

Wayne Youth Completing Solar Furnace



A solar furnace designed to generate 1,000 degrees of heat is being designed by a Wayne Prep senior, Mark Stringer, Jr., pictured at left above. Mark is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Stringer, Wayne.

The project is being completed in an elective science problems class at Prep. The class was started this year by Instructor Howard Prouse, right, for students with special interest in science. Eleven students, ranging from sophomores to seniors, are currently enrolled.

Stringer said he acquired the solar furnace idea from a story in a recent copy of "Boy's Life." He expects to complete the project in about three weeks.

The furnace was started with a mold made of wood, dirt, cement and plaster. It was calculated and built to make a sphere-shaped top in reverse. The furnace will be about 3 1/2 feet wide and about 12 inches deep.

A chrome, fibre glass cloth was placed on the mold and covered with resin and liquid fibre glass and allowed to harden. Later a conduit ring will be placed around the furnace and the inner surface lined with aluminum foil.

Stringer said the materials cost about \$10. He isn't certain how he will use the furnace, but indicated it will cook food. The youth has already made a radio and is presently learning the radio code system.

Other class members are taking advanced math. One has just started a six-inch reflecting telescope. Prouse said some are planning to build radios and that other projects may be started later.

A Wayne State graduate, Prouse said he thought the class was very successful, especially because each project is the student's own idea.

Corn Picking Under Way As Drying Weather Holds

Good drying weather the past week has started corn picking into full swing in NE Nebraska, although much of the corn is still testing 22-30 percent moisture, officials reported today.

Moisture should be under 20 percent before corn can safely be cribbed and many farmers are piling corn to let it dry before cribbing.

No specific reports of yields were available at press time, although estimates on irrigated corn ran as high as 100-110 bushels per acre. Estimates on non-irrigated fields ranged up to 60 bushels per acre.

No rainfall was reported during the week by Weatherman Archie Went and the continued dry weather has farmers hoping they can start harvesting sorghums as soon as corn picking is completed.

Sorghum Loans Available Here For 1957 Crop

County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said this week that grain sorghum loans on the 1957 crop will be available here. Sundell said erroneous reports had been issued throughout the state that such loans would not be available this year.

Wayne county support rate for the 1957 crop is \$1.83 per hundred weight, Sundell said.

To meet eligibility requirements, grain sorghums must grade No. 4, No. 4 smutty or No. 4 discolor or better and contain no in-excess of 13 percent moisture.

It will be eligible for a farm-storage loan provided the storage structure is of the same type and quality as bins approved for storage of oats, soybeans and shelled corn.

"Expanded" metal bins are not acceptable. Storage developed by lining ear corn cribs with sisal, wax paper, roll roofing, plastic or any other temporary type material also will not be accepted, Sundell stated.

17 Percent Residential Boost Made

Wayne's fifth annual Community Chest went over the top this week, hitting its quota of \$7,300 after a week of concentrated effort by Wayne Chest workers.

With late solicitations coming in with a rush the goal was reached Tuesday morning. Chest Secretary K. N. Parke said.

The few returns left will over-subscribe the drive, Parke said, and probably will hit about 102 percent. This figure is the total average of more than 200 drives already completed this year.

One of the greatest increases in this year's drive was in the residential area, where contributions totaled \$1,401, just up to \$1,654 this year, an increase of more than 17 percent.

More than 130 workers canvassed the town to get funds for the 11 agencies included in this year's drive. Goal for the 1958 drive was \$700 more than last year, but included an additional agency.

New in the Community Chest is an agency for underprivileged children. Other agencies are American Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, heart, blind, speech clinic, local emergency disaster fund, Salvation Army, youth activities and USO.

"We want to thank all those who contributed to the drive," Chest Chairman Dr. O. B. Pfoetz said, "and especially those who worked in the drive. This gives us a perfect batting average, hitting our goal all five weeks."

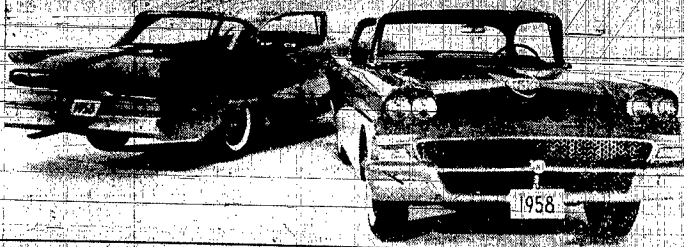

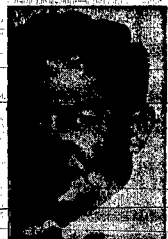
