# The January Nebraska Farm Outlook

# FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST



## OUTLOOK IN BRIEF

**BUSINESS:** Stability or sidewise movement will prevail throughout the first three quarters of 1958. An upturn is expected next fall in response to higher government spending, growing population and strong consumer demand. Unemployment is not expected to exceed 5 million. Business conditions in Nebraska will be about the same as in 1957.

**GOVERNMENT:** Federal spending will increase in the next fiscal year, mostly for defense. The debt limit will be raised above the present \$275 billion level as deficit financing again becomes necessary. Congress can be expected to continue farm programs and foreign aid, to liberalize the social security program, to pass the Reciprocal Trade Act, and to provide some form of federal aid to education. Property taxes will increase again in Nebraska.

**AGRICULTURE:** Net farm income will be less in '58 than in '57. Reasons are downward pressure on prices from high production, lower price supports, and continued high farm costs. In Nebraska, wheat growers and other cash grain farmers will suffer the greatest decline in keep-home pay; cattle ranchers will fare reasonably well. The trend toward larger but fewer farms will continue. Vertical integration will spread into hog production and cattle feeding.

## FARM COSTS . . .

### NO RELIEF IN SIGHT

**FARMERS WILL HAVE** a short-breathing spell in 1958 from the rising prices of recent months for goods and services used in production. The slight business recession of late '57 and early 1958 will not bring any price cuts except those concessions that farmers can obtain from dealers.

**PRICES PAID BY FARMERS** for production items set new records in 1957, increasing by an average of 4 percent over 1956 levels. As the year ended, farm cost rates were nearly one-fifth higher than in 1947-49.

**DURING 1957,** the cost of all major farm production items increased except seed and feed. The greatest increase was in feeder cattle prices reflecting lower cattle numbers and cheaper feed. Rising prices for stockers and feeders means higher incomes for cattle ranchers, but higher costs for cattle feeders.

**THE COST OF MONEY** borrowed by farmers went up in response to the "tight money policy." Prices of farm machinery and cars and trucks were marked up in '57 because of higher steel prices and wage rates. Farm land prices continued to rise because crop prospects improved; the soil bank program provided income insurance and kept

some land off the market, and farmers tried to buy additional land to utilize modern farm technology.

**FERTILIZER CONTINUES TO BE** the "best buy" of production items not of farm origin. The only decline in prices were for farm produced feed and seed.

**IN GENERAL, THE PRICES** paid by Nebraska farmers follow U.S. cost rates very closely. Feed prices will be lower here during the 1957-58 feeding season because of high production last year, especially of grain sorghum and hay.

**THE COST OF FEED** may be even lower next fall if crops are again good and support prices are lowered as expected. Feeder cattle prices will be about the same as last fall with minor changes depending upon pasture and hay conditions in the ranch country and feed production in the feeding area.

**NEBRASKA FARMERS CAN EXPECT** taxes on land and personal property to increase again in 1958. Rising costs of services provided by county and local governments and continued reliance upon the property tax as the primary source of revenue for such functions are the reasons.

## AGRICULTURE . . .

### MORE OF THE SAME IN '58

**THE COST-PRICE SQUEEZE** on farmers' keep-home pay will tighten in 1958. Net farm income improved slightly in 1957 because of more crop production, higher beef cattle and hog prices and government payments under the price-support and soil bank programs. In 1958, crop production will again be near record levels and could exceed that of last year.

**SOIL MOISTURE** in the entire Plains area is much improved over a year ago. Participation in the wheat acreage reserve is greatly reduced for the 1958 crop. This adds up to a wheat crop over one billion bushels this year. Feed grain and hay production will also be high unless weather is very unfavorable this spring and summer.

**PRICE SUPPORTS ON WHEAT** are 22 cents a bushel less than on the '57 crop; reductions are expected for other crops. Lower supports, large carryovers and high output will mean downward pressure on market prices for most crops including all important Nebraska crops. Livestock prices will remain about the same as in 1957 with the possibility of lower hog prices in late '58. Prices for chickens and eggs will be a little higher this year.

**WITH FARM COSTS REMAINING** at least as high as in '57, net farm income in the nation and in Nebraska will be slightly lower in 1958 than in 1957. Cash-grain farmers, especially wheat growers, will be hit the hardest.

**CATTLE FEEDERS CAN EXPECT** profits about the same as in '57. Cattle ranchers will fare the best as reduced cattle numbers and cheap feed keep the price of feeder cattle up to '57 levels.

**THE PARITY RATIO,** which shows the relationship between prices farmers receive and pay, will average about 89 percent in 1958, the same as in the late thirties. Farm people have attempted to ease this squeeze by obtaining off-farm jobs while remaining on the farm and by leaving agriculture entirely. Only about 12 percent of our population now lives on farms.

trailing farm production, is likely to be most attractive to farmers near or past retirement age, to farm landlords, and to some young farmers who have the chance to try non-farm jobs.

**OTHER THAN THIS,** no major changes in federal farm programs are expected. The Great Plains Conservation Program will get underway in Nebraska this year and offers technical and financial assistance to farmers and ranchers who need to make basic changes in land use and cropping systems and practices.

**THE SO-CALLED "technological revolution"** in agriculture will continue in 1958 as farmers attempt to reduce the risk of fluctuating incomes and to achieve levels of living comparable to those in other occupations. This process includes the adoption of new methods of production which reduce labor requirements and increase output per acre and per unit of livestock; and vertical integration.

**AGRIBUSINESS OR VERTICAL** integration is spreading rapidly in livestock production. It involves the control of several stages of the production, processing and marketing of farm commodities through contractual arrangements with feed companies or processing firms or through farmers' cooperatives.

**VERTICAL INTEGRATION** in the production, processing and marketing of a farm product is nearly complete in the broiler business but is spreading to hog production and cattle feeding. More research, and education on the nature and advantages and disadvantages of this development to farmers, marketing firms and consumers is urgently needed.

## HOGS . . .

corn ratios during the fall breeding season were relatively favorable in 1957.

**OVER THE YEARS,** a favorable hog corn ratio during the breeding season has resulted in an increase in spring farrowings (see Figure 1). The December 1 pig survey indicates that the 1958 spring pig crop will be 6 percent larger than the 1957 spring pig crop.

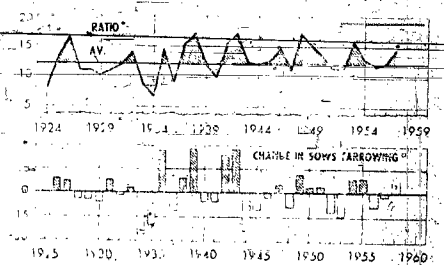
**THE LARGEST INCREASES** indicated are in the western corn belt. Farrowing in Nebraska (and the other western corn belt states) tends to be later than in the rest of the corn belt. These anticipated increases insofar as they actually materialize will be reflected in heavier marketings especially during the latter half of 1958.

**PRICES OF HOGS** during the first half of 1958 are expected to be about the same as during the first 6 months of 1957. Prices during the last 6 months will likely be lower than in 1957. If late farrowings show as much increase as the December 1 pig report would indicate, the seasonal decline next fall (October - December) would probably be greater than usual.

**THE FACT THAT A** considerable loss was experienced in the grain sorghum harvest in some areas and that both grain sorghums and corn were harvested at moisture levels which may make holding over into the summer months hazardous may have a tendency to make farmers cut down on the number of sows actually kept for spring farrowing.

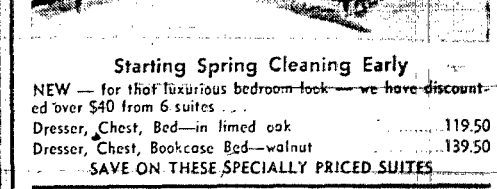

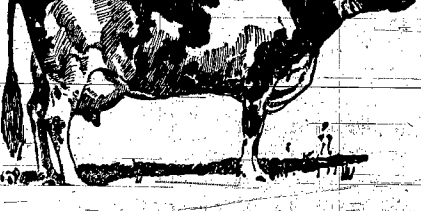

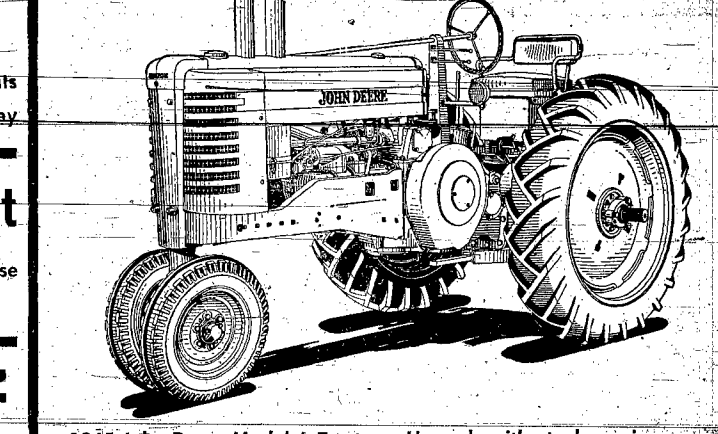

Carpenter, Ak-Sar-Ben Plan Talks on Exemption Saturday

Lincoln—Ak-Sar-Ben, Omaha civic organization, told Sen. Terry Carpenter it has given \$2 million to Nebraska in benevolent activities since 1935.

County Agent's Column

'57 Crops Produce Record Yield Averages in State

Best Crop Year
Irrigation and fertilizers, along with other improved practices, are paying off on Nebraska farms.
"How else could one explain that after about 75 years of farming, we have just produced the biggest total crop on record? This was accomplished in spite of the fact that considerable land was in the soil bank.
In 1957 we harvested six percent more than in 1952, the previous high production year, and 27 percent more than the 10-year average.
State average yield records were set for several crops in 1957. They included: corn, 45 bushels per acre; sorghum, grain, 29 bushels; barley, 31 bushels; soybeans, 27 bushels (the highest average yield of any state in the nation), and all hay, 1.4 tons.

Encourage Crabgrass
The most practical way to control crabgrass is to develop a thick lawn grass sod by high mowing, moderate fertilization, deep watering and other good lawn practices.
Where crabgrass has already taken a foothold, several of the newer chemicals will give satisfactory control.
Hand weeding is still the most practical way of eliminating crabgrass if it isn't too thick. Crabgrass seed is always present and chemicals or cultivation that leave bare spots on the lawn provide an ideal place for crabgrass.
Hints About Hens
Watch for broodies - there is no profit in keeping them unless they are quickly broken up. They also lower quality of the eggs they sit on.
If you ventilate your house by opening windows, be sure to open them on sunny, warm afternoons - extreme temperature changes from mid-day to night can induce molt in your flock.
Hens are comfortable and active over a wide range of temperatures. But their consumption of water, so vital to egg production, is reduced sharply as water temperature drops below 45 degrees or goes over 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Good producers check water temperature, know what their birds want and supply it to them.
Look-over your nests again. Remember the hen lays a clean egg. It's up to you to keep it that way and the first step is a clean nest.
