Special Meeting Planned To Set '59 County Salaries

Wayne county commissioners will meet Friday afternoon to set salaries for county officials and courthouse employees which will go into effect Jan. 1, 1959 for officials elected in the general election next fall. The board must set salaries for all elective offices and employees except the county judge and commissioners, whose salaries are determined by the Legislature. Commissioners currently get \$2,000 annually. This will be raised to \$2,200 in 1959. The judge receives \$3,300 per year. The new salary schedule must be set 60 days prior to the closing date for filing for office in this county. There has been little activity in filing so far this year. Harold Siphley, Winside, is the only candidate recorded thus far. He is seeking the county commissioner post currently held by Henry Hohneker, Hoskins. Interest in Trials High

Nearly 60 Wayne county owners have bid their farm to the government. The new soil bank test program is being conducted by the ASC Chairman Carl O. Sandell said Wednesday. Deadline for submitting bids Jan. 31. The bids are being made before the government. Bids will be judged on the basis of productivity of the farm land against the present bid. A qualified observer has estimated a total of 100 bids would be made before the deadline in Wayne county. The program appeals to three types of farm owners—the farmer operated by himself, the retired farmer, the farm owned by an absentee landlord who has unproductive farm land. It is being operated by a young farmer who has been thinking about doing something other kind of work. Sundell said Wednesday interest in the full farm program has exceeded all expectations. What if I want to sell my farm after I have made a full farm bid with the government?

You can sell your farm at any time. This can break the tie contract or if buyer and seller agree the government contract can continue for the full five or 10 years.

Can I collect ACP payments on the farm if it is under full bid contract with the government?

Yes, in fact this will be put in terraces and other permanent soil conservation practices. They when the farm is put back into production it is a much more proved fact.

How long do contracts run under this bid plan?

Contracts can be for five or 10 years at the option of the farmer submitting the bid. The largest total payments which can be made to any one farmer in a single year under this plan is \$10,000.

On what basis will bids be accepted or rejected?

All sealed bids will be sent to the state ACP office where the state committee will select prices for bids from the various counties in the state. All bids above these prices will be rejected; all those exceeding these rates will be rejected.

Factors to be considered in setting maximum rates for an area will include the range in available offering prices, the number of offers from an area in relation to the total number of farms, the estimated productivity and sale value of farms as supplied by county ACP committees and the amount of funds available for the program.

Does a farmer have a chance to reconsider if his bid is accepted?

No, he cannot withdraw his offer or contract. When he submits an offer he should do so with full realization that if accepted, the contract is effective immediately.

If a bid is rejected, can a farmer submit a new, lower one?

No. This is not possible in 1958. He can participate in the regular soil bank program or keep his cropland in production.

Do payments under this plan count for social security purposes?

Income from compensation to serve plans under the full bid program will count for social security purposes in the same manner and subject to the same limitations as that from regular farm sources such as crop sales.

Farmers and farm landlords who need such income to become eligible for social security payments should make sure they do not change their present arrangements and participation in production so their income becomes strictly rental or investment income.

Those who have retired will want to consider making such changes to permit them to receive their soil bank payments and all their social security benefits.

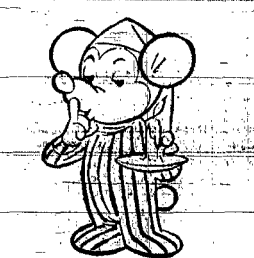

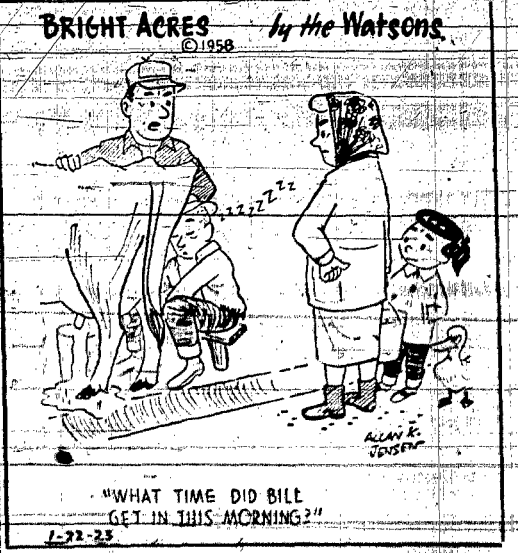

A remarkable decrease in the number of animals lost in transit has been made in the past 10 years. Death losses in animals hauled by truck to the Sioux City market were only one-third as great as in 1945.

When buying protein for cattle, the price per pound is the most important thing to consider. The best protein in cattle's rumen can break down the protein in cheap feed just as well as that in expensive feeds.

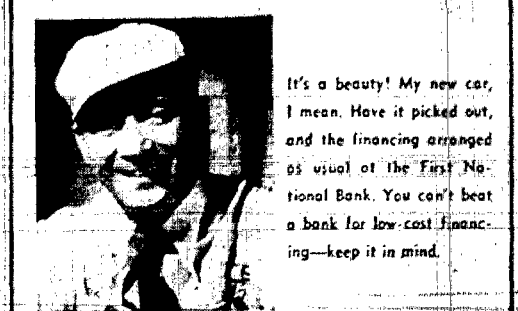

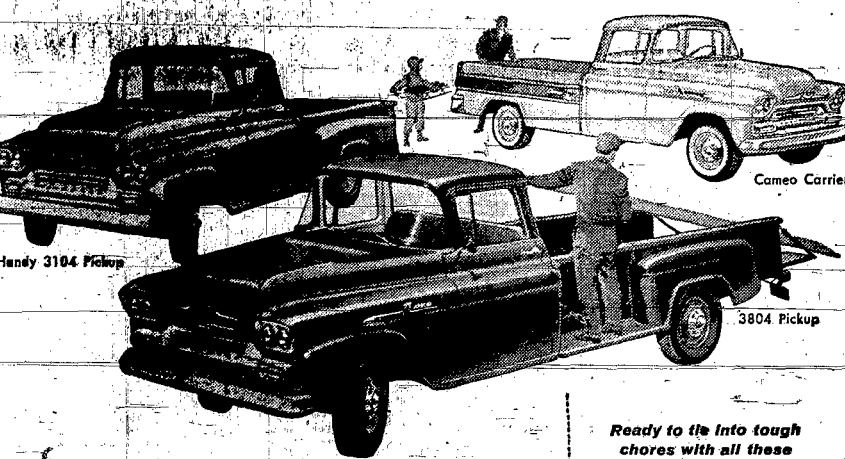
