### Clarify Payment Limit Under New Soil Bank Plan

The \$3,000 limitation on payments under the soil bank's 1958 acreage reserve program will be applied to each producer with regard to each farm, ASC Chairman Owen Jenkins announced.

Judging to a recent interpretation of the program provision by the U.S. comptroller general, there had been some question as to whether the limitation might be construed as a ceiling on the amount paid the producer for all farms which he had an interest.

According to Jenkins, the 1958 soil bank act provided in part, that "no part of this appropriation shall be used to formulate and administer an acreage reserve program which would result in total compensation being paid to any one producer in excess of \$3,000 with respect to 1958 crops."

The ruling is that Congress considered the \$3,000 limitation as applying to each producer regarding a particular farming unit, rather than a ceiling on the amount of compensation that can be paid to him for all farms in which he may have an interest.

Chairman Jenkins reminded farmers that the \$3,000 limit applies to total payment under 1958 acreage reserve programs on a particular farm in Wayne county payments for one particular farm cannot total over \$3,000 for wheat and corn acreage reserves he added.

## Hidden Taxes Take Big Bite of County Incomes

New York-Wayne county taxpayers are paying more than they realize to keep the wheels of Federal, State and local government rolling along.

As did most people, local taxpayers paid about a sixth of their income for the purpose. That was the amount asked of a married man with two dependents and average local earnings of \$6,375.

According to a recent study, however, you are spending much more than that through indirect taxes that make sneak raids on your wallet. In your case, these extras bring your total tax up to \$2,050 a year.

They are the unseen levies applied along the way on nearly everything you eat and use. You don't see them because they are hidden in the price you pay for things. They have been added by the producers, manufacturers, middlemen and retailers who have had to pay them along the way.

There is, for example, the \$555 in taxes (\$288 visible and \$267 hidden) on a \$2,000 car. The hidden part consists of Federal excises on the radio and heater, license and title fees, and income taxes.

These are included in the selling price.

Winside school district voters will decide Monday night whether to approve a proposed addition to the present school building.

The election will be held at 8 p.m. at the Winside city auditorium. Approval by 55 percent of eligible voters attending the Monday meeting is necessary to authorize the construction.

Any resident of Winside school district who has children in school or owns assessed taxable property is eligible to vote.

#### Estimates Vary On Enrollment For WSTC Term

Speculation on the 1957-58 enrollment total at WSTC varied greatly Wednesday as upperclassmen began registering following freshman registration Tuesday.

Estimates ran above and below the predicted 80-student drop from the record 1,030 total last year. The drop was predicted after the Legislature hiked non-resident tuition from \$140 to \$250 per year and resident fees from \$20 to \$150 a year.

However, since that figure was determined by administrative personnel, neighboring states also raised their figures. Some were still below WSTC, some local faculty members indicated they thought Wayne would be about where we were last year.

It was a general consensus the enrollment would have swelled far beyond last year's record if tuition had remained at the same figure.

It was estimated about 370 freshmen took entrance examinations Monday and Tuesday.



## County Agent's Column . . .

### Good Management Key to Profitable Sheep Flock

Every lamb in a well-managed flock can return to its owner almost \$9 above feed costs according to a recent study at the University of Minnesota.

In 1956 records kept on a flock of ewes showed that lambs shorn at 79 ewes produced a 138 percent lamb crop. From pre-breeding until the lambs were marketed, the lambs were marketed, and ewes ate \$12.63 worth of hay, silage and grain for every lamb marketed.

The lambs weighed 85 to 145 pounds each at market time and brought an average total price of \$14.50 per lamb marketed. Total sales from "The Flock" brought \$2.50 for each lamb for a total return of \$21.50 per lamb marketed. Subtract the feed cost and that leaves a return of \$8.87 per head.

This return isn't all profit, though, because these figures don't include depreciation on buildings or other equipment. But such returns do indicate that sheep can be a profitable enterprise on farms that have extra forage and pasture to be utilized, provided the farmer is able to raise at least a 120 percent lamb crop, with lambs that weigh 85 to 90 pounds at five months and are finished sufficiently to grade choice.

That means that good management is still the key to successful sheep production.

**Soil Savers**

Fertilizer and lime are soil savers as well as yield boosters, reports M. D. Weldon, University of Nebraska extension agronomist. Fields treated with fertilizer and manure not only produce more crops per acre, but retain more inches of topsoil than do fertilized fields, Weldon says. Weldon points out that as the productivity of soil soil is built up, the topsoil layer is protected from erosion. When a soil is rich in organic matter and produces good cover, it stays in place and won't erode nearly as fast as soils low in both organic matter and productivity.

Many low-fertility soils can be

built up to profitable crop production by the use of lime and fertilizer, supplying balanced amounts of nutrients needed for high yields. Soil tests should be used where lime and fertilizer are needed.

Bigger yields mean more net income per acre for the farmer, Weldon says. This not only pays for the fertilizer but provides extra cash for improvements on the farm and new comforts and conveniences for the home.

**Soil Samples Now**

Now is the right time to take soil samples. First because there is ample time to study soil test results and recommendations before the cropping season.

Soil samples are much easier to take now than in winter or early spring. The usual rush to soil samples in late winter swamps the soil test laboratory. Test results are often delayed because the lab is full during the cropping season.

A good fertility program depends on knowing what the soil needs. This can best be determined by sampling each field at least once during the rotation of 4 to 6 years.
