Cite Mailing Deadlines For Christmas Packages; Urge Proper Addresses

Mailing deadlines for Christmas packages going overseas were cited this week by Postmaster Don Wightman. Overseas parcels going via surface mail should be mailed between Nov. 1 and Nov. 20, Wightman said. The weight limit on such packages is 70 pounds and a combination of 100 inches in length and girth. Air mail parcels going overseas should be mailed before Dec. 10. Limits on such packages are two pounds and a 30-inch combination of length and girth. Wightman also reminded the public about the necessity of proper addresses on all mail. Since Wayne is a first class office, it can no longer offer directory service. Mail not properly addressed will be returned immediately to the sender. A return address should appear on all parcels and first class mail.

Set Early Bird Breakfast at 7 Tuesday

Wayne's fifth annual Community Chest drive will get underway Tuesday with an Early Bird breakfast at 7 a. m. at Hotel Morrison. Chest Chairman O. B. Proett said this week. Volunteers will work through Friday to raise \$7,265, the 1958 quota set by the local chapter to handle the needs of 11 participating agencies. This year high school girls have been recruited to help downtown block captains get worker attendance at the breakfast. Girls who get 100 percent attendance will receive nylon hosiery gifts from Clarence Kuhn. Prizes will be awarded at the breakfast with a year's supply of eggs for the first worker to arrive. Other prizes include shaves and shoe shines with an unannounced prize for the last to arrive. Other high jinks at the breakfast include a "bottoms up" feature to spark the workers. Capitol News . . .

Educational Problems Taxing Education Department Fully

Lincoln School problems in Nebraska are of no small magnitude—when viewed overall State Commissioner of Education F. B. Decker says. "The magnitude of educational problems faced in Nebraska taxes the leadership and the resources of the State Department of Education to the utmost."

Added the commissioner: "Those problems cannot be solved effectively under an organization structure which does not lend itself to efficient functioning."

In January, 1955 operation of the State Department of Education was put under a Board of Administration whose members are non-salaried and elected on a non-partisan ballot. The action by the voters made Nebraska one of 44 states in the country functioning under such an organizational set-up.

Simply, Nebraska school problems center around a supply of teachers, classrooms and economically-operated school districts provide the best education possible at the lowest cost.

Decker's comments indicated a favorable attitude toward the education board-type of solution in working toward a solution to the problems.

It's still a long time before the political stars start in earnest in Nebraska, leading up to the May 1958 primary election. But Democrats and Republicans alike are letting no grass grow under their feet as they start early to whip up their respective candidates for the biennial contest.

State Democratic Chairman Willard Townsend, Lincoln, makes no bones about the fact that his party is desperate for funds. "We need funds more now than at any time in the history of the Democratic party in Nebraska," Townsend said.

Last week party workers began beating the bushes for contributions to finance next year's campaign. Townsend acknowledged that the amount of money received will directly affect enthusiasm and supply of candidates in 1958.

Meanwhile, Nebraska Republicans are preparing for a Nov. 11 gathering to lay plans for the campaign. Republicans have expressed confidence they will again sweep to victory at the polls. The Democrats are hopeful, especially so in Nebraska's Third Congressional district, now held by Republican Rep. Robert Harrison, Norfolk.

County Agent's Column . . .

Farmers Must Be Safety Conscious with Pickers

While Nebraska farmers harvest thousands of bushels of corn every year, they also harvest a bumper crop of human lives, hands, arms, legs and fingers in the corn fields.

This crop of human losses amounts to one or two lives, 60 hands or parts of hands and 100 other injuries to farmers each year, states William Lutes, University of Nebraska specialist.

"Stop the Picker" is a phrase farmers have heard before many times, but it must be repeated again and again until it becomes second nature to the operator. Operators must stay alert to the danger of corn pickers if they hope to get through the season safely.

In addition to danger from the picker itself, the drying of corn stalks and trash has increased the dangers of fire in the corn field. Therefore, a fire extinguisher is a must, Lutes states, and a metal sediment bowl on the tractor is safer than a glass bowl. It's also a good idea to practice good housekeeping around equipment by keeping manifolds and exhausts free from trash accumulations and avoiding leaky fuel lines.

Sorghams Equal Corn

Some varieties of grain sorghum produce hog gains equal to corn but the feed efficiency is not as good. That is the report from studies made by Dr. E. R. Peo, University of Nebraska college of agriculture.

It required, on an average, 20

to 70 pounds more grain sorghum than corn to produce 100 pounds of gain in the tests. Generally the corn, Dr. Peo says, sorghams produce value of gain sorghams to hogs is about 90 to 98 percent of that of corn.

Sorghams can be used as the entire grain source in growing finishing and breeding rations for swine. There is no advantage in soaking sorghams for hogs. They can be fed whole if the grain is self-fed. However, sorghams should be ground if hand fed since hogs are in more of a hurry to eat and whole grain is wasted.

"Sorghams can be 'hogged down' in the fields, but swine should be turned on a limited area at one time to avoid excessive waste.

Four Functions

The dry period in a cow's life has four major functions, reports Philip H. Cole, University of Nebraska, dairyman. The four main functions are: rest the milk secreting organs; permit the nutrients in the feed to develop the fetus; permit the cow to replenish the mineral supply and to give the cow a chance to build up a reserve of body flesh.

Cole says cows milking as much as 20 pounds a day are not injured if milking is discontinued abruptly. However, if cows are giving over 20 pounds a day it may be necessary to withhold some of their feed to bring their production down to this level.

If cows are in good condition at the time of drying off, a period

may be desirable, if the cow is thin.

The feed that the cow receives during the dry period should be high in protein and minerals. Legumes such as alfalfa and clover are excellent sources of phosphorus.

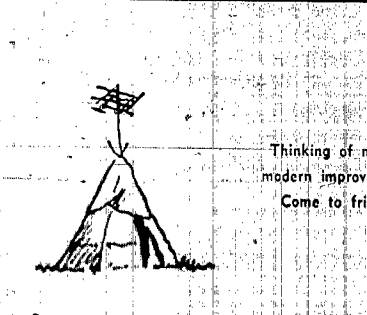

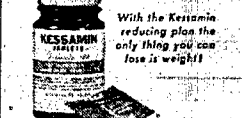


