BRIEF and IMPORTANT

LIVESTOCK: Abundant feed is in prospect for hog producers and cattle ranchers and feeders this fall and winter.

Hog prices will decline seasonally until late November or early December but will stay above 1596 prices. Feeder

cattle will cost more and partially latiset the expected higher fat cattle prices.

POULTRY: Look for egg-prices of 5-10 cents a dozen higher than a year ago for the next 6-9 months. Laying flocks have been reduced; production of replacements is down by one-tifth. This year's turkey crop is a record 81 million, up 5 percent over 1956. Turkey prices will be about 5 cents a pound lower this fall.

LIVESTOCK and FEED OUTLOOK

of this year. This reflects the continuing growth in population, full employment and higher wage rates.

So far this year, expenditures far food, and clothing have exceeded those in the corresponding months of 1956.

Expectations are for levels of living to improve during the rest of 1957—even at the expense of some savings.

Government expenditures are running ahead of 1956 by about 10 percent. High levels of spending for detense, road construction and new schools will be important factors in the government's spending program.

With relatively cheap feed in sight and a year of reasonably good returns from feeding operations behind them, feeders are expected to bid rather strongly for feeder cattle this fall.

As was pointed out before, cottle are in strong hands with range conditions and hay supplies greatly improved. Reports from other states indicate that good to choice steer calkes might cost in the neighborhood of 23-25 cents. Prices of feeder cattle at the central markets have been running \$3 to \$4 a cwt. higher than a year ago.

Profits from feeding operations depend, as always on prices poid for feeder cattle, the price of feed, and prices received for, finished cattle. Assuming \$23-\$25-5 a cwt. for good to choice steer calves, \$21-\$22 for yearings, \$1.10-\$1.15 a bushel for corn, \$15 hay, and \$70-\$75 supplement, profits should be reasonably good again in 1957-58.

With a 3 percent smaller lamb crop and higher cattle prices, prices of feeder lambs may be higher this fall than last. Some reports indicate that lambs, too, will be coming off the ranges at heavier weights. In general lamb prices follow much the same price paftern as lower grade cattle.

grade cuttle.

Hog prices are expected to decline seasonally but should average as good or better through the first half of 1958 is, a year earlier. The larger spring pig crop which is expected in 1958 will not affect prices materially until the early fall of 1958.
