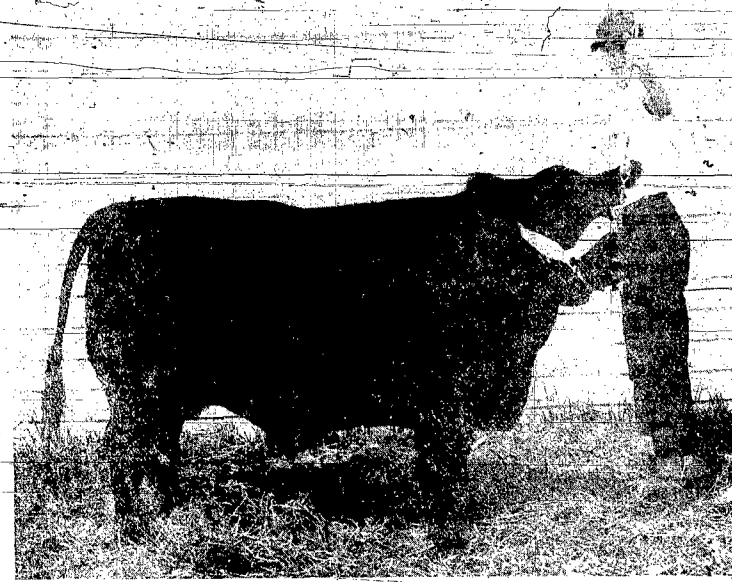

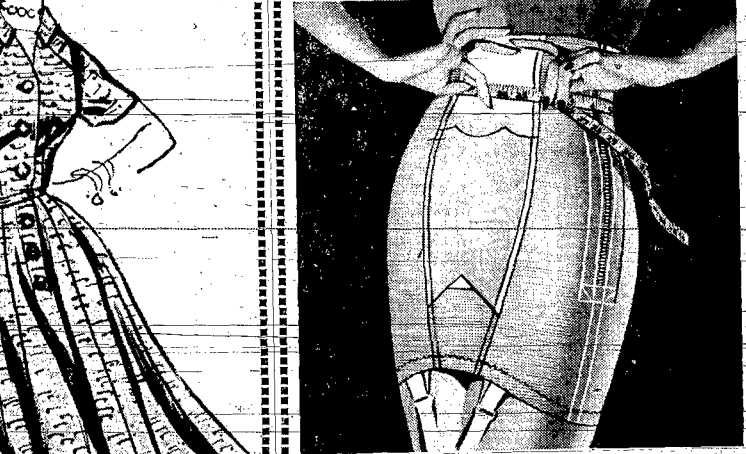

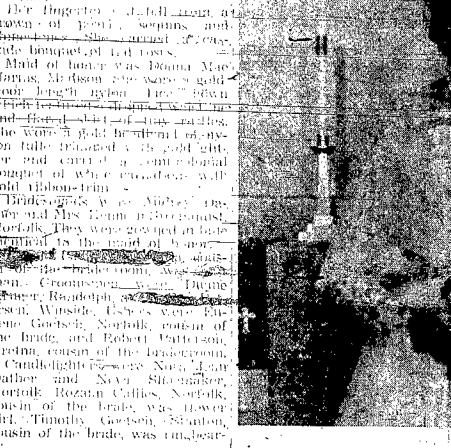

Immanuel Lutheran church, northeast of Wayne will observe its diamond jubilee Sunday with special services, Rev. T. H. Buehner announced this week.

Services will be held at 10:30 a. m. and 2:30 p. m. Guest speakers will be Rev. Paul Gutknecht, Peta- lina, Calif.; Rev. Luther Doctor, Omaha; and Rev. F. C. Doctor, Scottsbluff. Charles Messerschmidt, jr., Wayne, will be guest organist.

Rev. Gutknecht and Rev. Luther Doctor are sons of former pastors. Rev. F. C. Doctor is a former pastor.

Immanuel Lutheran congregation was formally organized Nov. 24, 1862. Barner that year services were conducted at regular intervals by Rev. W. G. Bullinger, Hartshurst.

Charter members of the congregation were Christopher, Henry, sr., and William Hinrichsen, Henry Meyer, sr., Karl Krakow, John Lutz, John Hirschert and William Woffert, sr.

The first church was erected in 1881. Rev. H. Wehling, a graduate of Concordia seminary, Springfield, Ill., was called as the first resident pastor. He immediately established a Christian day school and served as teacher.

The congregation joined the Missouri synod in 1886. Rev. Wehling accepted a call to Alta, Ia. in 1899 and Rev. C. A. Gutknecht accepted the Immanuel pastorate he was to serve over 21 years.

With growth of the congregation, a new church was erected in 1898. The old building was converted into a parochial school. T. Capelle was named as the first regular school teacher in 1909. He served six years.

When Rev. Gutknecht accepted a call to Hampton in 1910, Rev. E. Gehrke, Industry, Ia., was named Immanuel pastor. He served the congregation 17 years. Theodore Schmidt, North Judson, Ind., came to succeed him and moved to Christ church, Norfolk, five years later. He was succeeded by E. P. Gefer in 1920.

Rev. F. C. Doctor, Thawville, Ill., was installed as pastor Sept. 18, 1927. After Rev. Gehrke retired and moved to Bancroft, a basement was built under the church in 1929. Art glass windows were installed at the golden anniversary in 1932.

Teachers who served the school during this period were: E. Cholch, Brooklyn, N. Y.; E. G. Schultz; Theodore Hartmann; Robert Degner; Miss Buhl; and Richard Krugler.

The school was closed in 1952 because of inability to secure a teacher.

Rev. Doctor resigned in 1946 and Rev. Kruss, Bancroft, served as vacancy pastor. Rev. T. H. Buehner, Gregory, S. D., was installed as pastor June 3.

The congregation now has 166 members.

WITH FOOTBALL SEASON ABOUT TO BEGIN we recommend "The Homecoming Game" by Howard Nemerov. It is no heavy piece of world shaking literature but the plot should have appeal to residents of a college town such as ours since with this season the high prep and WSTC are playing football. The story is all about a student in a small college, a high principled student who discovers the difficulty of trying to put those same principles into practice when a crisis occurs. He expected a few repercussions when he gave a failing grade to the star of the football team, thereby disqualifying him on the eve of the season's most important game. But he is slightly taken aback when pressure is put on him, from most unexpected quarters. How the rug is pulled out from under all parties concerned make a good climax. We recommend it for adults and teenagers alike.

A memorable and original love story of a Chinese girl of the streets, it could have been a sordid story but in the hands of the author you remember Susie and what true love means to her. Momentum Gathers for Final Assault by New Gas Tax Foes

By Melvin Paul, Statehouse Correspondent
 Lincoln—The ruckus over the added cent of state gasoline tax is gathering momentum for an expected all-out assault just before the Sept. 20 deadline.
 On that date the farm, petroleum and railroad unions backing a drive to repeal the seventh cent of tax must have their petitions in the Secretary of State's office and counted.
 With some 28,000 valid names they can force a vote on the issue November 2, 1958. With 50,000 the law hiking the gas levy will not go into effect.
 If the anticipated petitions will be put in the Secretary of State's office probably a week before the deadline to insure plenty of time for counting and last minute legal maneuvers by petitioners on both sides of the controversy.

A side issue in the battle has been a post-card drive by the Better Nebraska association in which 250,000 were mailed to car owners. The cards asked the owners to have their names removed from any petitions they had signed.
 But because of the way the cards were worded, Secretary of State Frank Marshall has been accused of taking sides in the controversy. Actually, he knew nothing about the cards until they began coming into the office.
 Marshall has made no bones about the fact that he is unhappy with the post card drive, which some statehouse observers said probably is only a psychological warfare any way.

 Later, the remainder for regular Federal aid routes.

Mansion Dedication
 Nebraska's new governor's mansion cornerstone literally was laid in proper style. Gov. Victor Anderson not only read a dedication speech, spread the first mortar, both of which other guests did, but he physically helped lift the heavy stone into place.
 The cornerstone, containing historical documents and articles, weighed between 180 and 300 pounds. But the governor got hold of one end and a foreman on the mansion construction crew grabbed the other. They hoisted it into place.
 The new \$200,000 pink brick structure, of modified colonial design, is not expected to be ready for occupancy until December.

Mental Health
 Nebraska is slowly building up a staff of competent psychiatrists and is now in the process of preparing a mental health compact to equalize salaries for psychiatrists, to prevent any raiding of other parts of the state by a member of the compact group.
 Mrs. Catherine Martin, Nebraska board chairman, said such a proposal would not only save taxpayers money in all the states by preventing a salary race, but would help stabilize the mental health programs in the states.
 Proposed for membership in the group are Nebraska, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Missouri and Colorado.
 First, however, the Nebraska board will sound out officials of the other four states on the matter and then if they react favorably.

County Agent's Column . . .
 Silo filling time will soon be here. Getting good silage depends upon quality of forage, plant maturity and the way it is handled.
 The best corn silage is made when about 50 percent of the kernels are dent. Forage sorghums make the best silage when seeds are in the late dough or early ripe stage.
 Adequate moisture content of forage, combined with proper packing is the best preventative of moldy silage. Forage that is packed properly makes high quality silage.
 We have had numerous inquiries about putting grain sorghums in the silo. This may be one of the better ways of storing this crop. The information we have indicates that it is difficult to store the threshed grain sorghum unless it is run through a dryer.
 Ensiling the chopped grain heads should produce a feed similar to ear corn silage. It has been suggested that mixing the grain heads with some corn or forage sorghum might make a more palatable feed. The stalks of grain sorghum contain little sugar and are low in digestibility.
 Oats can be substituted for up to 1/3 of the corn in fattening rations for cattle in the dry lot or on grass.
 Paul G. Guyer, University of Nebraska extension husbandman, said substituting 1/3 of the corn with oats produces results comparable to the conventional straight corn hay ration.

County Agent's Column . . .
 Oats at 70 cents a bushel compare favorably with \$1.22 per bushel if the furnish 1/3 or less of the ration. If they are used in larger quantities—oats at 70 cents compare to corn at \$1.40 per bushel. Using larger quantities of oats may cause the value per pound to drop down to 75 percent of that of corn. Guyer points out that oats should be ground for yearlings and older cattle, Guyer said.
Ewes Should Be Gaining.
 Ewes should be gaining in weight and flesh during the last 1/3 of pregnancy if strong, healthy lambs are to be produced. That is the opinion of Paul G. Guyer, UN animal husbandman.
 Guyer said the ewes should gain between 10 and 20 pounds during the period from breeding to just before lambing.
 Scant feeding during the early pregnancy period and then feeding good during the last 1/3 of pregnancy produced results comparable to feeding good throughout the pregnancy period. The first method is the most economical way of feeding.
 Two pounds of alfalfa hay plus a low quality roughage should be sufficient during the late gestation period. Corn silage plus 2 pounds of a green protein supplement also can be used.
 Some lactating ewes are capable of producing a gallon of milk a day, Guyer went on to say. In order to insure good milk production, it is important to feed good during the lactation period.
 Guyer reminded producers that an additional 1 1/2 to two pounds grain is needed after lambing.

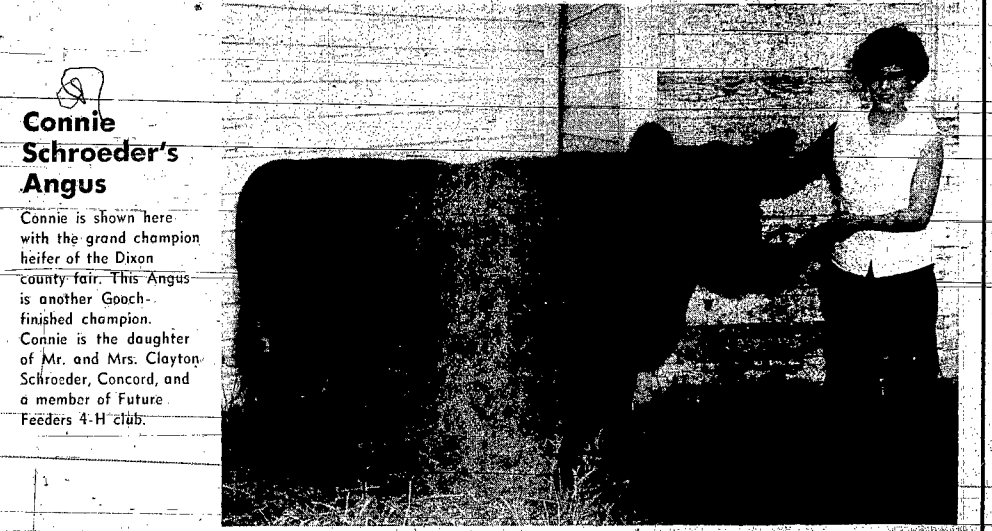
