

'57 County Corn Loan Rate Pegged at \$1.29 per Bushel

May Redeem Old Loans at \$1.23 Bushel

Loan rates on Wayne county's 1957 corn crop were announced Wednesday by ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins.

Final official rates will not be set until Oct. 1, Jenkins said, but changes in market conditions upward.

The lower 1957 rate could mean substantial savings to Wayne county farmers who participated in the soil bank and still have 1955 or 1956 crop corn under loan on their farms.

Jenkins explained the following policies on new corn support loans.

Ear corn containing not more than 20.5 percent moisture will be eligible for loan until Feb. 28, 1958.

Shell corn is eligible for loan as long as moisture does not exceed 15 percent and meets other grading requirements.

A crib in Wayne county for 20.5 percent moisture content must not be more than nine feet in width.

Also a permanent type roof of wood or metal supported above the crib to allow ventilation must be provided.

Mrs. J. H. Morrison and her son, Bill, plan to sell their hotel furnishings, business, cafe and package liquor store and move to California.

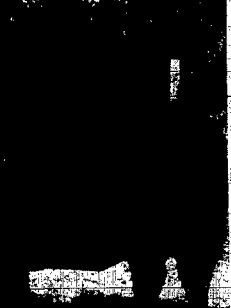
Morrison purchased the hotel business here in May, 1945. The late J. H. Morrison served as WSTC athletic coach from 1938 until several months after purchasing the hotel.

Agent Says Corn Borers Threat Until September

Corn growing costs averaged only 58 cents per bushel when yields average 80 bushels per acre, but costs jumped to 84 cents a bushel when yields average only 35 bushels, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement committee. Profits averaged 67 cents per bushel on the 80-bushel yields with corn selling at \$1.25. But profits were only 41 cents for the 35-bushel per acre yields. Thus the farmer with the higher yield was actually getting 26 cents more per bushel for

Capitol News . . .

Capitol Working Conditions Causes Concern for Governor

Lincoln—Working conditions in the statehouse have been for years a subject of concern on the part of governors. Hours, pay and days off have been main problems. The last Legislature took a big step in authorizing a 40-hour week for statehouse workers. But that can come only if departments can get by without spending more money. Some departments must work long hours. Notably, this includes the State Safety Patrol and personnel at ports of entry. They are excluded from the 40-hour bill. In the capitol itself are about 1,500 employees. Many are under a merit system. This is required for Labor, Welfare and Health departments because they spend federal funds under a Federal law which requires merit pay scales. Gov. Victor Anderson has taken a new approach to the problem of rules and working conditions. He has conferred with heads of appointive departments. The governor wants the department heads to come up with some recommendations on changing the unequal pay and hours situations within the capitol. Involved in the problem are too much out-of-state travel, too frequent and too long "coffee breaks" by some departments and heavy travel within the state. It will be a difficult job to come up with a set of regulations to cover all angles of state government. But the governor feels there should be similar rules applying to all departments. Gov. Anderson's attitude has been that he wants to be fair with all employees. But, he said, there must be uniform adherence to coffee breaks of 15 minutes in the morning and 15 in the afternoon and less expensive travel in and out of state. "I favor the coffee break," the governor commented at a news conference. He said it improves efficiency of office workers and is generally recognized in private business. But, he said, there have been some abuses by some departments called to his attention and these must stop. Also, the chief executive said, he will not tolerate Nebraska sending representatives clear across the country to meetings of national groups at expensive resort areas. Nebraska personnel, he said, are going to have to stand up in these national meetings and state that the governor's policy is to have the meetings nearer the center of the county and at less costly quarters. Otherwise, said the governor, Nebraska will not send representatives, and he added "that would be bad." Next week the elected officials hope to come up with some recommendations on how to go about solving some of the most pressing problems concerning employee working conditions. Another problem that may be solved in the near future is the

matter of keeping statehouse offices cool in the hot summer. The governor said progress is being made on rewriting of the statehouse to accommodate heavy electrical loads. That will clear the way for consideration of individual coolers for offices.

Petition Drive
 If preliminary plans go through as scheduled, Secretary of State Frank Marshall's office may be counting about 250,000 names on four petitions before November, 1958. Two petition drives, calling for a vote next year, are underway.

To repeal the seventh cent of state gasoline tax. To legalize bingo for fraternal non-profit organizations. In the talking stage are plans for drives for votes on abolishing the State Board of Education and restricting use of trading stamps in Nebraska. All subjects have come up in the Legislature recently. The seventh cent of state gasoline tax was passed by the last Unicameral. The same group killed a bill that would have permitted bingo on a local option basis in counties. And, a measure to abolish the State Board of Education got axed in committee during the last session. The trading stamp matter was the subject of several bills in the 1955 Legislature. In the 1955 session angry housewives and stamp company attorneys succeeded in kill-

ing the proposed legislation on the premium stamps. The Farm council and petroleum and railroad unions are circulating the gasoline tax petitions. The proposed bingo is being backed by the State VFW and the State Fraternal Order of Eagles. The Farmers Union, involved in the gasoline tax fight, is talking about the Board of Education drive. The anti-stamp drive is to be launched by a non-profit group which has filed articles of incorporation. It says its aim is to restrict and eliminate if possible the "arch enemy" of retailers—the trading stamp. Two Omaha attorneys incorporated the anti-stamp organization. **Gov. Anderson's Mansion** Steps are underway to acquire all of the block on which the new gov. mansion is being built across the street south from the capitol. The Capitol Building commission has authorized purchase of one of seven buildings remaining on the block at a cost of \$20,000. The lands were appropriated by the Legislature. The state dining room in the new mansion will look out over wash on the line from apartments and residences south of the mansion unless the buildings are acquired. A driveway to the mansion will be built where the first house was purchased. Landscaping plans call for the entire block to be taken care of and Gov. Anderson says the commission will consider at a later date the problem of actually acquiring the land.

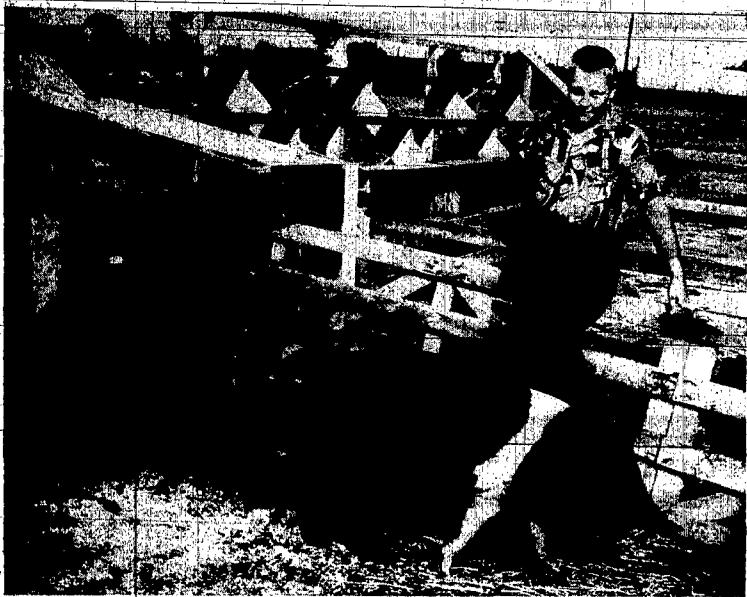

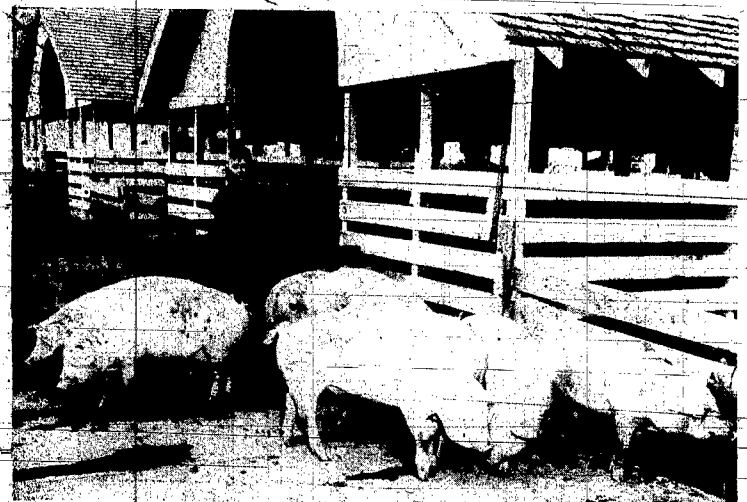

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
