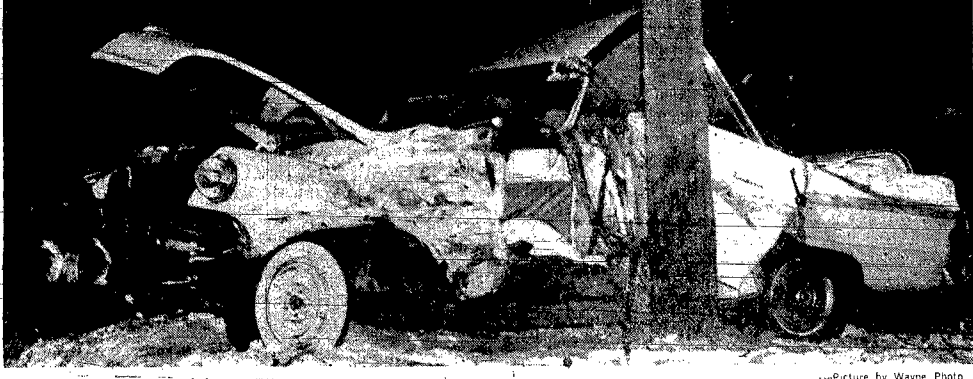


Monday End Seen to City Power Shortage

Driver Escapes Serious Injury in Wednesday Crash



LARRY HANSEN, WAYNE, escaped with only a bump on the head last Wednesday night when his car, pictured above, was struck by a car driven by Lester Lutt, Wayne, at the intersection of Third and Lincoln streets. The accident occurred about 11:20 p.m. The Hansen car was forced into a light pole at the southeast corner of the intersection and was described by police as virtually a total loss. Lutt was driving south on Lincoln when the accident occurred. Hansen was going west on Third. The Lutt vehicle struck the Hansen car on the right side and forced it into the pole. Lutt was thrown from his car and suffered head cuts and bruises. He was confined until Friday at Benthack hospital.

Experiment Farm Association Annual Meet Set Next Week

To Discuss Area Trials

Annual meeting of the NE Nebraska Experimental Farm Association will be held next Thursday afternoon at the Wayne city auditorium. President Jack Kinney, Wakefield, announced today.

Representatives from 14 NE Nebraska counties are expected to attend the annual meeting. University of Nebraska representatives will be on hand to discuss results of the 1957 research program at the station.

The annual meeting will open at 1:30 p.m. A board of directors session will be held at 10 a.m. The Wayne Chamber of Commerce will be hosts to the directors and university staff members at a noon luncheon at Hotel Morrison. The chamber will also serve coffee and doughnuts at 4:30 p.m.

Kinney is scheduled to welcome the group at 1:30 and introduce guests. University Chancellor Clifford Hardin will speak on the university's budget. He will be followed by Dr. W. V. Lambrey, who will discuss the current and proposed budgets of the NE experimental farm.

Results of the 1957 research program will be in 15-minute talks by university staff members. The program included oats and barley variety tests, oat drill box survey, grain sorghum and corn hybrid tests, soybean variety tests, crop improvement research, and horticultural variety trials.

These results will be discussed by Dr. John Schmidt, Clare Park; August Dreier, Dr. Jim Williams, Dr. John Lonnquist and Dick Miyoshi.

John Matsushima will speak on beef cattle feeding. Dr. L. J. Sumption will discuss establishing a swine program at the area farm.

Redistricting Group Planning Public Hearings on Proposal

Three public hearings of the merits of the proposed Area II redistricting will be held the first week in March. Reorganization Committee Chairman Herbert Hilkemann announced today.

Hearings will be held at Winside, Carroll and Hoskins. All will be held at 8 p.m. The Carroll meeting will be Mar. 3 at the village auditorium. Hoskins area patrons will meet at the high school auditorium Mar. 4. The Winside hearing will be held in the village auditorium Mar. 6.

Hilkemann said the hearings were called to determine the advisability of holding an election on the proposed plan. Discussion at the hearings will be limited to the merits of the proposed plan, the value and amount of school property involved in the action, the outstanding indebtedness of each district and proposed disposition thereof and the debts and liabilities of the districts involved.

New borders of Area II were determined at a meeting of the reorganization committee Thursday night at the courthouse. The new area has a valuation of about \$7,380,000 as compared with the previous figure of \$8,600,000.

Districts involved in Area II include 9, 11, 16, 21, 24, 28, 31, 36, 39, 44, 46, 52, 53, 55, 56, 58, 60, 62, 63, 65, 70, 75, 78, 79, 81, 83, 84, 85 and 86.

The committee, in calling the hearings, said its focus now is the time to determine whether the western section of the county is ever to have a high school of its own. Opinion is widely split on whether this is desirable, one member said.

Experiment Farm To Take Part in Drill-Box Survey

Consent. The new NE Nebraska Experiment farm will serve as a hub for another oats drill box survey in 1958. Supt. Dale Flowerday announced Wednesday.

Oats seed will be collected in Cedar, Wayne and Dixon counties at planting time and planted on land of the experiment farm. Flowerday explained a similar survey was conducted in 1957.

Each sample will be collected right from the drill box as the farmer is planting. After obtaining a complete laboratory analysis will be made in addition to actual planting by yield determinations.

One-half pound samples of oats will be used in making a test for purity, percentage of inert materials, other crops and number and kind of weed seeds present.

Results of the analysis will be made available to each farmer who cooperates and to county agents. By considering the results, farmers may be able to find ways of increasing oats production.

Last year more than 500 NE Nebraska farmers witnessed a similar field demonstration showing various data samples growing at the experiment farm.

WSTC dramatic students will present a one-act play, "Master Pierre Patelin," over Sioux City television, Channel 9, at 11:30 a.m. Saturday.

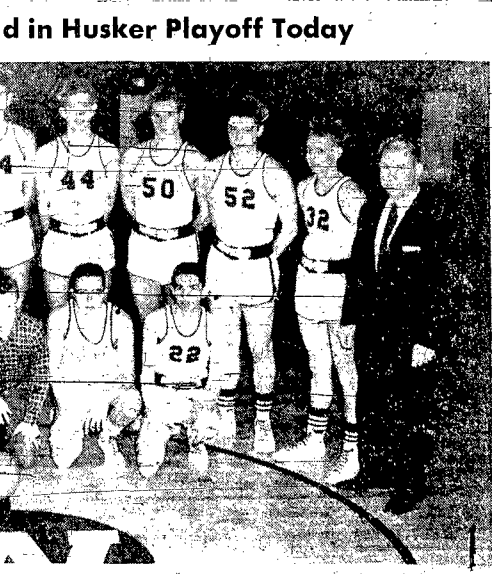
