Estimates Vary On Enrollment For WSTC Term

Speculation on the 1957-58 enrollment total at WSTC varied greatly, Wednesday as upperclassmen began registering following freshman registration Tuesday.

Estimates ran above and below the predicted 38-student drop from the record 4,083 total last year. The drop was predicted after the Legislature hiked non-resident tuition from \$140 to \$250 per year and resident fees from \$120 to \$150 a year.

However, since that figure was determined by administrative personnel, it might be swayed far below last year's record if tuition had remained at the same figure.

It was estimated about 370 freshmen took entrance examinations Monday and Tuesday.

Clarify Payment Limit Under New Soil Bank Plan

The \$3,000 limitation on payments under the soil bank's 1958 acreage reserve program will be applied to each producer with regard to each farm, ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins announced today.

Prior to a recent interpretation of the program provision by the U. S. comptroller general, there had been some question as to whether the limitation might be construed as a ceiling on the amount paid to the producer for all farms in which he had an interest.

According to Jenkins, the 1958 soil bank act provides, in part, that no part of this appropriation shall be used to formulate and administer an acreage reserve program which would result in total compensation being paid to any one producer in excess of \$3,000 with respect to 1958 crops.

The ruling is that Congress considered the limitation as applying to each producer regarding a particular farming unit, rather than a ceiling on the amount of compensation that can be paid to him for all farms in which he may have an interest.

Chairman Jenkins reminded farmers that the \$3,000 limit applies to total payment under 1958 acreage reserve programs on a particular farm in Wayne county. Payments for one particular farm cannot total over \$3,000 for wheat and corn acreage reserves he added.

Carhart Resigns Post on State Normal Board

Ralph Carhart, Wayne notified Gov. Victor Anderson Monday of his resignation as a member of the State Normal board. He cited pressing personal affairs as the reason.

Carhart had held the post 12 years. He was reappointed Jan. 1 by Gov. Anderson for a third six-year term. The Wayne man was first appointed by Gov. Dwight Griswold.

Hidden Taxes Take Big Bite of County Incomes

An analysis of these hidden taxes has been made by the Tax foundation, a national non-profit organization seeking more efficient government.

Application of its findings to Wayne county shows local residents paid an estimated \$5,850,000 in the past year directly and indirectly to tax collectors. It came out of a gross income of some \$18,500,000.

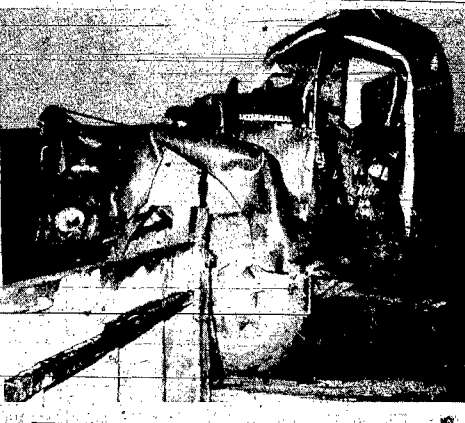
This, in general, is what the Tax foundation study shows:

A family with income of \$4,500 pays \$227 to Uncle Sam alone. State and local taxes amount to another \$271 for a grand total of \$1,042. In other words, such a family pays nearly a third of its earnings in taxes, visible and invisible.

The \$4,500 family pays \$1,538 to Uncle Sam and \$337 in State and local taxes, a total of \$1,425.

The \$7,500 family pays \$1,554 to Uncle Sam and \$679 in State and local taxes, making its cost for government \$2,237.

In Wayne county, where the gross income per family averaged \$6,275 last year and net earnings after income taxes, was \$5,305, the total tax bite including hidden taxes averaged \$2,050 per family.

Two Die as Trucks Crash

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at Trinity Lutheran church, Winside, for Lyle A. Nelson, 32, one of two persons killed in a two-truck crash between Winside and Hoskins Monday morning.

Nelson and Norman Schroer, 51, Norfolk, were killed about 6:45 a. m. Monday when their trucks collided at an intersection five miles north of Hoskins on old Highway 35.

Nelson was driving a semi-trailer grain truck owned by the Schmode-Weible trucking firm, Winside. Schroer was operating a semi-truck owned by Anderson Sand and gravel co., Norfolk.

Cause of the accident has not been determined as the two men were traveling alone in their trucks and no one saw the fatal crash. Nelson apparently was west bound and Schroer is believed to have been traveling north to Carroll.

The sand truck and the tractor on the grain truck were demolished. The front section of the sand truck was tipped over on its side. Both trucks were involved in a slight skid. Cause of the impact apparently threw Schroer from his vehicle. Nelson died of neck and hip fractures.

The crash was heard by Elmer Sloop, a farmer who lives near the intersection. He investigated and found both drivers dead. He then went to the Ed Schellenberg farm and called the State Highway patrol. Trooper Otis Knottwell investigated.

Nelson is survived by his wife and three children. Rev. M. K. Gubis will officiate at the services today. Burial will be in Pleasantview cemetery, Winside.

Services will be conducted today for Schroer at Norfolk Home for Funerals and Peace E. & R. church near Hoskins. Rev. George Heusinger will officiate. The body will lie in state from 3 to 9 p. m. today at the Home for Funerals.

The accident increased to 22 the number of persons killed this year in the 14 county area served by the Norfolk State patrol office. This compares with 16 a year ago.

City Councilmen Accept Bids On Storm Sewer, Park Paving

Bids Total \$18,000 on Two Projects

Wayne's city council Tuesday night accepted bids on about \$18,000 in storm sewer construction and street paving.

Lettings were made on two projects after only one bid was received on each of the items. The bids were approximately \$1,000 under the engineer's estimates for the work.

L. E. Ball Construction Co., Norfolk, was awarded the contract for a main storm sewer with a bid of \$8,951. The construction, to be completed by Nov. 1, calls for a trench storm sewer to replace the present 18-inch from First and Main south to Fairgrounds avenue.

Ehning Concrete Products, Inc. received the contract for paving with a bid of \$9,387.40. The paving will include Douglas street between Twelfth and Thirteenth and a curving Park street from Douglas to Lincoln. Ehning said the work would be completed by Nov. 15.

Several other matters came up for discussion Tuesday night but no definite action was taken.

Among these was an off-the-record discussion of appointment of a new police chief, to succeed W. H. "Mike" Eynon, who resigned to accept a district probation officer's post Oct. 1. Mayor Willard Witte told the council of qualifications on four applicants for the job and asked for a recommendation.

Parking problems on East Tenth and East Seventh streets also came up for discussion. It was decided to install strip signs on all corners of Windows, Nebraska and Logan streets which join Tenth street.

A council committee will also meet with WSTC officials to discuss possible expansion of college parking facilities on the north side of Tenth.
