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

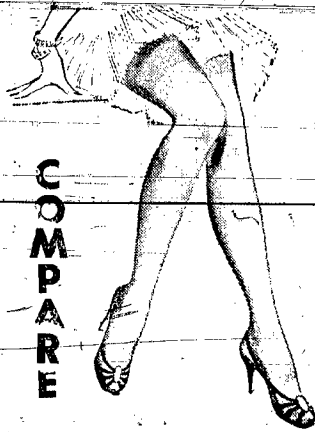

For several administrations, the matter of free access to all legitimate news items has shown up as a thorn in the side of the warden. Not always has the matter of news policy been a deliberate one.

Many public officials, even after years in office, do not recognize a valid news story. But they would willingly comment on any questions asked and answer them truthfully. However, they never volunteer news, but emphasize on the wrong items. The end result has been trouble with the news media.

In the riots of 1953 at the state penitentiary and in the Board of Control office, there were several instances of news blackout or considerable delay in reporting an incident to the press. Some were deliberate, others accidental.

The conclusion was that the new penitentiary chief, Warden Joseph Bovey, with inherited publicity problems, got off to a bad start with newsmen. He attempted to mend his fences but on several occasions the problem of delayed reporting of an incident caused friction.

In the latest matter, the warden answered truthfully reports that the prison chaplain, Rev. Robert Kees, had been fired last July 17 for what the warden called "brazen violation of institution rules." Kees, a Baptist with long service as an evangelist, claimed he was fired without due cause and because he was "too popular" with the inmates. The warden said Kees actually had caused "unrest" by "intimidating" with prisoners.

When asked about why the decision had not been reported July 17 when it happened, Bovey told newsmen that the reverend was a probationary employe. These, the warden said, are never announced when they do not work out satisfactorily.

The warden said he could see no reason to change his policy because Kees was a minister. He said that he kept him on probation 14 months instead of the customary three.

Bovey said charges by Kees that the minister's mail had been censored were true because the same policy applied to all employes at the institution, including the associate warden.

Restraint in movement at the institution and in seeing prisoners on the part of Kees also was confirmed by Bovey who said the steps were necessary because of the rules in progress and another \$20 million extracted in 1958. However, the four-lane route between the two cities probably won't near completion until 1959 or later. Union Matters

The first step in what may be a controversy over unionizing the highway construction industry in Nebraska has been taken.

Fall Fertilizing

Fire Prevention Week
This week of Oct. 6-12 has been designated as National Fire Prevention Week.

The 1957 theme, "Don't Give Fire a Chance to Start," should suggest an action program to farm families all over Nebraska; states William D. Lutes, University of Nebraska safety specialist.

By eliminating all fire hazards from homes, buildings and land before the winter heating season, many serious fires can be prevented.

Lutes recommends that the following safety precautions be applied by all farm families:

1. Clean up all trash, weeds and lumber around buildings and the farmstead. They might provide the fuel for a serious fire.
2. Have the electrical system checked for overloaded circuits and damaged or inadequate wiring.
3. Make a thorough check of the heating system, including heaters, chimneys, flues and fuel supply lines to see that they are in good repair.
4. Observe the "No Smoking" rule in barns, machine shops and other places where fires are easily started.
5. Plan with the family procedures to be followed in the event that you do have a fire on the farm or in the home. A well-

developed plan may save a life. The time to act to prevent fires is before they happen. Make a check of your place now. Don't give fires a chance to start.
