New Provisions Of Conservation Reserve Cited

New provisions of the soil bank's 1958 conservation reserve program should be taken into consideration by Wayne county farmers who are beginning to work out plans for their 1958 farming operations, according to ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

The chairman reminded farmers of several features of the 1958 conservation reserve that were not in effect in 1957.

One such feature is that a producer is permitted to place additional land in the conservation reserve at the non-diversion rate (30 percent of the regular rate) up to the number of acres which are placed in the conservation reserve at the regular annual payment rate (\$11 per acre in Wayne county).

Under 1958 regulations farmers may also place any acreage in the conservation reserve at the non-diversion rate which is to be devoted to forest trees. These provisions will apply to contracts which start with 1958 and subsequent years.

Heretofore, farms for which the soil bank base was more than 30 acres were prohibited from placing any acreage in the conservation reserve at the non-diversion rate unless all the eligible land on the farm was placed in the conservation reserve. (A farmer's "soil bank base" is the average amount of land devoted to soil-bank base crops—generally all crops produced for harvest except hay crops—on the farm in 1956 and 1957.)

Sundell also reminded county farmers that this new regulation provides a farmer who has been practicing summer fallowing may place in the conservation reserve one acre of land which he would normally summer fallow for each acre taken out of crop production.

The regulation will make the conservation program fit into the operation of farms which have a larger portion of their cropland continuously devoted to the production of hay.
