lane, super route is essential to Nebraska's economy. 'The highway' he said, 'means more to Nebraska than any state I know of. Nebraska is a bridge state and people want to go through here if they can.' Tourist travel, he said, means money in the pocket for Nebraskans since the average traveler spends \$20-\$25 per day. Robert Crosby of the Better Nebraska association said his group would actively fight the petition drive planned by the farm organizations. He said it has

made no decision on whether to join the reported move to repeal the agricultural refund law which gives farmers five cents refund on the six-cent tax.

Crosby said it is interesting to note that the amount of gasoline taxes turned back to farmers in a year is some \$3 million, the exact amount the extra penny of gasoline tax would produce per year.

Ethan Berck, head of the Farm council which is spearheading the gas tax repeal drive, said: "Our decision to proceed is based upon our firm conviction that this tax increase is one which should not be imposed except by the expressed will of the voters of this state."

County Agent's Column

A report just released by the USDA's agriculture research service shows farm work accidents killed an average of 3,900 farm people and injured an additional 121,600 each year from 1950 through 1955.

Accidents in farm homes took 3,300 lives and injured 548,300. Motor vehicle accidents are reported to have killed 6,000 farm people and hurt 210,000 while off-farm accidents, not involving motor vehicles, killed 1,130 farm people and injured another 140,000.

State Tax Levy

It appears more certain this week that Nebraskans might possibly get by without a hike in the state property tax levy this year.

When all 93 counties had reported value of property in the counties, the total stood at \$3.6 billion, as compared with \$5.5 billion in 1956. This may mean little or no increase in the present state tax levy of \$8.09 for each \$1,000 worth of property.

Agent Urges Farmers to Cut Farm Accident Toll

Three tractors from Germany, one from France and a Russian crawler are being assembled for demonstration in the morning. The German Unimog and the Russian Someca were brought to the laboratory earlier for testing. The Russian crawler, the German Lanz and Fendt are being brought here purposely for tractor day.

The Unimog resembles a truck-tractor combination. It was one of the first to be tested at the laboratory this year. The Someca closely

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has an Italian engine with 45 horse power. The German Lanz has a diesel engine with 45 horse power. The Russian Someca has an air-cooled diesel engine with 12-horsepower. The Unimog is the only one of the tractors available in America.

Too Much Penicillin

The use of penicillin-containing mastitis treatments comes under strict government control in America. The nation's health watchdog, the Pure Foods and Drug Administration, has ordered a ceiling on the amount of penicillin which can be injected into cow's udders per shot.

Under the rule, single doses cannot contain more than 100,000 units of penicillin. Government scientists say 25,000 units actually is enough to do the job. Some manufacturers reportedly make doses up to 1 1/2 million units.

FDA also has ordered that labels on all ointments containing penicillin must state in big letters: "Warning—milk taken from dairy animals within 72 hours after the latest treatment for mastitis must not be used for human consumption." It takes that long for the drug to work out of the udder.

Failure to stick to the rules, FDA hints, may lead to a total ban on penicillin use for this purpose. The agency reports too much penicillin is getting into the national milk supply, presenting a danger to health.

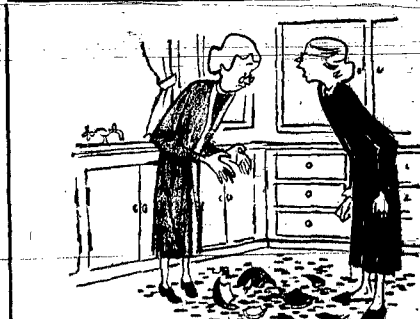

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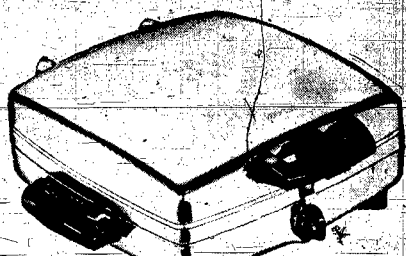
