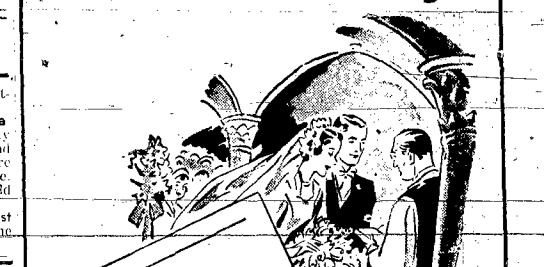

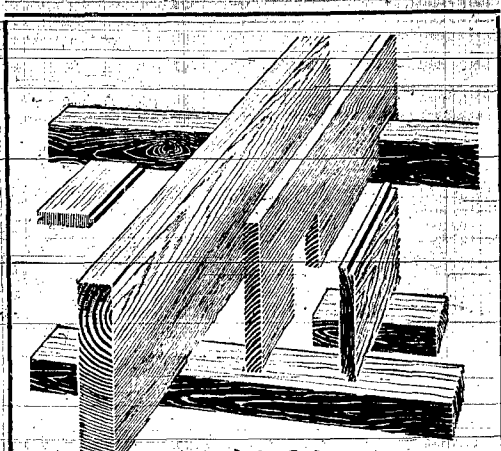

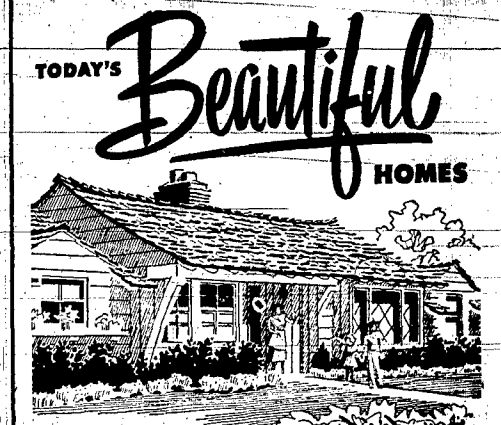

You may not agree with an editorial... but if you read the editorial and you have thought about the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Flash Floods Are Expensive

A group of farmers north of Beemer met last week to discuss "doing something" to provide better drainage on Plum Creek.

The flooding last week is a typical example of how useless and how expensive these floods are on streams that are normally just a trickle of water... sometimes even bone dry.

The rainfall that caused this flood fell primarily in Wayne county... a distance of 20 to 25 miles northeast of Beemer... the rain was local enough that flooding in Cuming county only affected one valley... the valley drained by Plum creek.

Some damage was done on every farm that Plum creek passed through until it dumped in the Elkhorn river... a distance of 20 air-line miles in Cuming county and probably a total of 30 to 40 creek miles.

The crest moved slowly because the water backed deep into many fields and drained back out after the crest had passed. Considerable corn was ruined... and a lot of small grain lost... a good deal more would have been lost by farmers having planned their farms to "live with the

creek"... they plan their crop land so it will not be affected too much by the smaller flash floods; but this action does rob Plum creek valley residents of a lot of valuable crop land... land that is very fertile.

Proper drainage plus the increased use of soil conservation practices could cut this flooding damage down to mere pennies in place of thousands of dollars lost now.

Plum creek valley needs control of water runoff... if this waste of unharvested crop dollars could be stopped a project of this nature could be made to pay for itself in not too many years in extra bushels raised.

In that flooding water is some of the best soil in Wayne and Cuming counties... fertile top soil lost to the area forever and on its way to the river.

A practical plan of drainage backed with good soil conservation practices is needed and every help possible given this project is a step forward for the entire county.—Wisner News-Chronicle.

# Developments Building Head Of Steam In Gas Tax Battle

Lincoln—The fight over the petition drive aimed at repealing the seventh cent of state gasoline tax is taking on a full head of steam early.

Opposition to the circulation of petitions calling for a vote in November, 1958, on whether Nebraska should have the present six or the new seven-cent tax is gathering rapidly.

Farm and petroleum groups—as in the past—are leading the campaign for the vote.

But they do not have a familiar ally in this road revenue battle. That long-time friend is the Nebraska Motor Carriers whose 600 members voted overwhelmingly to stay out of the scrap.

The truckers were in a spot. If

the petition drive is successful and a special session of the Legislature were called—as is believed to be the case—the truckers likely would get stuck with a heavy tax of some kind.
