Seek Bids on New Car for Police Soon

Main street storm sewer construction and two paving projects were the main business before Wayne's city council Tuesday night.

Councilmen agreed to proceed with the main street sewer which would replace existing facilities from First street south to Fairgrounds avenue.

Bids on this project, estimated at about \$10,500, will be opened Sept. 10. Installation of a 30-inch sewer to replace the present 18-inch is expected to solve the flooding problem on Main street between First and Second streets during heavy rains.

A petition filed by property owners on Douglas Street between Twelfth and Thirteenth was received. The council adopted an ordinance creating a paving district there and through the swimming pool park. This project is estimated at \$10,365. Bids will be opened Sept. 10.

Another proposed paving project was tabled until the entire council is present for the next meeting. Mrs. P. W. Willert and Eleanor Edwards requested the council to pass an ordinance creating a paving district for West Third street between Sherman and Blaine.

Cooler Temperatures, Rain Keep Crop Prospects Good

The approach of fall was evident in Northwest Nebraska the past week as cooling fronts moved onto the area and daytime temperatures down to the low 60's at night. Daytime readings topped in the 80's and 90's with a week's high of 96.

Showers during the period totalled .38 inch of moisture with .25 inch falling last Thursday and another .13 inch coming Tuesday. These rains brought total August rainfall to 1.44 inch.

Crop conditions in the county have remained unchanged, according to County Agent Harold Ingalls. Ingalls, along with University of Nebraska Agronomist M. D. Wedon, conducted a survey of county crops Wednesday afternoon.

A preliminary tour Tuesday revealed extensive corn hot damage in some fields, while grasshopper damage was heavy around the perimeters in some areas.

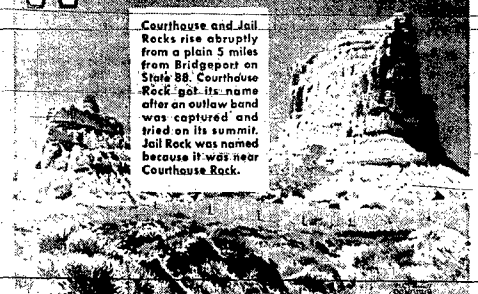

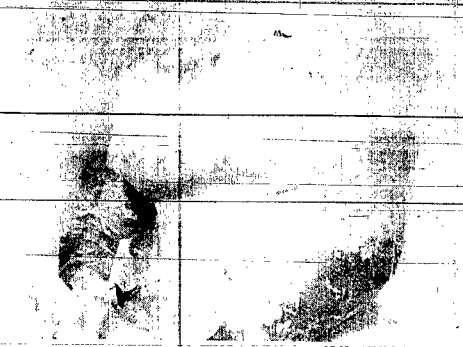

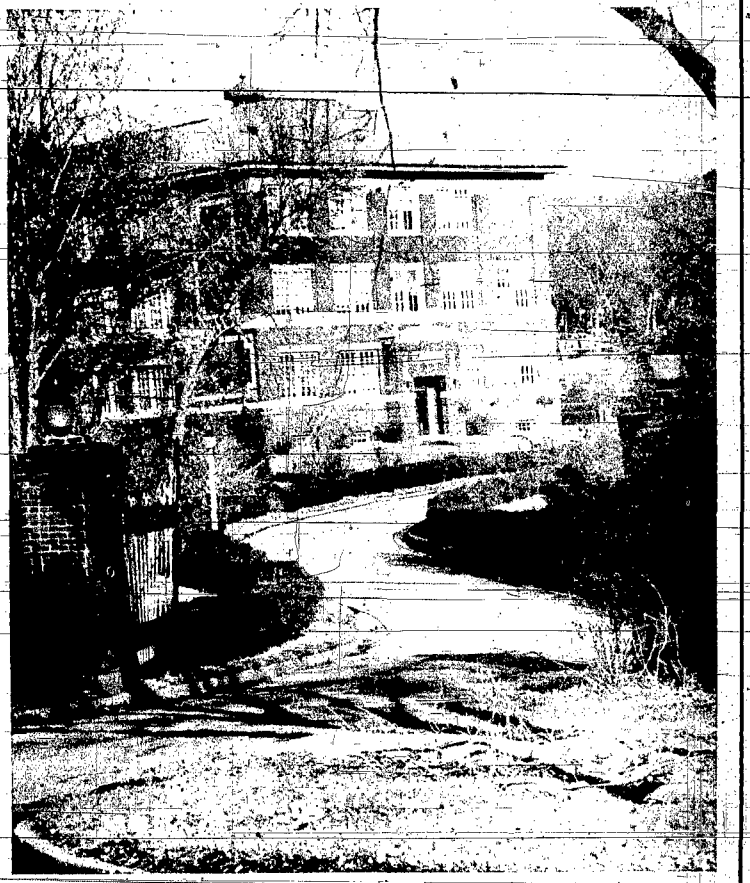

Gov. Anderson Proposes New Finance Plan for Interstate

Lincoln—The interest in and controversy about Nebraska's interstate highway has not dimmed. There have been several recent developments of note concerning the super four-lane route that is to one day span the state from east to west.

Now the Federal government puts in 90 percent of the cost of building the route and the state 10 percent. But last week at a conference of a special committee of the governor's conference in Pennsylvania, Gov. Victor Anderson proposed that the Federal government handle the interstate entirely.

Because of the high standards required by the Federal govern-

ment in projects in which it has money invested, Nebraska and other states must choose between the national government's strictly settled areas or expansion ones that meet Federal standards. Without the requirements Nebraska could build dustless surface routes in thinly populated areas that would serve the traffic but be inexpensive.

The people have never fully accepted the principle of an inter-state highway in Nebraska because they feel present roads should be built first. This is despite repeated reports from State Engineer L. N. Ross that Nebraska roads have last priority on funds with the interstate.

Unicameral Interest

Several citizens in North Dakota are pushing a movement to change the state government to a unicameral system. Some Grand Rapids, N.D. business men are interested in cutting expenses of state government and feel the Legislature is a good place to start.

The two-house North Dakota Legislature cost \$125,411 more than the last session of the Nebraska Legislature. It has 49 senators and 113 representatives compared to Nebraska's total membership of 43 senators.

There are also four more persons working for the North Dakota Legislature than there are senators and representatives. A petition move there would be the first of its type in the state.

A North Dakota representative conferred with Hugo Sirb, clerk of the Nebraska Legislature, last week. Sirb is a leading exponent of the Unicameral Legislature.

Bingo Drive

County Agent's Column...

Aphid Threat Not Serious Enough for Control Steps

by Harold Ingalls

Farmers are interested to know that in most cases the insect does not cause enough damage to warrant control.

Lloyd Anderson, University of Nebraska extension entomologist, said that in serious infestations of aphids on soybeans and larvae of leafhoppers kill the aphids. Control, he said, is difficult when plants are in the whorl and leaves are folded.

Anderson said if infestation increases when heads are emerging, an application of 1 1/2 pints of malathion per acre in 20 gallons of water is recommended. It should be applied with sprayer nozzles directly over the rows, he said.

Quality Stage

Feeding quality of silage depends upon the methods used in filling the silo as well as upon the forage with which it is filled, says C. W. Nisler, University of Nebraska extension dairyman.

Quality is usually determined within a few hours after ensiling because that's when the fermentation process important to preservation takes place.

USDA research shows that an important key to successful preservation is immediate exclusion of air from the silage.

Some farmers weighted and used quality silage in the USDA experiments. Oxygen present was used up by bacteria and plant enzymes within about five hours. Candidates then became favorable for other bacteria to take over and start the preservation process by converting sugars in lactic, acetic and succinic acids.

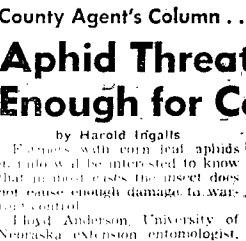
On the other hand, forage left loose and unsealed for two days spoiled. And spoilage was even more complete when air was forced through the forage.

Managed Runoff

Grass waterways are the backbone of a water disposal system to avoid the threat of gully erosion on rolling fields. August and September are the very best months to establish them and make new seedings.

Necessary steps to establish a new grass waterway include shaping the channel to the proper depth and width with a bulldozer blade or other landforming equipment, fertilizing with rotted manure and commercial fertilizer and preparing a good seedbed.

Use of a green mulch from a light seeding of spring oats for a companion crop to the grass mixture has often proved successful. The oats will make just enough growth in the fall before being killed by frost to prevent washing of the new waterway. The first winter and seeding a spring grain will not compete with the grass the following season. Dry mulch may be used in place of the green mulch by cutting in straw with a disk harrow on which the disks are set straight.
