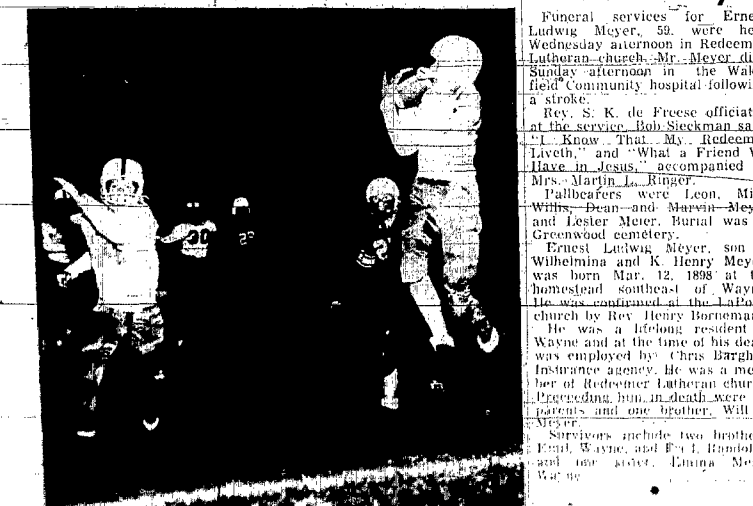

New Grain Tax Law Details Explained by Assessor H. Arp

Details of Nebraska's new grain tax-law, LB 555 passed by the last Legislature, were explained this week by County Assessor Henry Arp after various aspects of the law were referred to the state attorney for opinions.

Under the old method of taxing grain the farmer-producer paid tax only on the amount of grain on hand on assessment day, Mar. 1. Under provisions of LB 555 the producer must pay tax on the actual amount of grain produced.

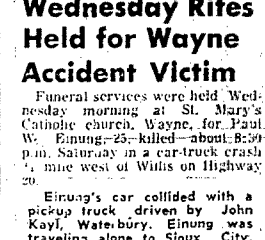

# Classroom, Faculty Problems Toughen Scholastic Standard

Lincoln—There are indications high school students will find it more difficult to enter college than before and stay there. Scholastic requirements have been bolstered at the University of Nebraska and the state teachers colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Kearney and Peru. Higher scholastic standards and a 33 percent hike in tuition raised a drop in the pupil total at the University. There were more students in all the teachers colleges except Peru and officials said high scholastic requirements figured a holding back the increase. Students are going on probation quicker in all the colleges and universities. At the University of Nebraska, Clifford Hartman said 150 more students were dropped for failing to meet scholastic requirements than for the same semester a year earlier. The trend is up at the teachers colleges, too.

Actually, the scene for the change in policy—tuition and scholastic-wise—was set in the last session of the Legislature. It was in the session that the amount of tax funds to be allocated to the institutions of higher learning came in for some heavy debate and criticism. Without exception, school officials said costs of operating were up and enrollments were expected to decline. Tuition-raising facilities and faculty at the institutions. There was strong sentiment for tuition hikes on the part of many Legislators with the implied threat it was not forthcoming there would be even less property tax money distributed to the schools. The final result was that the university's board of regents and the State Normal board, governing group for the teachers colleges, took steps to hike the entrance fees.

The Legislators frowned on the teachers colleges having such a high percentage of out-of-state students being educated in the Nebraska teachers colleges at the time of the session. Out-of-state tuition was hiked by the Normal board and the result was a sharp drop in non-resident students. There was considerable sentiment in the Legislature also that qualifications for getting into the tax-supported institutions of higher learning and staying there should be tightened. Reasoning was that the squeeze in the property tax owner to provide more and more taxes for state government to operate because of the services demanded by the public. Therefore, was the reasoning, money supplied by taxpayers should not be wasted on students who had neither the inclination nor ability to handle college

Edward Nickolite, enforcement chief for the State Liquor commission, says there has been a "tremendous" increase in violations. Fines imposed in liquor violation cases go to the school districts of the state about \$24,000 worth per year.

Interstate Highway  
The interstate highway to span Nebraska will have colorful road signs of the non-advertising type. State Engineer L. N. Ress said informational and guidance signs will be white letters on a green background. The marker for the

four-lane will be red, white and blue. The marker will say Interstate, Nebraska and carry the number 80. Numbering of the route was selected by a committee of the American Association of State Highway Officials. The association numbers routes in the counties according to a plan. Low numbered routes begin on the west coast and get larger towards the west coast. From north to south numbers are small on the Canadian border, getting larger towards Mexico. Ress said the interstate highway will be marked in the reverse, that is, low numbers on the west coast and Mexican border and the high numbers on the Canadian border and the east coast. This, he commented, will prevent an interstate route and a regular U.S. highway with the same number being in an immediate area.

## Danger Lurks in Fields as Corn Picking Season Nears

Extremely heavy stalk growth will make working in the corn fields doubly dangerous this fall. But you can still keep yourself safe by observing a few simple rules. First of all, heavy stalk growth due to late summer rains means a slower heavy harvesting in the fields. A machine operator must be just and in good working condition is vital to a corn picker safety. The smart and safety conscious operator will spend some time before harvest to be sure his machine will be ready for efficient and safe operation when the season's rush begins. Nebraska can have an accident-free corn harvest season, but it's all up to the operator. Dairy Records and butterfat records should be maintained on dairy cows that finish this fall, reports C. W. Nibler, University of Nebraska extension dairyman. Attkle records for each cow for the month, production date, monthly herd records and year-to-date herd totals are calculated in the weigh-a-day month system. Feed records on the herd also may be included. The total and average feed cost for the herd for each month and for the year are calculated if feed records are kept.

BRIEF and IMPORTANT LIVESTOCK: Abundant feed is in prospect for hog producers and cattle ranchers and feeders this fall and winter. Hog prices will decline seasonally until late November or early December but will stay above 1956 prices.

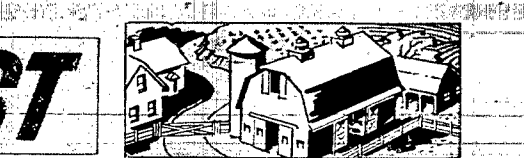
LIVESTOCK and FEED OUTLOOK Present indications point toward another season of relatively good returns for livestock producers and feeders. Demand should continue to be good. Disposable personal income was about 5 percent higher during the first half of 1957 than during the first 6 months in 1956.

Plenty of Feed Present indications are that production of feed grains will be sufficiently large to make total feed grain supplies on October 1 larger than a year ago for the U.S. as a whole.
