Two Wayne youths narrowly escaped death early Sunday morning when their car overturned in a water-filled ditch. Both youths were seriously injured.

Driving the car was Don Koll, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Koll, Wayne. He was accompanied by his brother, Gary.

The youths said the driver apparently fell asleep. The car went into the left hand ditch, came back up on the roadway and went into the right hand ditch, where it turned over on its top. The car filled to about a depth of 1 1/2 feet with water from the ditch.

Gary suffered a forehead cut which required six stitches to close. Both were released Sunday. The car is a total loss.

Early Snow Blocks Travel, Corn and Milo Harvesting

Rain and snow last week combined to put a definite halt to corn and grain sorghum harvest in NE Nebraska, but Wayne county still has more than most surrounding counties, according to County Agent Harold Ingalls.

Corn is about 75 percent picked in the county, Ingalls said, while grain sorghums are about 10 percent harvested. Only a few soybeans remain to be combined, with about 10-15 percent still in the fields.

Snow Sunday night and Monday piled up to about four and one-half inches, Weatherman Archie Weir said, following a three-day rain that totaled 2.9 inches with the moisture content of the snow at .35 inch, total moisture for the week was 1.05 inches.

Brightest spot in the weather picture is the abundance of moisture for next year's crop. Total moisture for the year so far stands at 28.00 inches; 6.5 inches more than normal for a full year.

"Many county roads are impassable following the prolonged rains and melting snows. Big ruts and icy spots combine to halt most cars on the dirt roads, although most gravel roads are usable."

Temperatures the past seven days have ranged from a high of 52 last Thursday to a low of 22 degrees Monday night.

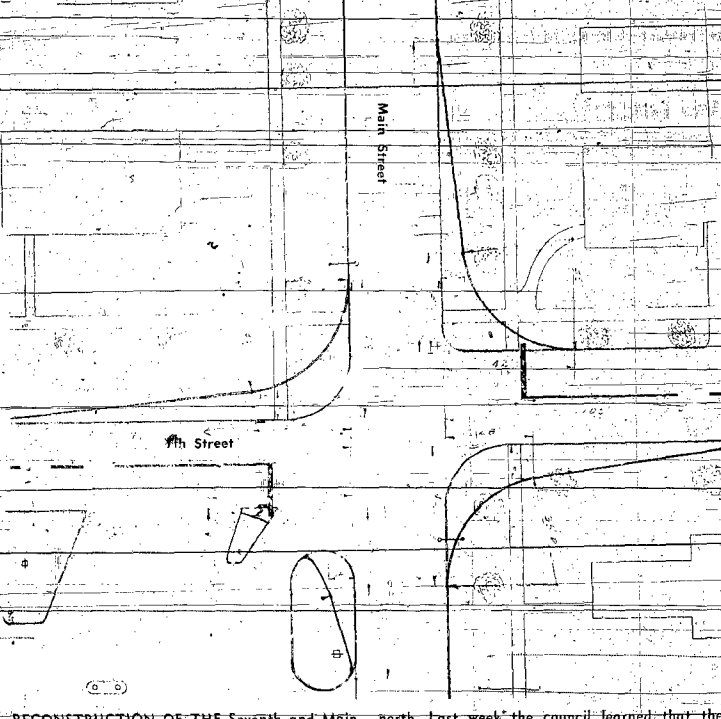
Preceding him in death were his parents and three brothers.

Ease Storage Times Necessary for CCC's Loans on Sorghums

Revisions in storage time necessary to qualify grain sorghums for farm-stored CCC loans were announced today by County Assn. Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

"The revisions were authorized by the State ASC committee because the recent snowfall and continuing weather have not been conducive to drying grain."

The committee explained that many producers may not be able to harvest sorghum in time to permit 30 days storage on the farm prior to obtaining samples for loans and still have sufficient time to complete such loans by the final availability date, Jan. 31, 1950.

Wayne county farmers may get grain sorghums under farm-stored loans for \$1.83 per hundredweight. The new storage times are:

1. Sorghums in which application for a farm-stored loan is made on or before Dec. 13, 1949 have been in the bin at least 60 days.
2. Sorghums in which application is made between Jan. 2 and Jan. 24, 1950 need only have been in the bin seven days.
3. Sorghums in which application is made on or after Jan. 27, 1950 require no storage time.

Producers should, however, make application no later than Jan. 27 in order to permit time for drawing samples, making grade determinations in the State office, laboratory returning grade certificates to the county office, and executing loan documents, Sundell stated.

Producers who do not harvest in time to make application for a loan by Jan. 27 should obtain a purchase agreement since the delay in getting a cash return will be short as delivery and settlement will be made beginning April 1, the day following maturity date of the loans.
