10 Percent of County Farms Submitted on Soil Bank Bids

May Release Top Limits This Week

About 500 farmers and landlords in Wayne and Dixon counties are now awaiting word on acceptance or rejection of their bids to place their entire cropland in the soil bank conservation reserve for five or 10 years.

Deadline for submitting bids on the new four-state program was Friday. Wayne County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell said 78 bids were entered in Wayne county. Dixon officials said 304 were submitted there.

No definite word on bids has yet been received from state ASC officials. Applications earlier suggested local ASC officials may receive final word on the highest acceptable prices per acre that will be accepted in each county. Bids were all forwarded to the state office for completion and approval.

Because of the unexpectedly large number of bids submitted in the state, officials set a maximum of 10 percent on the amount of cropland in any one county which will be removed from production.

Sundell said the bids in Wayne county covered about 24,000 acres. Roughly 95 percent of the total cropland acreage in the county.

Farmers will be notified of the acceptance or rejection of their bids by Feb. 21. Bids opened so far at the state office ranged from \$9 per acre to a \$15 bid on the Clay county irrigator. A majority of the bids opened suggested \$25 per acre.

The state committee will set ceiling prices for bids from various areas of the state. All bids at these prices or below will be accepted. All those exceeding them will be rejected.

Factors to be considered in setting maximum rates for an area will include range in per-acre of varying prices, the number of farms in relation to the total number of farms, estimated productivity and sale value ratings as supplied by the county ASC committee and the amount of funds available for the program—\$7 million in Nebraska for 1958.

If a farmer's bid is accepted the contract is effective immediately. It cannot be withdrawn. The contract cannot be cancelled before the end of the five- or 10-year period except under special circumstances such as physical or mental incapacity of the farmer.

Change of ownership ends the contract with the original owner or tenant. He receives no further

payment and will have to refund all ACP cost-sharing payments received unless his successor becomes a party to the contract. The successor may, at his request, be substituted under the contract.

Requirements and restrictions on land treatment are essentially the same as under the regular conservation reserve.

Reserve areas must be seeded to permanent grass cover or planted to trees. They can also be used for water storage and for food, cover and water for fish and wildlife.

Acres cannot be grazed and no hay, grain or seed crops can be harvested during the contract period. Noxious weeds must be controlled on reserve acres. The farmer also agrees not to break up any new land for crop production.

Income from payments will count for Social Security purposes in the same manner and subject to the same restrictions as that from regular farm sources such as crop sales.

Putting land in the conservation reserve will not reduce future farm acreage allotments. Cropland placed in the soil bank will be regarded as having been in crop production in setting future allotments or corn bases.

Emerson Barn Destroyed by Tuesday Blaze

A 38 by 70-foot barn and its contents were totally destroyed. The contents included 1,500 bales of hay and straw, 12 brood sows and about 80 small pigs.

Firemen were badly hampered by a scarcity of water, but did succeed in saving other farm buildings close to the barn.

Tuesday Crash Doubles '58 Highway Deaths in County

Two Die in Auto-Pickup Crash Tuesday

Wayne county's 1958 highway toll doubled Tuesday with the death of an Emerson couple about two miles south of Wayne on Highway 15.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fuchser, Emerson. Their 1958 model car collided with a pickup driven by Elmer Bauermeister, Wayne farmer. Fuchser, 46, operated a farm between Emerson and Thurston. They had no children.

The deaths raised Wayne county's 1958 total to four. A Randolph couple were killed Jan. 1 in an accident near Shiels.

Mr. Fuchser, 50, was dead on arrival at Benthaek hospital. Mrs. Fuchser, 46, died about 3 1/2 hours later. She suffered multiple fractures and severe head injuries.

Bauermeister, 40, was still confined at the hospital Wednesday suffering from concussion and rib fractures. His condition was described as serious, but improved. Officials were still investigating the possible cause of the mishap. They were unable to talk with Bauermeister because of his condition.

State Patrolman C. W. Scheel, Norfolk, said the accident occurred on the south slope of a hill. The car driven by Mr. Fuchser was headed north and Bauermeister's pickup was southbound. County Attorney Charles McDermott said another pickup and a car of college students was ahead of the Bauermeister vehicle. The student car slowed when the first pickup began a right turn at the intersection.

Just before the students went through the intersection the Fuchser car passed in the other lane. The students then heard the screeching of brakes and turned to see the pickup flying in the air.

McDermott said skid marks from the Fuchser vehicle measured 72 feet. Marks also indicated the Bauermeister pickup skidded 53 feet before veering to the left and into the lane of the Fuchser car. Brunt of the impact was on the right side of both vehicles.

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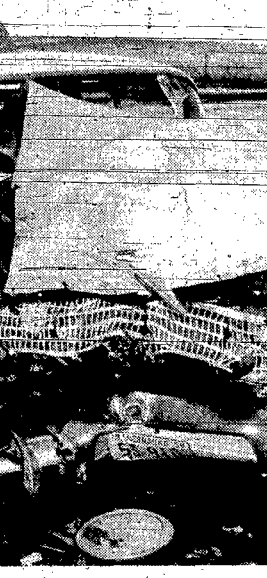
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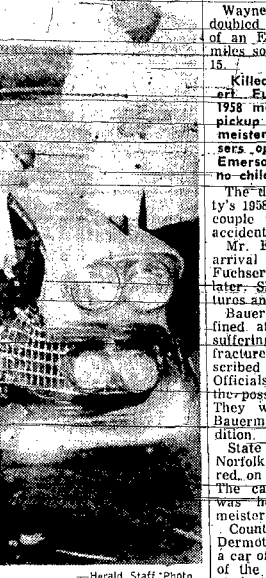
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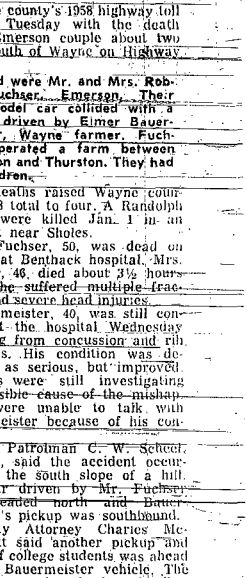

School Redistricting Group Readies Plans for Election

Wayne County School Reorganization committee met Thursday night at the Wayne courthouse to ready plans for elections on the proposed county redistricting plan.

State Reorganization Director Lester Hunt, Lincoln, met with the committee to answer questions on the election procedures. He told the committee two separate elections must be held for the proposed areas.

Committee members decided to concentrate on the Area II district first as Carroll and Hoskins school problems are more pressing than those in the Wayne area. Area II comprises the areas now served by high schools at Carroll, Winside, and Hoskins. Area I includes the districts served by Wayne High.

Hunt told the committee elections in both areas cannot be held at the same time because some present districts are split between the two areas. The entire district voters on any redistricting measure if any of its boundaries are affected by the redistricting proposal.

Slight revisions are now being made in the proposed redistricting map. These are expected to be completed in about two weeks.

A public hearing on the entire county plan must then be held.

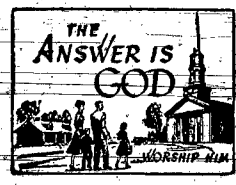

Don Gross and Larry Rief were outstanding for the winners. They scored 17 and 15 points, respectively, and controlled most of the rebounds.

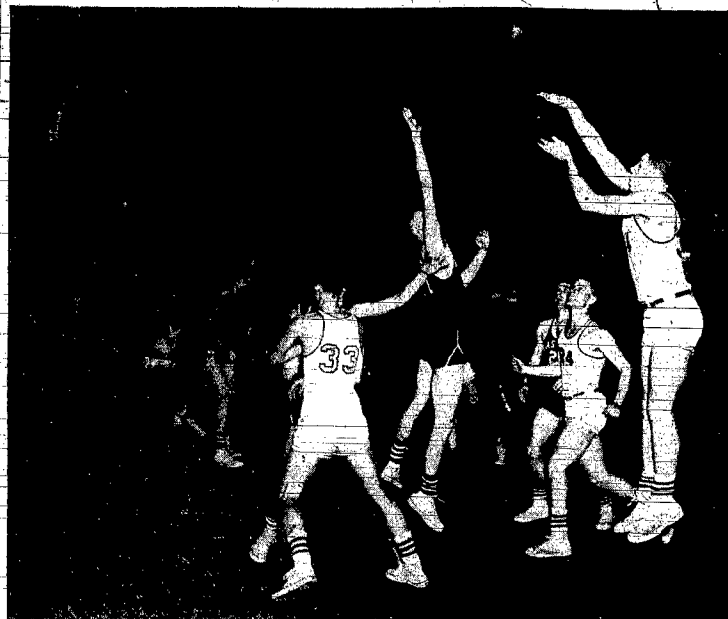

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial... but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Why Buy A Hospital?

Why buy a hospital when we already have one? That is a question many people are asking in response to the drive to obtain a municipal hospital and a question worthy of a thoughtful answer.

If Benthack hospital were purchased for a municipal hospital, facilities there would be available to all doctors in the area... thus available to all persons who use the services of these doctors.

The hospital now is rated as a 26-bed installation—above the standard recommended for a community of this size—and additional facilities could be made available if the need should arise.

How much more convenient it would be for local families to have their folks using a hospital here in town rather than in a neighboring or distant town!

First there is the matter of faster medical care in case of emergencies such as accident, injury, or sudden illness... and secondly there is added convenience for visitors who do not have to drive greater distances to see their loved ones in the hospital.

How do our doctors feel about this? They are behind it 100 percent. It is a greater convenience for them, too, besides giving them more time to devote to their primary business of treating patients.

What will it cost? A polio sum compared to the cost of building and equipping a new hospital with similar facilities. The building complete with most of its equipment and including necessary remodeling now in progress can be purchased for about \$135,000. Central City recently let a contract to build a 24-bed hospital for \$310,000. What a difference!

Granted we may have to add on to the build-

ing in time, but the same would be true if we build a new hospital.

What about using 40 percent Federal funds and building a new hospital? First... priorities are given to towns that have no hospital facilities. We have a hospital so we would have to wait a long time before we could even be considered.

Secondly... only a small amount of the money requested from Federal sources is available each year and hospitals already approved must wait many years before their turns come up. Thirdly... why should we ask for Federal aid when we can do this job ourselves and do it now?

Another benefit is in the offering if Wayne purchases a municipal hospital. Our medical services will be improved. One local doctor estimates that at least two more physicians will come to Wayne within the next two years if a city hospital becomes a reality.

To those who have had to wait long hours while a doctor worked his way through a line of patients, this will be a blessing. Our doctors say that Wayne needs the services of additional doctors... and we can have them if we approve the purchase of Benthack hospital.

Think long and hard before your turn down this opportunity to have a municipal hospital...

Capitol News

Loss of National Guard Units Reports Disturbing Anderson

Lincoln—State parks and the National Guard have drawn the attention of Gov. Victor Anderson.

The governor said he re-elected he will ask the 1938 Legislature to start building a fund for improving Nebraska's state parks. A "definite program is needed," the governor added, "and I'm going to lay it before the Legislature." Past procedure, he commented, has been to hand out money for park development in a "drib and dab" fashion. The governor indicated the program he has in mind will be in the vicinity of \$300,000 to \$500,000 per year.

In a separate statement, the governor took up the matter of the National Guard and reports circulating in Washington about it.

The governor said there are reports from the nation's capital that indicate a reduction in national guardsmen and units is being considered. He asserted that he is "disturbed" not only by the possible loss of National Guard units in Nebraska, but by the fact a reduction in the overall program would mean a less opportunity for young Nebraskans for part-time military training.

Nebraska has units of the Guard in 30 communities. Drastic cuts would not only affect these communities, the governor said, but the nation's defense as well. "I see no merit in cutting back an existing and efficient military force at a time when our military position is obviously in a critical state," the governor said.

There is more than \$4 million invested in armories in Nebraska alone, the chief executive said.

Interstate Hearing

State officials got a surprise at a hearing in Lincoln for the stretch of the interstate highway between Gretna, through the edge of Lincoln and then to Pleasant Dale. Despite a crowd of about 150 persons, no one opposed plans or routing for the super highway.

A check of individuals in the crowd showed they were at the hearing, required by Federal law, to get information, especially on what the state would pay for the land required for the right-of-way. There was no mention of prices for acquiring the land. This part of the gigantic project has not yet been undertaken.

The hearing was held by the Advisory State Highway commission, whose members had fully expected a long argument from landowners. Owen Boyles, secretary of the commission, said the hearing was the first on the interstate that failed to produce protest.

State Engineer L. N. Ress likened construction of the route to the "coming of the railroads at the turn of the century." He said the four-lane highway will have a tremendous impact upon the economy of Lincoln, the state and the nation. Ress told the crowd cost of the 487-mile route will be 283 million, or less than \$600,000 per mile.

A portion of the highway is under construction in the Omaha vicinity. Ress expects traffic to use the

Time-Sales Contracts

A Legislative council committee, headed by Sen. Mervin Bedford, Geneva, is looking quietly into a controversial subject that affects a great many Nebraskans. That is the matter of financing of motor vehicles.

Bedford said one of the problems of the committee is that persons who have been victimized by finance firms are reluctant to allow the committee to "use their cars."

But the Geneva lawmaker said, there will be no names used. He said it is imperative his committee be able to see contracts involving shady dealings in order to come up with constructive legislation that is neither unfair to citizens or finance companies.

"A half dozen or so stinkers give the whole financial structure a bad name," Bedford said, "and it isn't fair to the honest and respectable firms."

The Fair board secretary said he was disappointed with a number of the entertainment features at the 1937 fair, although grandstand attendance at the big car and stock car races climbed about 10 percent from 1936. Rapid Milking Rates Saves Dairy Farmer Many Dollars
Little Things Count
We should mind little things—little courtesies in life, little matters of personal appearance, little extravagances, little minutes of wasted time, little details in our work. It seems that a thing cannot be too small to command our attention.

It has been pointed out that success is built on small things. The faster the runner in the world is only five percent faster than scores of ordinary runners.

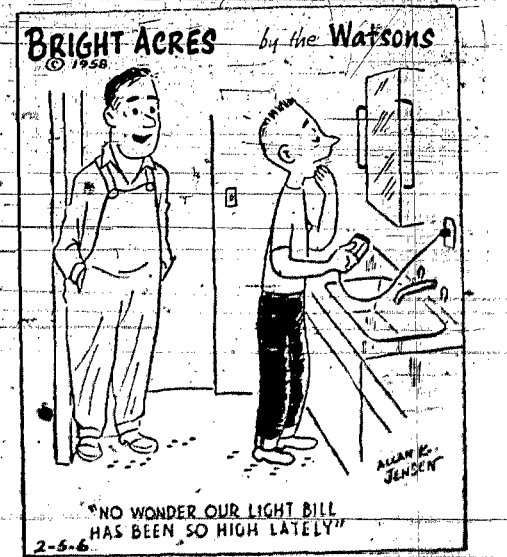
The difference between a great race horse and a good race horse is only a few seconds. Small differences in personality separate the superior salesmen from the average. And that extra hour in the laboratory may make the big difference in the lifetime search of a scientist.

Rapid Milking Saves
The average dairyman could save many dollars annually by selecting cows with a rapid milking rate.

Each increase of one minute in milking time increases the time to milk a cow by over 10 hours in a lactation period. For example, a cow which can be milked in three minutes saves over 70 hours per year compared to one which requires 10 minutes milking time. The cow's milking rate is largely determined by size of the teat opening.

In the past it has been suggested that cows could be trained to milk rapidly. With our present knowledge of the very great influence of teat opening size, it is clear that rapid milking is dependent on breeding of the cow rather than training.

One of the most important keys to profit is how much production you have per man. It doesn't mean

Green Chop Profitable
Green chop feeding for dairy herds may be more profitable than grazing. The hourly overhead on a field chopper as cut when it is used not merely for a few days a year to make silage, but daily each summer to green chop feed.
