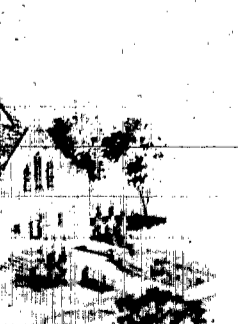
Weeds, Lawn Clippings Delay Alley Projects

Omahan Named District Agent?



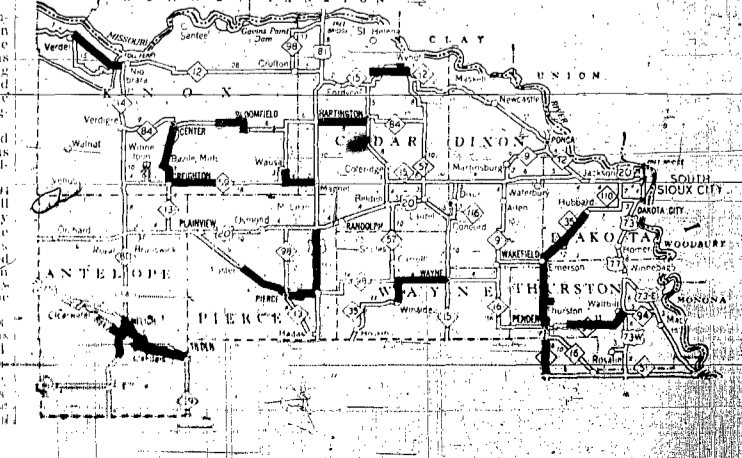

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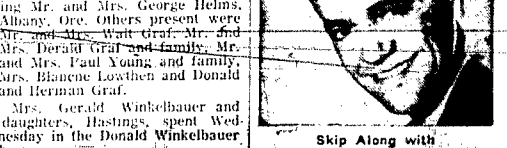

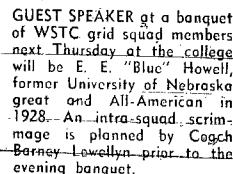

Added Responsibilities

With the opening of schools next week, drivers and pedestrians will be faced with added responsibilities.

Many youngsters will be attending school for the first time, some of them unaware of the importance of watching traffic.

The driver will have to bear the bulk of the chore of watching children on their way to and from school, but parents can do much to help youngsters become more safety-conscious.

Insist that children:

- Walk on sidewalks wherever possible;
- Walk facing traffic where no sidewalks exist;
- Always watch for traffic before crossing streets;
- Don't play on the way to and from school.

These are pretty elementary facts, but they may save your child's life.

Building a Ghost Town

A recent report from the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce tells how to make a ghost town. It is an interesting tongue-in-cheek report that will hold just as true in Wayne as it does in that town. It went as follows:

Results are certain for those working to create more "Ghost Towns" if these simple directions are followed either by accident or design. Hundreds of former thriving communities which are now silent ghost towns prove there is more truth than poetry to the simple statement "It could happen here."

Here are methods proved by experience to guarantee bankruptcy, insanity, disappointment, suicides—all by products of ghost towns:

1. Tell everyone you meet that you never buy anything at home; the merchants are a bunch of crooks, robbers and cheats.
2. Belittle all efforts for community betterment—the people trying to do these things are secretly making a lot of money, want to "run

things" and their way of doing things is all wrong anyway.

3. Never waste money by advertising or waste time trying to attract trade to the town—nobody reads the ads, there is never anything in the paper, and why should anyone want to come to town—it's a dead place.
4. Turn down all appeals for contributions; and do it in a nasty way so you won't be bothered again, because the money collected is eventually stolen by some "higher-ups" anyway.
5. Refuse to serve on all committees, have nothing to do with civic organizations—the Chamber of Commerce never does anything and is run by a bunch of dimwits who want only to get their names before the public. All the city officials are in office to get a share of the graft.

There you have it—five simple directions for producing a ghost town. It's hard for one person to do it but if you keep at it, eventually you'll get some converts, and a Ghost Town.

Interest Above Normal Over 1958 Election Possibilities

Lincoln, There appears to be more than the normal amount of interest by candidates now in the 1958 elections. Several candidates have already tossed their proverbial "bats" into the political ring. Most of them for the office of state treasurer.

Gov. Victor Anderson became the first to publicly announce as a candidate for the chief executive's chair. The governor, a Republican, will be bidding for his third term, campaigning on an economy and experience theme. This promptly drew comment from Bernard Boyle, Democratic National committee member.

Boyle said the amount of money being spent by the Republican administration in Nebraska will be a campaign issue in the 1958 political wars.

The governor is not the first to seek a third term. Val Peterson made it as did Dwight Griswold, both Republicans, and R. L. Cochran, a Democrat.

So far it appeared there would not be much opposition to Gov. Anderson from any Republican candidate who might be a formidable opponent.

Mentioned on the Democratic ledger have been Lawrence Brock, Frank Sorrell and Frank Morrison. Brock, however, is expected to bid for Congress in the Third district. Sorrell probably would have to be drafted, which leaves Morrison as a likely prospect, or possibly State Demo Chairman Willard Townsend, Lincoln.

Other observers say the maneuver is "psychological warfare."



Start Control Measures Now for Box Elder Bugs

Considerable interest in Tetra Petkus rye is again evident on the part of Nebraska farmers and seedmen. In Nebraska outstate yield tests the grain yields of Tetra Petkus have not been satisfactory. A low level of winter hardiness has been noted elsewhere. At Pieris in 1956 the winter survival of Tetra Petkus was about 20 percent, whereas Balbo and other common varieties had 100 percent survival.

Some Tetra Petkus kernels are approximately twice as large as those of common rye, it is necessary to double the rate of seeding to obtain a comparable stand. Tetra Petkus is late maturing—about 30 days later than common rye. Illinois reports that it starts growth about two weeks later in the spring than Balbo.

Box Elder Bug Control

Now is the time to start control measures against box elder bugs. Early control will help prevent invasions into buildings during the fall and winter.

Spray congregations of box elder bugs with chlordane or malathion while they are still feeding on vegetation. Use two tablespoons of 45 percent chlordane or one tablespoon of 57 percent malathion per gallon of water. Sprays must be applied thoroughly in order to kill the bugs.

Boar Testing Results

Dr. Ralph Durham in charge of swine breeding at the Iowa Experiment station made these comments recently about their boar testing station.

"One of the things that the central station has done for Iowa hog men, both purebred and commercial, is to point up the meaning of some of the testing terms. Things like 'efficiency,' 'daily gain,' 'index,' etc. are coming to be generally understood by hog raisers. As they understand these things, they are better able to interpret testing results when breeding stock is offered for sale."


"Another vital factor helped by the station is 'price psychology.' Many breeders were of the opinion that it wouldn't do any good to test boars, since buyers wouldn't pay any more for a good one than for a poor one. However, the results from the sales indicate clearly that commercial men will pay good prices for good boars, where a good record follows them, and that they will pay appreciably more for high indexing boars than for low indexing boars."

"One of the disappointments from the testing station has been the reluctance of purebred breeders to buy good boars. A few have gone to purebred breeders in cash sale, but many breeders have been literally 'outbid' by commercial producers. The fact that the commercial man is willing to bid vigorously is healthy. But the fact remains that the purebred man must use good boars to improve his cannot expect to improve such things as feeding efficiency by buying boars of unknown merit."


