House Must Be Ventilated If It Is Tightly Insulated

If you're beset by rising fuel bills, pull up a chair and meet Clean Neven of Fort Dodge, Iowa. He's a kidded soul, perhaps like you digging doggedly in his pockets to come up with enough cash to pay those heating expenses.

The Iowa man writes: "My house is five years old. All the insulation in the walls is three-quarter-inch weatherboard. I don't feel this is sufficient, but I have been told not to put more insulation in the walls as it would give me paint trouble."

Out-of-Reason

My fuel bills are out of reason and I feel it is due to no insulation. "Please tell me if I could insulate the walls now—how, and what kind to use?"

Two points at the outset:

(1) Insulation can cut heating costs, and

(2) Insulation in itself is not directly responsible for moisture condensation on painted walls (which presumably is what is meant here by "paint trouble").

Condensation of water vapor on inside walls and windows certainly can damage paint and woodwork. And insulation can add to this problem if the house is not properly vented.

But, insulation alone is not the culprit. Condensation is caused by high indoor humidity and construction features which do not allow vapor to escape from the house.

Condensation is most noticeable during the winter months because there is a marked difference between outdoor and indoor temperatures. Well, you might ask, what causes high indoor humidity in the first place?

Did you know that vapor equivalent to three gallons of water a day is produced by cooking, laundering and bathing? It's a common

household problem, therefore, to get rid of this vapor—or, express it in other terms, to lower the humidity.

The best way to do it is by adequate vents and a kitchen exhaust fan. They serve as an "escape hatch" for water vapor.

There are a few other tips, too: Open the bathroom window slightly after bathing; the vapor created by the bath water will be pulled out.

Also, at any particular time when indoor humidity is extremely high, slightly open a single window to prevent the window pane from "frosting." Close the window after a few minutes.

As for insulation itself, we have a suggestion from the Better Heating-Cooling Council, which speaks for the heating and cooling industry.

Escape Hatch

The council suggests that mineral wool could be blown into the wall space of Neven's house without contributing to any condensation problem provided there is an escape hatch for vapor.

In this method, a hole usually is cut in the outside wall near the roof. This gives access to the wall space. A tube is then placed in the hole and insulation is forced into the wall by a blower.

To all of you who have unreasonable fuel bills, please remember this:

Properly insulated houses lose less heat through walls and roof. They require smaller heating plants. And they use less fuel. But each house has its own unique construction features, so it's best to use the services of a reliable insulation contractor.

He'll tell you the best type of insulation to use and the best method of application.

Can Independents Answer Chain Store Competition?

On the contrary, we believe that streamlined super-market operation initiated largely by chain stores has brought about many economies in food distribution—of lasting benefit to consumers.

Community life must change drastically and include more burdensome taxes supporting more politically controlled charity should "home-owned" enterprise be driven out of existence.

Moreover, even in the face of the excellent streamlining done by national organizations, we should not overlook the fact that almost every basic invention which has put this country ahead of the rest of the world has come from independent operators; steam boat, submarine, telegraph, telephone, you name it.

Although the research work of the billion dollar corporation and the armed forces should by no means be deprecated, the strength of this nation has rested upon the independent operator, rather than the worker restricted by his assignment.

The American people have done far better by themselves when they have done for themselves. To eliminate independent business particularly at this time represents an extremely dangerous and needless risk to national security as well as local self-government.

Big Government Endangers Independent Business

Should the independent operator by some miracle survive competition, he must face the inevitable disinheretance of his own children. Exate taxes based upon any substantial measure of successful operation may simply not be met out of income remaining after both corporate and individual income taxes.

Yet these taxes constitute social legislation basically, producing but a pittance in the way of national income; a pittance which obviously cannot be collected twice.

And they represent a threat to a way of life our system of government is presumably dedicated to preserve.

Survival of Independent Business is Uncertain

Survival still remains a serious problem. Should the independent operator gamble upon remaining in business in the remote hope of tax laws giving more than lip service to "free enterprise," he has no assurance that he can survive.

In order for independent dairies, for example, to compete in delivery costs with chain stores entering the milk business, every housewife must be provided enough refrigerator space to accommodate delivery of milk to the home in much larger quantities.

Savings must be offered her to make possible this additional refrigerator space; space requiring minimum change for maximum convenience.

Independent grocers must also accommodate larger deliveries if they are to help themselves through making new economics possible.

The Dice Should not be Loaded

This advertisement does not call for any penalty against any form of competition. Rather this advertisement concerns only a Merry Christmas for our children's children.

For should the business of this nation be reduced ultimately to one hundred companies—as is rapidly happening—any opportunity for constructive use of ingenuity and initiative shall be lost by most Americans.

And presently the dice seem loaded for such an outcome. With the help of God, aroused public opinion can restore and maintain a way of life which has been our strength in war and peace.

Auto License Plate Sales to Start Jan. 2; Tax Compared

Mar. 1 Final Date to Get New Licenses

Sale of 1958 auto licenses will start Jan. 2 at the Wayne court-house, County Treasurer Leona Bahde advised today. No licenses will be issued before that date.

Statements of 1958 motor vehicle taxes will be mailed to vehicle owners this week. Taxes must be paid at the same time new license plates are purchased.

Most car owners will pay slightly less motor vehicle taxes than they did in 1956. Assessor Henry Arrp stated however, many rural precincts will have slightly higher taxes if they operate the same car.

Car owners have until Mar. 1 to secure the 1958 plates, which have black numerals on a yellow background. These plates will be used two years. A former tab will be affixed for the 1959 registration.

Method of securing plates will remain the same as last year. Owners must bring the tax statement from the assessor with them when they purchase new plates at the treasurer's office. The statement also serves as a receipt.

Persons who wish to receive their plates by mail must include the entire statement from the assessor, license certificate from the vehicle steering post and check or money order covering license fee and vehicle tax.

License fees are identical with last year. Cars have a flat rate of \$8. Commercial trucks vary from \$12.50 for a 1/2-ton unit to \$72 for a 20-ton unit.

All commercial trucks with new cabs, semi-trailers or new trucks operating in Wayne county will be required to have weight certificates on their trucks prepared before license can be issued.

Truck fees are \$2.00 on or under \$5; 1-ton, \$10; 1 1/2-ton, \$12; 2-ton, \$15; and 2 1/2-ton, \$25.

Truck owners will receive only one plate while autos will have two. Truck plates are mounted on the front of the vehicle except on semi-trailers, when it will go on in front.

Windshield stickers will be used to designate hauling capacity of commercial trucks.

In most cases, town people driving the same car will pay slightly less taxes. In others the taxes are nearly identical or higher because increases in tax levies offset valuation decreases.

How taxes compare in various parts of the county are shown in the table below. Taxes listed are for 1955 model auto both years. The rural precinct is based on an average tax levy of 33 mills in 1956 and 28 mills in 1957.

Great disparity in the taxes on autos is also shown by the table. The same car was used in all cases, yet the tax varies from a low of \$11.38 in rural precincts to a high of \$75.85 in Carroll. This is because of the tax levies on levies. Rural levy was estimated at 33 mills while that in Carroll is over 100 mills.

Farmers Can Get Extra Refund on Gasoline Tax

Farmers can get a state gas tax refund of six cents a gallon on gasoline used for farm operations.

The present refund of six cents a gallon became effective Sept. 30 according to state law. Up to that time the refund had been five cents a gallon on gas used for farming operations.

Claims can be submitted at any time during the year. However, not more than four claims for state tax refund may be made in one year.

In order to be eligible for the state refund farmers must have received a permit issued by the state. Application blanks for a permit may be obtained through county agent or county clerk offices. A fee of \$1 must accompany each application.

When the gasoline must be purchased from a licensed dealer and in lots of not less than 40 gallons. Gas must be placed in containers marked "Refund Tax Gasoline."

ASC to Start Accepting Bids On Benson's New Plan Jan. 2

County ASC officials are still awaiting official regulations on Agriculture Secretary Benson's soil bank plan which would allow Nebraska farmers to place their entire farms in the conservation reserve.

USDA officials met with state ASC officials last Wednesday and Thursday to outline the new program which will be tested in Nebraska, Maine, Tennessee and Illinois.

The new plan asks for an individual, competitive and realistic bid basis where farmers can name the price they want for idling their entire farm for five or 10 years. No uniform fixed price per acre will be set.

As when the soil bank was first suggested, this is of the essence. Farmers have only until Jan. 31 to submit their secret bids to county ASC offices. They will be notified whether their bids are accepted by Feb. 15.

The farmers whose bids are accepted will have to establish grass or tree cover, wildlife habitat or water storage facilities on their idle crop land.

Agriculture department officials emphasized the program will be completely voluntary.

The maximum payment per farm is \$5,000; however, the maximum payment per individual is \$10,000. Currently the Wayne county conservation reserve is \$11 per acre.

Farmers will be able to submit bids to local county ASC offices beginning Jan. 2. The state officials announced. Final determination as to whether a bid is accepted will come at the local level by ASC officials, familiar with the productivity of the cropland involved.

Jan. 13 Start Scheduled For Signup in Soil Bank

Wayne county farmers were reminded this week that signup for the 1958 corn acreage reserve will start Jan. 13.

ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell urged all farmers who intend to participate in the acreage reserve to contact the county office so the acreage and bank base can be established.

Per-acre payment rates for the 1958 program are somewhat higher than those which were in effect in 1957. Wayne county's average rate will be \$41.

Farmers who put land in the 1957 program will be paid a 70 percent premium above the 1958 rate in the soil bank.
