Insurance Suit Decided Monday At Jury Trial

Verdicts in a suit brought by the Farmers Mutual Insurance Co., Des Moines, against Carl H. Leonard, Wakefield, were decided by a Wayne County District Court jury Monday.

The new step is being taken on a trial basis, Benson said. The department would have the choice of accepting or turning down the farmers' offers.

Benson said he hopes the four-state trial will pave the way for extending the program to other states later. A series of meetings, including one in Lincoln Dec. 18 will be held to discuss details of the program.

Benson gave this explanation of how the trial program would work: After offers are made by farmers in the four states, the department will check to determine whether the program is effective in helping more farmers shift their eligible cropland from production of price-depressing surpluses to conservation uses.

The department will agree to this offer on the basis of the lowest acceptable bids. The department will reserve the right to reject any and all offers. Original bids are turned down, the department may possibly consider later revised bids.

Under regular conservation reserve procedure, farmers are offered specific per-acre annual payments of \$14 to \$16 in Wayne county for all or any part of the eligible cropland on their farms placed in the conservation reserve.

Benson was asked whether the new procedure would induce smaller farmers to quit their farms and go into the city. Benson replied that if they encourage some to get out, but he said his main purpose is to cut the total amount of land in cultivation.

Wayne High Senior Gains Scholarship Semi-Finals

Frederick Rickers, Wayne high senior, has been named a semi-finalist in National Merit Scholarship competition, Supt. E. W. Willcox announced today.

Rickers was listed among 7,500 high scorers on the scholarship qualifying test, a nationwide college aptitude exams given in 14,000 high schools in October.

The semi-finalists named today outscored 300,000 fellow seniors and moved a step closer to the \$4 million in Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the 1958 program.

Merit Scholarships are sponsored by over 60 business and industrial firms, as well as professional societies, foundations and individuals.

Semi-finalists now face a rigorous, three-hour college board exam to be given in testing centers throughout the country Jan. 11. Rickers will probably take this exam at Sioux City. Students whose high scores substantiate their earlier test performance will become finalists in the competition.

At least 7,000 of those students named today are expected to survive the second test. A fortunate few will become Merit Scholars of 1958 about May 1 after high school grades, extra-curricular attainments and leadership and character are evaluated.

Merit Scholars make their own choice of college and college of study. The value of each of the four-year scholarships varies with the financial need of each individual student, ranging upward from \$100 per year to \$2,200 per year or more.

Postoffices Set Saturday Hours for Rush Period

Three Wayne county postoffices this week announced special Saturday hours to afford Christmas shoppers extra mailing convenience.

Offices at Wayne, Carroll and Winslow will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Dec. 14 and Dec. 21.

Wayne Postmaster Don Wightman also listed suggestions which will greatly assist prompt delivery of Christmas mail. They were:

1. Address mail fully and clearly. Always use zone numbers in the address and return address. Avoid abbreviations.
2. Use the three-cent stamps on cards and letters. Be certain a return address is printed in the upper left-hand corner of both Christmas cards and parcels. This will prevent any undelivered mail ending up in a dead letter office.
3. Separate letters to "local" and "out-of-town" addresses. This will speed all the mail and relieve much congestion in postoffices.
4. Make certain parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers. The carton should be wrapped in heavy paper and securely tied with strong twine.
5. Use combination mail where a letter or message—other than a gift tag—is to be enclosed inside a Christmas package.
6. Mail cards and parcels early to avoid the last-minute rush and waiting in line at the postoffice. Best times to avoid crowds at stamp windows in most offices are before 10 a. m. and between 1:30 and 3:30 p. m.

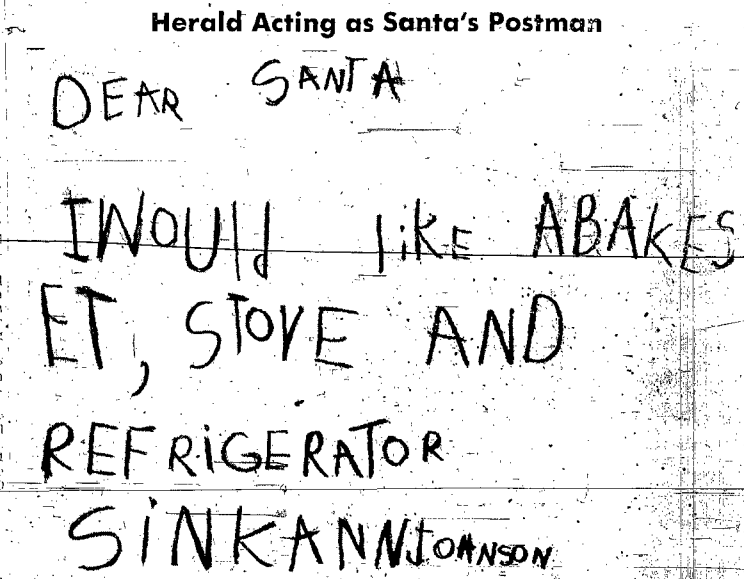
Fair Association Changes By-Laws; Set Fair Dates
