

City Council to Ask Bids on Boom Truck

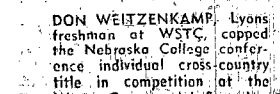
Wayne's city council Tuesday night approved plans and specifications for a new boom truck and utility equipment to be purchased for the municipal light plant.

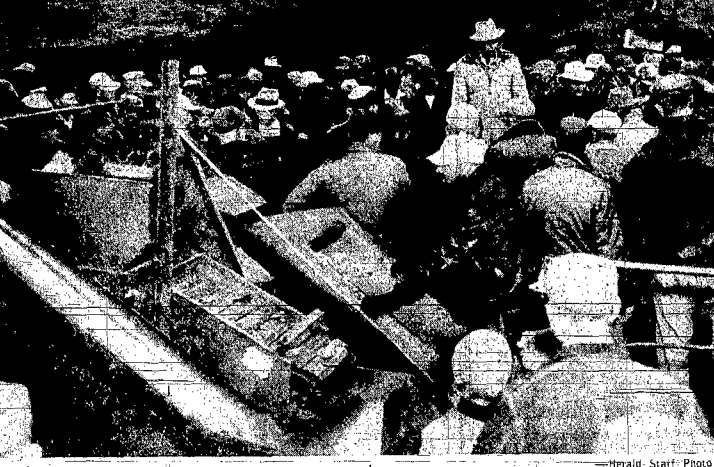

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial . . . but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Time Is Short

Time is running out on Wayne's efforts to get \$10,000 together to purchase an industrial site. Less than seven weeks remain for us to raise \$10,000 to take the first step in bettering the future for Wayne and the surrounding communities.

Dec. 31 the option will expire on the 18-acre tract on Highway 35 east of Wayne and IT WILL NOT BE RENEWED! This site, bounded on one side by the highway and the other side by railroad, is a must for industrial development. Few, if any, towns have succeeded in getting new industry without first having a site available.

First, the site is proof that the town is fully behind the project. Second, it prevents any possibility of price gouging should an industry wish to purchase.

Why try to attract new industry? Here's what 100 new factory worksmen mean to a town:

- 296 more people
- 112 more households
- 51 more school children
- \$590,000 more yearly personal income
- \$270,000 more bank deposits
- 107 more passenger cars registered
- 174 more workers employed
- 4 more retail establishments
- \$360,000 more retail sales yearly

Makes a pretty substantial increase in the business picture, doesn't it? Yet it can't come without work and investment. Work on the part of local people to get the project started . . . work to locate and attract desirable industry.

Investment on the part of local people to make the initial purchase of land is also essential . . . and that is where we stand now.

Industry has other beneficial influences, too. A thriving town keeps its real estate valuations up . . . jobs are available for children as they grow up and families are better able to stay together.

We need an additional 50 persons to invest \$100 each in Wayne's future. With the money now on hand and the additional \$5,000 the land can be purchased and we can start seeking industry.

This is not a donation. The money will be secured by the land and arrangements have already been made to rent the land for farming until it is needed for industry.

# Big Plans Ahead in 1958 for State Highway Construction

Lincoln—There are big plans ahead for road building in Nebraska this year. The State Highway department figures on awarding \$48 million in contracts next year, \$25 million for the interstate highway and the remainder on regular roads.

More revenue from the seven-cent gasoline tax and increased allocations of Federal funds make possible the record-breaking construction total.

Road construction plans for 1958 were outlined to district engineers for the highway department by State Engineer L. N. Bess. The present spending record for roads is the current 12-month

period with its total of about \$30 million.

Bess also announced that 19 cities in Nebraska will have \$2.4 million more to spend on city streets during the next two years; in Federal aid urban funds to be matched on a 50-50 basis. Half the funds can be spent now and the remainder will be available on July 1, 1958.

The allocation by the Federal government is up 24 percent from the previous two years, when slightly over \$2 million was distributed to Nebraska. Division of the Federal funds is made by the Highway department to cities over 5,000 on a population basis.

Most of the interstate work planned by the Highway department will be between Omaha and Lincoln. The Lincoln route west to the state line has not yet been set up for possible contracts, since the location has not been definitely established.

## Tax Probe

Scotts Bluff, Cheyenne, Box Butte and Kimball counties are next in line for the tax probe committee of senators, headed by Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff.

Saunders county has been completed. The second county investigated by the committee for tax law violations is Hall. This work was expected to be completed in 30 days.

Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington told the committee last week that investigation by his men at the request of the committee did not bring up any unexpected problems in Saunders county.

However, the study did show about 30 to 40 percent of the business schedules checked indicated further investigation on discrepancies would be in order. There were no indications of improper activities by taxing officials, Herrington said.

The attorney general's office advised Carpenter and the committee it could take a written report on the Saunders county check and send it to officials in the county for their inspection.

When asked what this would mean, Asst. Atty. Gen. Homer Hamilton commented that if the facts were made known on a local level, it would be an invitation for the officials to take steps to correct any deficiencies.

Herrington estimated about 200-300 persons would be affected by any action taken in the county, as a result of the probe.

The psychological effect of such a study is great, Carpenter said. It should produce better valuations, so the home owner won't get stuck further because of valuations by big property owners, it was said.

An expected fight among committee members over procedure did not develop. Sens. David Tews, Norfolk, John Munnely, Omaha, and Fay Wood, Seward, said they did not object to what was being done by Carpenter, but did want to be informed of action before they read it in the newspapers.

Carpenter agreed to send copies of all correspondence to committee members so they would have background information for answering questions constituents.

Another problem—that of money—was discussed. Carpenter said he was not going to let this stop the probe, if he had to pay costs out of his own pocket or make a public appeal for funds.

## County Agent's Column . . .

# Bicarbonate Dryers Tests Show No Halt to Spoilage

**Farm-City Week**  
The third annual Farm-City Week will be observed in the United States and Canada Nov. 22-28 to bring about a better understanding of the farmer and his problems.

Today's farmers, who number only one-eighth of our population, are faced with the task of producing food and fiber for a rapidly expanding population, states the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

For many years farmers as a whole lacked opportunity to acquire the modern facilities and conveniences that people in towns and cities enjoyed. Technological advances in agriculture and growth of the economy generally are helping to change the situation.

About 94 percent of farmers now receive electric service for example, compared with only 11 percent in 1905.

The city limits sign on the edge of town no longer is a cultural, recreational, educational, social or economic boundary. It is now just a tax boundary—a legal dividing line. The same kind of people live on one side of the city limit sign as on the other. They have increasingly the same types of ambitions, similar cultural, social and economic opportunities, comparable ways of living and even similar disappointments and frustrations.

**Hay and Grain Preservatives**  
There is no record of any successful tests where spoilage was prevented by the addition of bicarbonate-type dryers to take moisture out of grain or hay under controlled conditions.

That's the report from Prof. C. W. Ackerson, department of biochemistry and nutrition at the University of Nebraska.

Work has been done at several experiment stations and all conclude that the bicarbonate-type dryers will not prevent mold growth and subsequent spoilage.

The compounds are said to prevent mold content from spoiling and to prevent spoilage of grain when stored with high moisture contents.

All compounds which have been investigated consist of a mixture of sodium bicarbonate and limestone. It is claimed that carbon dioxide is liberated which prevents the heating or molding of the hay or grain when amounts of five pounds per ton are mixed with the hay or grain. So far tests have not proved this to be true.

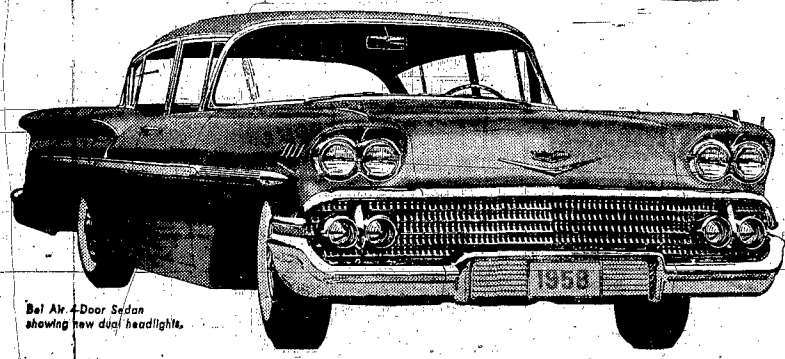
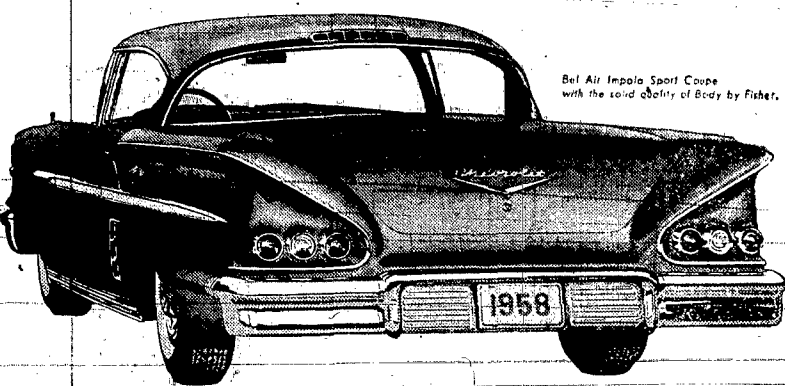
**Improves Milk Quality**  
Dairymen find that clipping their cows regularly is a definite aid in producing high quality milk.

Clipping the udder and flanks of dairy cows also makes it much easier to keep the animals clean. Long hair tends to collect bedding and manure even when animals are kept in relatively clean quarters.

Fall is the logical time to clip since most animals are still relatively clean and the hair is just beginning to get long. This makes the job of clipping easier and it is not as difficult for the cows to get used to their short hair as it would be later in the winter.

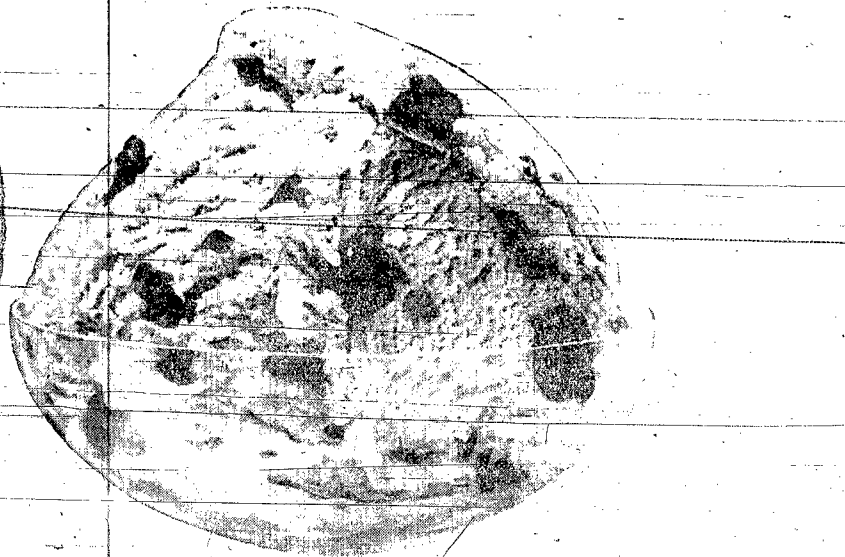
