**Board Approves County Budget, 6.44 Mill Levy**

Wayne county commissioners approved the 1957-58 budget at a hearing last Wednesday afternoon at the courthouse. No objections to the proposed levy of 6.44 mills were voiced.

A state levy of 8.23 mills was approved Friday by the State Board of Equalization. Another 1.02 mills will be levied for the mental hospital fund, Clerk C. A. Bard said.

**Indications are county taxpayers will pay \$1.55 per \$1,000 valuation more in taxes than they did a year ago. This figure applies to the state, county and mental taxes. Local school district, town or village and free high school tuition levies must be added to this amount.**

Bard said the free high school levy may be close to seven-mills. The levy last year was 5.42 mills. This means rural district taxpayers would pay an additional \$1.58 per \$1,000 valuation.

Wayne's city levy was set at 14.50 mills by the city council. This is an increase of 20 cents per \$1,000 valuation over 1956.

County Assessor Henry Arp revealed valuations for franchises and railroad rolling stock Tuesday but complete tabulations on the county valuation were not available at press time Wednesday. Levies for the various county school districts will be determined after this tabulation is made.

### All Judging Scheduled on Saturday

Exhibitors and fair board members were working feverishly this week wrapping up details before the opening of the 1957 Wayne county fair Saturday.

The annual show will continue through Monday, Friday is entry day with 8 p. m. as the deadline for all entries to be placed.

Saturday's program will be highlighted by the evening grandstand performance of the DeLafayette attractions magic circus. A livestock parade and placing of 3-H champion pigs will precede the show.

All judging will be done Saturday afternoon. The afternoon will feature an open class steer show.

Sunday's grandstand attraction will be two performances of the Wayne county horse show. Entries in 16 classes and six events are expected from several NE Nebraska counties.

The afternoon show will start at 2 and the evening at 7. The early show will include hat race, keg roping and junior musical chair events. Classes includes foals at manger, ponies under 48 inches, junior ponies and yearlings. A Wayne county special is also planned.

The evening show has obstacle, senior musical chair and barrel bending events. Classes are men's pleasure, pommies, ladies' pleasure, pair parade and stock horse.

Organist, Vaughn Charnett will provide music for the evening show.

Judging of the open class steer show is scheduled at 1 p. m. Sunday.

Monday is planned as children's day. All rides on the midway will operate from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. In the evening grandstand attraction is a 4-ft style event at 7:30 and an 11-foot program by Marian Shows.

The production will include dog, wire and comedy acts, a ventriloquist and a team circus line.

Slight changes in the admission policies were announced by Fair Secretary Al Bane. Admission to the ground will be free until 5 p. m. Saturday and Monday. After that time and after 2 p. m. Sunday admission will be 50 cents per person with a maximum family charge of \$1.50.

Grandstand admissions remain the same all three days—75 cents for high school and adults and 50 cents for children under 12.

## Explain New Regulations on Soil Bank Program for 1958

### Friday Meet Slated Here For Officials

ASU officials from six NE Nebraska counties will meet in Wayne Friday for a district conference on procedures for the 1958 soil bank acreage reserve program.

The meeting will be held at 10 a. m. at Hotel Morrison. Officials from Dakota, Wayne, Cedar, Dixon, Stanton and Pierce counties are expected.

Two major changes have been made in acreage reserve provisions for 1958. They are:

1. A total crop acreage figure for each farm based primarily on past production history will be established. This figure will be known as the soil bank base with the requirement that total harvested acreage in 1956 be held below the base by the equivalent of the number of acres placed in the soil bank.
2. A limit of \$3,000 on the total of 1958 acreage reserve payments to any one producer will be inaugurated.

Establishment of the soil bank base will be intended to check a tendency to shift production from acreage reserve crops to other crops which contribute to overall surpluses.

Crops making up the soil bank base will in general be all crops produced for harvest on a farm, except hay crops. In Nebraska these crops will include corn, wheat, rye, oats, barley, flax, forage and grain sorghums, soybeans, field beans and peas, sugar beets, potatoes and millet or Sudan cut feed.

Small grains and sorghums used only for pasture and millet and Sudan used for pasture or hay will not be classed as soil bank base crops.

The soil bank base for individual farms will be established by the County ASC committee primarily on the basis of the average acreage of land devoted to soil bank base crops during the past two years, 1956 and 1957.

The soil bank base provision has been in effect for the conservation reserve part of the soil bank since its beginning. For 1958 it will apply to farms taking part in either or both of the soil bank programs. Where a farm already has a base established under the conservation reserve, that base will apply.

In the acreage reserve agreement, participating farmers will agree to limit their harvest of soil bank base crops. The limit, called permitted acreage, will be determined by subtracting the number of acres in the conservation reserve from the soil bank base total.

Harvesting more total acreage from a farm than the permitted acreage will make the producer subject to a civil penalty in addition to the loss of acreage reserve payment. The civil penalty is 50 percent of the payment which would have been made for compliance with all provisions of the program.

This is the same civil penalty which applies if the farmer permits grazing of the acreage reserve, takes a crop from it that year or harvests more acres of the acreage reserve crop than the difference between the farm allotment and the acreage reserve.

The \$3,000 payment limit applies to the total acreage reserve payments to any one producer. This limit does not apply to conservation reserve payments which have a separate limit of \$5,000.

If a farmer puts acreage in both the acreage reserve and conservation reserve, he could be eligible for payments up to \$3,000 and \$5,000 respectively, or a total of \$8,000 for the year.

Individual farm per-acre rates will be established as in previous years. Farmers who took part in the 1957 acreage reserve program will be paid a 10 percent premium above the 1958 payment rate if they put the identi-

cal land in the acreage reserve program for 1958.

In addition to the provision that noxious weeds must be controlled on acreage reserve land, participants in the 1958 program may also be required to control erosion.

After the deadline for signing agreements covering a particular crop under the 1958 acreage reserve, participating farmers will not be permitted to withdraw from the program.

For the 1957 program there were special provisions under which, in certain circumstances, a producer could withdraw voluntarily from an acreage reserve agreement up to the time he received notice of the last basic crop allotment for his farm.

The 1958 acreage reserve program will be first available for winter wheat to be seeded this fall for harvest next year. Details of the program for spring-seeded crops will be announced before their sign-up period next spring.

### Local Youth to Leave Sunday for Driving Contest

Ervin Hagemann, Jr., Wayne, will fly from Sioux City Sunday afternoon to participate in the sixth annual national teen-age road race in Washington, D. C., which opens Monday.

Hagemann will represent Nebraska Jaycees in the competition. He won the Nebraska road race at Red Cloud earlier this summer.

The national contest will include four days of thorough testing. Examinations will include a written test of common sense, driving knowledge, a performance test in four obstacle types, exercises on road check for in-traffic performance, a driving attitude test, a psycho-physical test specially designed to check reaction and a personal interview.

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### Rains, Cooling Breezes Drive Readings Down

Wayne county's crop prospects continue to improve under good weather conditions, although grasshoppers and corn borers continue to make inroads on alfalfa seed crops and corn fields.

More than an inch of rain soaked the county Friday with some reports of locally heavier amounts up to an inch and one-half. Minor hail damage was reported north of Wayne.

An average oats yield of 35 bushels per acre was reported for the county by Extension Agent Harold Ingalls, with most of the harvest completed.

Temperatures Friday night took a sharp drop, bringing cooling relief and sending many county residents groping for covers as the colder air moved in on strong winds.

High reading for the period was 100 degrees Thursday. Friday's 96-degree reading was followed by a cool 78-degree reading Saturday.

## Plan Public Meeting Friday on Plum Creek Watershed Control

### Three-County Session Set At Wisner

A mass meeting of land owners in the area drained by Plum Creek will be held at the Wisner city auditorium at 8:30 p. m. Friday. Purpose of the session is to determine the opinion of land owners toward establishing a Plum Creek watershed to curtail damaging runoff waters.

About 300 persons from Cumming, Wayne and Thurston counties are expected to attend. The proposed watershed area is to cover 103,000 acres with 30,000 in Wayne county, 60,000 in Cumming county and the balance in Stanton and Thurston counties.

The first meeting is important to all land owners who live in the area drained by Plum Creek in Cumming, Wayne and Thurston counties. Arthur Marquardt, Lincoln, state conservationist in charge of watersheds, will be on hand to explain each step in the program if the watershed is to be established.

A temporary steering committee had been named in Cumming county to inaugurate plans for Friday's meeting. Members are Al Seeman, chairman; Charles Peterson, Miller, S. G. Karlen and Howard Drake.

The Plum Creek watershed, if approved, would be eligible for Federal funds for large type water detention structures.

The principles of a watershed are to prevent flooding by holding water where it falls with small farm dams and larger detention dams where needed at the headquarters of Plum Creek.

The water is then allowed to seek its way to the river in an orderly and slow manner. Farm ponds are created with small outlets and the entire area is designed to handle five and six inch rains without trouble.

Individual farms are asked to enter the water conservation measures to hold water on the land. This is to improve crops and eliminate damaging runoffs.

The mass meeting at Wisner is designed to present the plan for the area watershed and to have qualified engineers and officials on hand to answer all individual questions.

### Three-County Session Set At Wisner

Activities will open with a judging contest at 8:30 a. m. It is open to all youths under 21 years old who have not had professional training.

Judging of swine, sheep dairy and beef animals will follow the contest. E. P. Duren, Rising City, will judge the livestock exhibits.

Children's races are planned in the afternoon with Marvin Weber in charge. Cash prizes will be awarded. Another afternoon feature will be a tractor driving demonstration by the Allen Easter 4-H club.

Tournament finals of the local softball league will highlight the evening program. A fireworks exhibition is planned between the two games. Rides and concessions will also be available throughout the day.

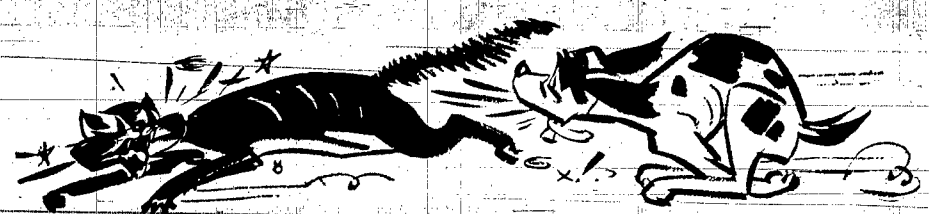

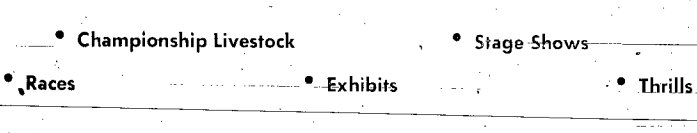

 Lincoln—It's a considerable time until the legislature meets but there is one subject that will get more than the normal share of attention—taxation. Importance of this subject in the one-house body has grown with each session.

And in the interim, study groups composed of state senators have delved into the many-sided problems of equitized taxation among all the citizens. This time, a committee headed by the fiery Sportsbluff lawmaker, Sen. Terry Carpenter, is having a turn at ferreting out violators of existing tax laws. Some observers feel this may have considerable bearing on the sales-income versus property tax fight that will be a big one when the gavel opens the 1959 session. Carpenter has said that his com-

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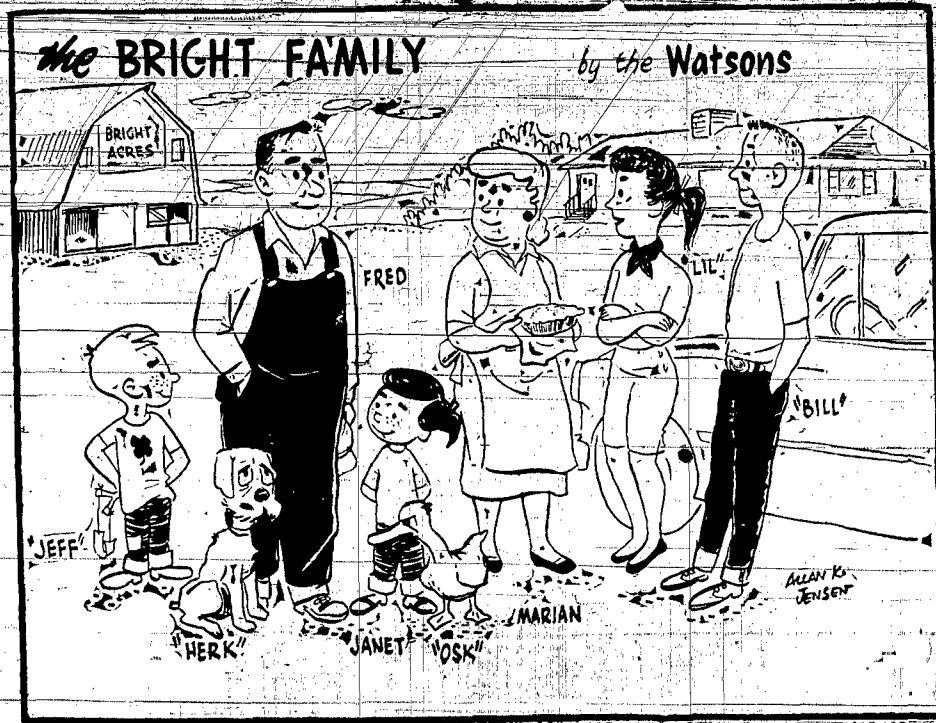

## County Agent's Column

### Agent Lists Tips on Mixing Weed Killers, Insecticides

Mixing weed and insect killers may provide a double barreled attack on two pests. Robert E. Roselle, University of Nebraska extension entomologist, says 2,4-D and grasshopper insecticides are usually compatible. Combinations are especially valuable in field margins where grasshoppers are numerous. Before mixing two chemicals in a large spray tank combine a small amount of each in a small container of water. If no curds appear the spray will be all right to use in tanks. Roselle suggests using aldrin at one pint per acre, or dieldrin at 3/4 pint per acre for grasshoppers, and 2,4-D for weeds in field margins. The greatest difference between chopping and baling generally is in cost of harvesting. There is

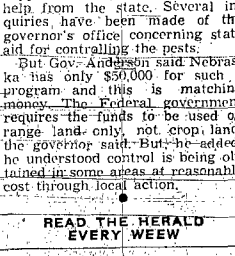
## No Priority

What some legislative observers figured may be a king-sized headache for Gov. Victor Anderson in having veto power over expenditures from the state building fund may not be that at all. The governor said he is not going to determine priority of construction of buildings by governing boards of state agencies wanting to spend institutional building funds. His veto, the governor said, will be strictly confined to whether cost of the structure proposed is too high. Some observers in the recent Legislature which gave him the veto power thought it might put the chief executive in the middle of an inter-community fight. But the governor said he is not going to encroach in the field of administration—now covered by such boards as those for the University of Nebraska and the four teachers colleges. The first opportunity for getting in the middle of an inter-city battle came up when the State Normal board decided to build a pre-rails, arts structure at Peru college. The governor said he feels the lines have been getting a "fair deal" and indicated in no uncertain terms that he doesn't like them, automatically appealing every year when the values set by the board. Gov. Anderson flatly told railroad attorneys he would not go along with any change in the board's original figure. Two companies, the Burlington and Missouri Pacific, asked at a public hearing that the state board reconsider and cut their values. The chief executive said he was not going to change the value of railroads and push this on to the regular property owner. State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington then said as one member of the board he feels the group should make a recommendation to the next session of the Legislature. That should be, Herrington said, since the lawmakers' spell out in law how railroads should be assessed for tax purposes, or change the formula. This could kick off one of the strongest tax fights in years in the Legislature. The railroad lobby in the Unicameral has been an effective one as it is powerful. Value of the Burlington for tax purposes was set by the board at \$54.8 million. Railroad attorneys said the figure should be \$41 million.

## No Hopper Funds

At the present time it looks like farmers will have to get together locally to fight the grasshopper menace, without financial help from the state. Several inquiries have been made of the governor's office concerning state aid for controlling the pests. But Gov. Anderson said Nebraska has only \$50,000 for such a program and this is matching money. The Federal government requires the funds to be used on range land only, not crop land, he understood control is being obtained in some areas at reasonable cost through local action.
