All Personal Property Owners and Those 21 to 50 Subject to Old Age Assistance or Poll Tax Are Required to File!

Nebraska Revenue Laws:

77-409

County assessor shall examine and check all returns of personal property for taxation. He shall have the power to examine under oath the person making the return to determine that all personal property of the taxpayer is listed for taxation at its actual value.

Every person owning personal property is required to make out and verify a statement of all such property, which shall be delivered to the county assessor on or before April 20.

77-1235

Where any person fails, or refuses to make out and deliver the statement required, the county assessor shall evaluate the article of property belonging to that person and shall add 50 percent to the value returned.

Air Ducts Vital to Corn Drying



FARMERS WHO HAVE EAR CORN stored of 17 or 18 percent moisture should consider some method of reducing the moisture-content before warm weather arrives, advises E. A. Olson, Uni-versity of Nebraska extension engineer. Olson says any crib can be equipped with air ducts to dry the corn. The vertical and inlet ducts can be made of scrap wood around the farm and should be three feet square for a three-ring-erib. Heated or unheated air may be used with a fan to force air through the bin. County agents can provide additional information on drying ear corn, Olson added.
